An Introduction

Last semester, as part of a class teaching Mussar, which loosely translates to 'ethics', our professor tasked us with writing ethical wills to our hypothetical children imparting the values, ideologies and lessons that we found the most important. While this may seem a tad morbid, as it presupposes that we have already died – even before many of us (including



myself) have had children — it gave me an opportunity to explore the values to which I hold fast, the ones most worthy of being shared with the next generation. As such, I came upon a quote that shaped my project from a somewhat unlikely source: The Rav Abraham Isaac Kook, the spiritual father of the Religious Zionist movement. While Rav Kook and I don't always see eye-to-eye on most issues, his statement "There is no such thing as the unholy, only the holy and the not-yet holy" really speaks to me.

This perspective allows for people – in fact it charges people – to connect to the world as if every opportunity for interaction is sacred, creating a certain level of mindfulness of the world around us, and subsequently an imperative to act according to that mindfulness. Seeing the holiness in people helps to break down artificially created barriers and walls between each other. Decreasing unnecessary ignorance and bias and seeing the holiness in the world around us impels us to true environmental stewardship, making sure the world we leave to our children is better than the one we inherited. Most importantly, this perspective shows us that our conversations with God must be both horizontal and vertical - that holiness can be attained in many ways outside of just prayer.

As your rabbinical intern, I hope to help you find the holiness in our interactions, in your interactions with each other, and in your interactions with the world around you. Having grown up in this community, and having become a bar mitzvah here, it is especially exciting for me to return home and continue to help this community grow, learn, and pray. I most look forward to learning with you, laughing with you, eating with you – there is nothing more paradigmatically Jewish than food – and growing with you as a nascent Jewish leader. As you may have heard, I have a particular passion and penchant for expressing my Judaism through social justice work, so I am excited to help the work that your community is already doing, and am impressed with what I've already heard about. Part of my role this summer will be helping to continue the work you are doing, and seeking to cultivate new opportunities within our community. I hope that even in our brief time together, we motivate each other to seek methods of holiness that enlighten us, challenge us, and cause us to become more thoughtful and caring people.

INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



Once again, we come to the conclusion of a temple "season," which stretches from September to June. For clergy, July and August are reserved for vacation times and preparation for the High Holidays.

For clergy, the summer is, typically, the time for the "refresher course" of various forms of rest and relaxation. These

may involve travel, continuing education or the restorative power of time spent in contemplation, meditation and/or physical, emotional and intellectual assessment. Some of us are able to combine any and all of those considerations concurrently, in the form of travel.

I usually take the summer weeks of July to travel. My travel is often involved in both recreation and educational advancement. My lecture series, "The Wandering Jew," is a result of my visiting myriad Jewish communities around the world. Interacting with Jews and the living history of other countries, cultures and languages has always been, for me, a most rewarding and edifying experience.

My significant other, Nani Devi, has accompanied me on many of these sojourns over the past 15 years. Being of Indonesian, traditional Hindu and Buddhist upbringing, and later embracing Catholicism, she has found these travels a great addition to her religious and world perspective.

This July, we will visit Vienna for an extended stay, with the goal of not only enjoying all of the wonderful cultural offerings of this musical center of the Western world, but also exploring the unique Jewish Ghetto of Vienna. I hope to report on this upcoming "wandering" in my lecture series in the coming year. Vienna is a city of great contrasts, being, at once, the European city of western enlightenment, music and literature, and the sight of great pain, persecution and destruction of our people who, ironically, were, at the very least, instrumental in the development of all that is distinct about that enlightenment. How sad that so many nations have never learned that to destroy a people and their accomplishments, is to destroy themselves in the process.

I will profoundly consider these and other historical phenomena as I also contemplate my own professional history. This summer, in August, will begin my fortieth year in the professional cantorate. I served my first High Holiday pulpit in 1974, in New York City, for a unique group of congregants who assembled for the holidays, sponsored by the Jewish Chautauqua Society.

That was a formidable and eye opening experience, from which I learned much more than I realized at the time. I was not even a "diamond in the rough;" more like zirconium in my efforts to fulfill what I thought was a role expected of

me, without realizing how much the integrity of my own spiritual emotionality would have more than sufficed to satisfy those gathered. It has taken me these many years to become comfortable in my own cantorial skin, so to speak.

I have felt this comfort with no more satisfaction than my relatively brief tenure here, at Temple B'nai Torah. My efforts here and whatever positive accomplishments achieved have been the culmination of all that has gone before. While there are still, most likely, mistakes left to make, there are still the greater opportunities for growth, change and achievement. Yet, as I advance in years, I more fully realize how challenging it is to maintain the fluid and natural flexibility suffused in youthful endeavor, whether that is physical, emotional, intellectual or professional.

Like my summer travels, I hope that I may be able to combine these aspects together in all my expressions, and that, as I travel on the linear path of time and experience, I may be able to make the journey the shortest distance between two points.

May all of you, at whatever age and place you are in your lives, be able, as well, to enjoy and be enriched by your own travels, and may we all traverse our paths, individually and communally, "chazak v'chazak", from strength to strength. As it says in the Shabbat liturgy of our prayer book, Mishkan T'filah (a sanctuary of prayer), "May these hours of rest and renewal, open our hearts to joy and our minds to truth."

May you enjoy a wonderful, safe and satisfying summer, whatever journey you take, wherever you go, and with whomever you go down that road!

BROTHERHOOD SPEAKS




Our April dinner featured the Men's Seder, conceived by MRJ, organized by Alan Loewenstein and Josh Rest, and led by Cantor Sher.




