Meeting called to order by President Sherrill Spatz at 8:03pm

Meeting began in the sanctuary with a lesson on Bima Rep responsibilities kindly provided by Jan Friedman and Janee Lowenstein.

Blessings / D'var Torah – Rabbi Bellows –Focus on "What helps synagogues survive?"

Unfinished Business – Ben Cernese updated the board on the upcoming Brotherhood event (December 1st). The building is sold out, and there are about 10 vendors now for the outside. CBS and their Prize Truck will be in front of the building.

Rabbi Bellows' Report - Sisterhood service was exemplary!

Education Report –Elisa Blank- The 7th grade Shul-in was awesome! BNTY – Emily Besthoff – We are off to a fabulous year.

Treasurer's Report – Beth Cohen –Regarding the copiers, we have changed companies due to a better deal. The parking lot cost was \$130,000. We do not have the number of members paying full dues that we anticipated, leading to a significant deficit. Suggestion by Beth Cohen to consider Quickbooks. Suggestion by Ed Kliegman to create a strong 5 year financial plan.

Financial Secretary Report – Sue-Ellen Pennington for Alan Lazarus – Currently we have 523 congregants. 86 are on special arrangements. There are also 48 associate members included as part of the 523.

Investments Report - Alan Loewenstein -report stands

BINGO - Volunteers are needed for Triple Bingo.

President's Report – Sherrill Spatz –We received an anonymous donation to be used specifically for Wi-Fi in the school wing. We will need to fund the monthly charges.

Rob Saunders /Community and Fund Raising:

Craig Field (Fundraising) - Dancing through the Decades had a lower turnout than expected. The low attendance resulted in a financial loss for this fundraiser. He stressed the importance of fundraising for the temple. There are people at the temple with experience who may be able to help with grant research.

Julia Brite (Membership) - There is a new program called the "Ask" program to assist new members with questions. Consideration of a coffee bar in the lobby. Also the question was raised of how to reach out to families who have resigned.

Helaine Schnall /Learning: Adult and lifelong learning is currently being explored in terms of new programs.

Shelley Lomove/ House and Administration: We anticipate doing 3 bathrooms and all flooring by 1/1/14. The Cantor thanked the housing committee for brighter lighting.

INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Shalom, Chaverim - Hello, friends,

Though our world is often covered in snow during the winter months, an upcoming holiday reminds us each year that spring is not too far away. I always look forward to Tu B'Shevat as a hint that, even though our days are grey and cold right now, the world does indeed turn green again, and it will th new life and beauty

blossom and bloom with new life and beauty.

Tu B'Shevat (the 15th day of the Hebrew Month of Shevat), according to our tradition, is the day on which all trees turn one year older. Why might this matter? In Leviticus 19:23-25, we learn that fruit from trees must not be eaten during the tree's first three years. The fourth year's fruit is given to God as a tithe, and then we may eat of the tree's fruit from that point on. It is presumably quite difficult to keep track of the age of trees if one does not know the exact "birth-date", or "plant-date," so Tu B'Shevat is the default date.

Planting trees is just one way to celebrate Tu B'Shevat. Some people choose to plant trees in Israel, some use the day as a way to celebrate the environment, and some see it as a reminder to live "greener" lives. Many congregations have also begun holding Tu B'Shevat Seders, based on the Kabbalistic (mystical) Seders of the Middle Ages. Two years ago Temple B'nai Torah held our very first one, and it was an enormous success. We were joined by nearly eighty congregants of all ages, who participated in sampling different types of fruits, juices, and nuts. Each item held particular significance or was taken from a different type of tree. They also each carried special spiritual symbolism related to our lives. We sang, ate, laughed, and had a wonderful evening together.

Temple B'nai Torah will be holding its 3rd Annual Tu B'Shevat Seder on Wednesday, January 15, at 7:00 pm. This Seder, one of our nicest new additions to the life of TBT, promises to be a delicious, informative, and thoughtprovoking way in which to celebrate the precious world around us. I do hope you will join us.

INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



My article, this month, is devoted to our 3rd annual Composer-in-Residence Dan Nichols, who, with his band, "Eighteen," will join us on the weekend of January 31-February 2, 2014. This will be my second collaboration with Dan, having worked with him in my previous congregation, Temple Israel of Northern Westchester, in April, 2007. Since that

time, Dan has proven to be an even more prolific composer of Jewish "rock" liturgical music, a number of selections of which he will lead, along with our Adult, Teen and Youth Choirs, on Friday, January 31st.

Dan will arrive on Thursday, January 30th, in order to work and rehearse with our choirs. On Saturday afternoon, Dan will present a "lunch and learn" program for the congregation. On Saturday evening, Dan and his band will present a concert and, on Sunday, Dan will teach and perform in our religious school (Please see additional information in this bulletin for all



the details). As you can see, there are many varied activities planned for this exciting weekend. Tickets for the Saturday night concert are on sale now. 200 TICKETS HAVE ALREADY BEEN SOLD, SO PLEASE HURRY IF YOU WANT SEATING THAT EVENING!

Dan's appearance at Temple B'nai Torah coincides with our temple youth group, BNTY (B'nai Torah Temple Youth) being the annual host of the NFTY NAR (National Federation of Temple Youth - New York Area) regional "Kallah (convention)." Whew, that's a lot of abbreviations to remember! Kallah will bring us at least 180 teens from Westchester, Manhattan and Long Island, all converging on TBT for a weekend of intense Jewish activity. Our congregants will be providing home hospitality. If you haven't done so, PLEASE volunteer your home for at least 3 of these youth group members. Not to worry, as these teens are the cream of the crop of the leadership of their representative youth groups and are well mannered and behaved. The teens will attend our Shabbat service, the Saturday night concert and Dan will participate in the Kallah Shabbat morning service.

Dan is, perhaps, the most popular and influential composer, performer and music educator on the national reform youth scene, both in the synagogue youth groups and the summer camp movement. His melodies are accessible, singable, melodic and memorable. I personally love many of his compositions, which I have been teaching our congregation over the past months. If his appearance and impact are anything like they were in my former congregation, then his presence in our congregation will be both uniquely memorable and joyous, to say the very least. Dan, who hails from Raleigh, North Carolina, is a product of the Reform Camp Movement and a wonderful example of just what Jewish camping is all about and what it is accomplishing (Although the controversial Pew Research has shown decimation of reform affiliation, nevertheless people like Dan Nichols are a visible and vital example of where Reform Judaism is visible and vital). Dan credits his summer camp experience with igniting his passion for Jewish music. Not many know that Dan, with his parents, together converted to Judaism from a Mormon background when Dan was very young!

Dan spent many summers at the Goldman Union Camp, in Zionsville, Indiana (suburban Indianapolis), where yours truly was the camp song leader, in the summer of 1975. He says, "Jewish camp culture is mostly built around group singing.... what inspired me as a kid was the sound of 350 people singing in the dining hall, together!"



Today, Dan Nichols is a

very busy musician, playing over 200 performances a year and presenting at Jewish community centers, Hillels and synagogues, one of which will be ours!

If you enjoyed our previous Composer-in-Residence weekends, you will surely be captivated as well as educated by the experience of singing with Dan Nichols. I look forward to seeing you on this very special weekend.

Please join me on Sunday, January 12, 2014, at 1pm in the Kiddush Lounge, as I continue regaling you with my unique Jewish adventures. It will be my second presentation in the series, "The Wandering Jew." We shall visit the unusual Jewish community of Beijing and share my time spent with members of the reform congregation, K'hilat Beijing. As always, it will promise to be unique and memorable!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



One of my passions since joining this temple almost twenty-five years ago has been fundraising. I have always enjoyed the challenge of putting together something from almost nothing and seeing it come to fruition. During my earlier years with Sisterhood, I worked with Barbara Cohen to change the concept of what fundraising

should be. We took the White Elephant Sale, Used Book Sale and Rummage Sale and "trashed" them. These were labor-intensive but non-profitable fundraisers for which few people enjoyed volunteering. These were replaced by spa weekends in rustic Connecticut and beautifully catered Chinese auctions in local country clubs. We decided if a fundraiser couldn't make at least \$1000 it was not worth the effort to do them. We met with a lot of resistance from some congregants that these "high priced" fundraisers would turn people away. Barbara and I felt that it was worth a try to do once and see what happened. Well, those who didn't believe were very wrong. That first spa weekend made over \$1200 and the Chinese auction cleared over \$4000. So much for the naysayers. Those fundraisers over the next 3 or 4 years became more popular and profitable for Sisterhood

Now I am asking, "Why can't the same thing be done on a congregational level?" How is it that only Sisterhood and Brotherhood come up with profitable and successful fundraisers? That just doesn't make sense. One thing I (and many other congregants) have come to realize is there are too many fundraisers running at approximately the same time by each of the arms. During these economic times, that leaves some to have to choose which one or two that they most would like to attend, when maybe they would have liked to attend them all.

Here is a challenge to all of the arm presidents and fundraising chairpersons: create one, or maybe two, fundraisers per year that would satisfy the requirement of being affordable, interesting and exciting to the wide range of age groups in our congregation. Make it something to which we can invite the community so there are outside funds coming in. The proceeds of these fundraisers would go directly to the TBT operating account. These fundraisers should not be in addition to what you already put on during the year, but instead of them. Each group could eliminate a few of their own fundraisers in order to put the time and effort into these to make them successful. I welcome all ideas and I am willing to lend my expertise. Let's change the word 'fundraising' to 'FUN'raising.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL EDUCATOR

I want to welcome everyone back after our winter vacation. Throughout the month of January all of our classes will be studying the holiday of Tu B'Shevat, the fifteenth day of the month of Shevat. This holiday marks the celebration of the importance of the Earth, our environment, and nature within Judaism.

Many people question how we can have a celebration for the 'New Year of the Trees' when it is bitter cold and snowy outside. Regardless of the climate of the various places throughout the world in which Jews reside, Tu B'Shevat is celebrated with respect to the climate of Israel.

The almond tree has a special significance on Tu B'Shevat. The word for almond in Hebrew means to "watch" or "wake." The almond tree is among the first to awaken from its winter sleep. The almond tree celebrates the fifteenth of Shevat in full bloom.

The practical need for a "birthday" for trees arises from a Torah commandment:

And when you come to the land and have planted all manner of trees for food, the fruit thereof shall be forbidden for three years; you shall not eat it. In the fourth year, all the fruit thereof shall be holy and must be given to God. But in the fifth year, you may eat the fruit, that it may yield unto you more richly the increase thereof. (Leviticus 19:23-25)

Since we do not know exactly when each tree started to grow, we celebrate Tu B'Shevat as the birthday of all trees. There are many customs and traditions associated with Tu B'Shevat. In Israel, it is customary for school children to visit a nearby Jewish National Fund Forest and plant trees there. We, too, can plant trees in Israel by buying trees from the Jewish National Fund. Tu B'Shevat is also an occasion for eating fifteen different kinds of fruit, with preference given to those varieties which can be found in Israel. Another tradition is to have a Tu B'Shevat Seder and take this day to identify with nature and the land of Israel. May we take this time to appreciate the beauty and bounty of Israel, and be grateful for the bounty in our own everyday lives. May our eyes always be open to the glory of the natural world.
