The *TBT Jr Players* are pleased to announce that this year's production will be the recent hit, "13" The Musical. The show will be presented in the Temple social hall on **Saturdays**, **December 2**<sup>nd</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 P.M. and Sundays, **December 3**<sup>rd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> at 4:30 P.M.

The *TBT Jr Players* are proud to be entering our 46<sup>th</sup> year at Temple B'nai Torah. We trace our history back to 1971 as the legacy *Suburban Players* and our debut production of Rogers and Hammerstein's *Carousel*. Evolving over time, first into the *Suburban Junior Players* and then the *TBT Jr Players*, we provide an opportunity for the Temple and Community youth to participate in the performing arts. Our recent productions include *Annie; Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat; Suessical; You're a Good Man Charlie Brown; Little Shop of Horrors; and* last year's very successful *Guys and Dolls*.

This years' production of "13" will be the first time that it has been performed here at the Temple. The story concerns the life of a 13-year-old boy, Evan Goldman, as he moves from New York City to Appleton, Indiana, and his dilemma when the move conflicts with the celebration of his Bar Mitzvah. Evan must deal with rumors and blackmail if he hopes to make friends and find happiness at his new school. It had been said that "13" resonates with audiences of all



ages as it deals with the hardships of leaving familiar places for unfamiliar ones, fitting in with your peers, and transitioning from youth to adulthood. First staged on Broadway in 2008, "13" launched the careers for Nickelodeon stars Ariana Grande and Elizabeth Gillies.

The cast of the TBT Jr Players is made up of young performers, ages 10 thru 18. They start rehearsals in September, devoting 3 days a week to making sure they put on the best show they can.

The TBT Jr Players are happy to welcome back **Director, Rob Kramer**. Rob is a faculty member at the Long Island High School for the Arts. At LIHSA, Rob has taught Acting Technique, Improvisation, Musical Theater, Creative Dramatics, Theater History, Directing, Cabaret Workshop, Film History and Genre Study to students Grades 6 thru 12. This will be Rob's 3<sup>rd</sup> show with the TBT Junior Players as he has previously directed the highly successful Little Shop of Horrors in 2015, and Guys and Dolls in 2016.

We look forward to you joining us this December. *Proceeds from the performances go to Temple and Temple Stage Fund. Tickets are \$18 for Adults, \$12 for Seniors (55 and over) and Children (12 and under).* Tickets can be purchased on Sunday mornings in the Temple Lobby, by calling 516-557-6288, or on the day of the performance. ### **BLOG FROM ISRAEL**

Over the last months, we in Israel have been witness to injustice in the world of religious freedom, particularly regarding the Western Wall; overseas we watched with anxiety the events of Charlottesville and the ensuing government response. Our gut, our basic understanding of the events, point out serious flaws, and this is good. Leading up to the Tishrei holidays of Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah our Torah brought up the importance of our actions as guided by justice, both in the strict sense and in the spirit of compromise and consideration of extenuating circumstances using righteousness and caring as an equal guide. When we read D'varim 16:20: "Justice, justice shall you pursue, that you may thrive and occupy the land that the Lord your God is giving you", we are reminded of the consequences of our actions in a positive way. By pursuing the good and the straight path, we will thrive.

Our prophets add and expand: Isaiah 32:17: The work of justice is peace; bringing quietness and confidence forever. Micah tells us in simple elegance in chapter 6:8 that justice must be accompanied by lovingkindness *-chesed*—when he says that every human being must "... do justly and to love mercy" as the sum of human duty. The world could not exist if it were governed by strict justice alone—*midat hadin*—and therefore God judges His human children by justice tempered with mercy—*midat harachamim*.

The Babylonia Talmud, Tractate Sanhedrin 32:b emphasizes compromise and the need to go beyond the letter of the law: "One mention of justice refers to decisions based

on strict law, which should be just; the other, to compromises, which should be just. How are compromises worked out? Say, two boats sailing in the same direction meet at a narrow channel of a river. If both attempt to pass side by side, both will sink; but if one is willing to proceed behind the other, both can sail safely. Likewise, two camels meet as they go up the ascent of Beth-horon. If both attempt to go up at the same time, both will fall into the valley below; but if one follows the other, both will go up safely. How should a compromise be worked out? If one is laden and the other not laden, the unladen should give way to the laden..."

When Isaiah proclaim in chapter 52, verse 7: How welcome on the mountain are the footsteps of the herald announcing happiness, heralding good fortune, announcing victory, telling Zion, "Your God is King", we again see the link between government guided by justice and a good life. Our custom of introspection in order to make changes and improvements prior to Rosh Hashana and continuing to Yom Kippur lead us to the joys of Sukkot and Simchat Torah. May this be the formula to keep us strong and upbeat as we dedicate ourselves to making the world a better place for ourselves and our future generations.

### **PACK AND TROOP 189**

Hi everyone!

While you are reading this at the end of September or beginning of October, due to publication realities, I am writing this at the end of August, and our program year hasn't started yet. So, I thought I would take a few minutes to explain to everyone why you should want your son or grandson to join Cub or Boy Scouts.

First, a note: Cub Scouts is a program designed for grades K-5. Boy Scouts is for grades 6-12 (some boys who were Cub Scouts become Boy Scouts in the 5th grade, after earning the Arrow of Light).

So, what are the Aims of Scouting? **The official aims are to Build Character, Learn Citizenship,** and **Develop Personal Fitness.** However, anyone talking about Scouting would be remiss if they failed to point out that the program works at teaching leadership. Many youth programs give opportunities to show leadership, but how many actually teach lessons on the topic? Leadership Development is officially a Method of Boy Scouting, not an aim, but to me, it is kind of both.

So, how do we accomplish this? The Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts use the Methods of Scouting. The Methods are slightly different for each group, as they need to be age-appropriate. Let's start with the ones that are common to both programs.

Living the Ideals: The ideals of Scouting are spelled out in the Scout Oath, Scout Law, Cub Scout Motto (Do Your Best), Boy Scout Motto (Be Prepared), and Boy Scout Slogan (Do a Good Turn Daily). Scouts learn to measure themselves against the ideals and continually improve. Doing so, they gain control over who and what they become.

**Dens (Cub Scouts) and Patrols (Boy Scouts):** Dens and Patrols are supposed to be groups of 6-8 boys, working and playing together. Doing so gives boys the opportunity to develop new skills and interests, and forces them to think about doing their best not just for themselves but for their Den or Patrol. In Boy Scouts, the boys elect their own

patrol leaders, who sit on the Council that runs the Troop, thus providing leadership opportunities at a smaller scale to begin with. Cub Scouts use dens of boys in the same grade, and Boy Scouts use patrols of all ages.

Advancement: Recognition is important to boys. The advancement plan provides fun for the boys, gives them a sense of personal achievement as they earn awards. Cub Scouting also strengthens family understanding as adult family members and den leaders assist the boys, and Boy Scouting develops self-reliance, since at higher ranks, advancement is largely self-motivated.

<u>Uniforms</u>: The uniform makes the Scout unit visible as a force for good and creates a positive youth image in the community. Scouting is an action program, and wearing the uniform is an action that shows each Scout's commitment to the aims and purposes of Scouting. The uniform gives the Scout identity in a world brotherhood of youth who believe in the same ideals. The uniform is practical attire for Scout activities and provides a way for Scouts to wear the awards that show what they have accomplished.

As I look at the word counter, I see I am just about out of room for this month, so I will finish this discussion with the Methods that are unique to each program next month.


