



INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Shalom, Chaverim,

This year, I was elected national Vice President of Advocacy for the Women's Rabbinic Network. The Women's Rabbinic Network (WRN) is a constituent group of the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR). It was created in 1975 by a group of female rabbinic

students to provide the support and advocacy needed in the early years of women in the Reform rabbinate. Since then, the organization has grown to include over 650 women reform rabbis who have been ordained since 1972 at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. The WRN has consistently worked to promote the personal and professional growth of female rabbis and rabbinic students within the Reform Movement.

This is a very exciting time for the WRN. There is much movement in areas of key importance to all clergy, but to women, especially. Thanks to companies like Netflix, Facebook, and others, we see a growing awareness of the necessity for fair parental leave policies for employees of all genders. Salary surveys in the corporate world, and also in our own field, continue to show an enormous discrepancy between the wages of males and females. Our synagogues and other religious institutions/organizations should collectively strive to be a dugma, an example, at the forefront of fair and equitable employment practices.

The Torah teaches us that, "You shall not oppress your neighbor, nor rob him. The wages of a hired worker shall not remain with you until morning." - Leviticus 19:13

Women's rights have come so far in the past few decades, but we still have a long way to go. In the forty-three years of women in the rabbinate, our presence has moved from novel and unique to accepted and commonplace. However, our salaries and benefits behind the scenes do not reflect the equality that we feel more and more on the bimah.

To that end, WRN has been proud to support the recent efforts of Women of Reform Judaism to pass two resolutions at their 2015 Assembly: Resolution on Pay Equity, and Resolution on Paid Family Medical Leave. WRN will be convening a group of rabbinic colleagues to discuss how to amplify these efforts, and how to compassionately guide our communities to effectively address these areas for all Jewish professionals. We also hope to engage partnerships with other affiliate groups in the Reform movement, so that we can all be working together. When we say Tzedek, Tzedek Tirdof, "Justice, justice, shall you pursue," we naturally need to mean it for ourselves as well as for others. One of the highlights of Vice president Joe Biden's address to the URJ Biennial in Orlando included his remarks regarding the Reform Movement. He said that we are always at the front lines of the battle for equal rights, and it just takes the rest of the country a while to catch up with us. Here is another area in which the Reform community can lead the way and pursue justice for all Jewish professionals, and, indeed, for us all.

I look forward to updating you along the way as the effort grows. I know that work in this area can only serve to benefit us all, and to repair the brokenness in the world around us.



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



This year, January 25th marks the annual celebration of the festival of Tu b'Shevat, the New Year of the Trees. While there is no mention of this festival in the Bible, the origins of the holiday may lie in the ancient custom of celebrating the beginning of each season.

According to the Talmud, the fifteenth of Shevat marks the season that comes after winter and before the spring harvest. This date is deemed the 'New Year for the Trees'. The Talmud explains that by this date in Israel, the trees have used up their water supply from last year and begin absorbing the water of the new year. For this reason, fruit produced after this date is considered produce of the coming year for purposes of tithing, and the concept of orlah – when food is set aside for God and prohibited for human consumption. The idea of orlah reminds us that the land belongs to God and not to humans.

There are many ways to celebrate Tu B'Shevat. In some communities, it became a custom to eat fifteen different types of fruit from Israel, especially the seven types of fruit and grain that, according to the Torah, represent the fertility of Israel (Deut 8:8). The Kabbalists, who settled in Safed and Galilee, created a special seder around the festival of Tu b'Shevat. Like the Passover Seder, a set order of eating was established and four cups of wine were consumed. hibernation and exfoliation, and the red wine represented the forthcoming reawakening of nature. The power of the red was anticipated throughout the seder. During the seder, biblical passages pertaining to grains, plants and agriculture were studied. Then, the first glass of white wine was poured. Dates, wheat, olives, and grapes were blessed and eaten one by one, and the glass of white wine was blessed and drunk. Next, the second cup of wine was poured, white with a small portion of red blended in. Four more fruits of Israel - figs, pomegranates, citrons, and apples - were blessed and eaten. The second cup of wine was blessed and drunk. The third cup of wine was half white and half red and the fourth cup was red. Between each cup, more produce from Israel was blessed and consumed. The Kabbalists identified with the fertility of the land of Israel, and celebrated its life-giving forces through its produce.

In the religious school, we follow a very similar seder, of course, exchanging the wine for juice. The students love to experience the change of seasons through their changing colored juice and produce that they eat throughout our Tu B'Shevat Seder. It is a special seder that helps our students identify with nature and the land of Israel.

May we take the time to appreciate the beauty and bounty of Israel, and be grateful for the bounty in our own lives.

From the TEMPLE B'NAI TORAH BOARD MEETING MINUTES October 27, 2015

Meeting called to order at 7:15 pm by President Robert Saunders

D'var Torah – Rabbi Bellows led the opening prayer and shared "Praying Is Like Playing Jazz" by Rabbi Levi Weiman-Kelman.

Secretary's Report –Sharon Curry - Correspondence read. Correction from last month's minutes: Harvey Wiener is VP of Long Range Planning and Budget.

New Business – Helaine Schnall raised a motion on behalf of the membership committee. Right now, K-2 families have all the rights of members except for voting and High Holiday attendance.

Motion: Beginning July 1, 2016 we extend all rights and privileges of membership to families with children enrolled in K-2. They will continue to pay the non-member rate for Hebrew school until their oldest child reaches 3rd grade. Ben Cernese seconds the motion.

Discussion ensued. It is clarified that they will have privileges of voting and of attendance on High Holidays. The year that they enroll their first child in Hebrew school they would be members and it would be their first free year in the arms that provide this to new members. The concept is that they pay for religious school and receive free membership. Motion passed with one opposed and one abstention, all others in favor.

President's Report – Rob Saunders – Congratulations to Rabbi Bellows on her pregnancy. The alarm password was shared with the board in case the alarm goes off when board members are at the temple.

Vice Presidents' Reports –. Jan Friedman reported that non-members have raised more than \$7000 for the temple for the non-member Yiskor donations and community tickets for the High Holidays. Sue-Ellen Pennington reported in the absence of Brian Levy that the Billy Joel concert raised \$3890.50.

Learning - Helaine Schnall - Report Stands.

House and Administration – Tessa Kean – Report stands. Please enter the parking lot from Oakfield and exit to Jerusalem. Many people after services are going the wrong way. In addition, people are parking in areas that are not designated parking spots or not pulling all the way in which is blocking cars. We will be following up on monitoring the parking lot on busy mornings. The Handicap spots are hard to see and need re-painting. Sue-Ellen Pennington reported that the cost of repainting the lines in the lot would be \$1250.00 if we choose to do it.

Spirituality: Janee Loewenstein –Jan Friedman added a request to please make sure that we have people at the door to welcome congregants when we have services.

Membership – Helaine Schnall –The idea of a community bulletin board or a central place for "Help Wanted" volunteer opportunities at the temple was raised. Membership committee will be discussing this further, but it would be great to have a place for this, especially for members who would like to participate in one-time or short-term volunteer opportunities. If you have any ideas to help get this running that would be great. Also, it was discussed that New Member Shabbat Service was poorly attended due to a storm. January 8th we will do it again at the Family Service.

Financial Secretary Report – Alan Loewenstein – Report stands. We have a total of 453 members, with 134 full paying members (down three from last month), 165 Chai members (down two from last month), 76 people on special arrangement. Anyone who needs special arrangements should contact Alan Loewenstein.

Investments Report – Alan Loewenstein - Report stands. We had great results last month with a couple of extra dividends.

BINGO/Gift Certificates/Purchasing Report – Rita Hofer –. Thanks to Barbara Gouveia for helping with purchasing. We lost nothing to the closing of Waldbaums -- thanks to Tessa Kean for your help with that. We will be carrying North Shore Farms gift certificates. About one-third of our members participate in the gift certificate program. Temple Emmanuel did close their Thursday night game and will re-open on Tuesday. Bingo has been packed and regular workers are needed. The custodians have been terrific.

Minyan Committee - Tessa Kean – Marc Herbert, Tessa Kean, and Rabbi Bellows have been doing Minyans this month. We are adding more English and both we and the congregants seem to be enjoying that. We need shivah minyan leaders, please join us if you can.

What happens in Vegas stays in Vegas. What happens in Biennial goes right back to the congregation and even to the world.

Biennial, a convocation of 5,000 Reform Jews, is a learning opportunity for all who attend. This year, fourteen of our congregants and clergy and educators flew to Orlando to vote for resolutions (Newsday had the result of the resolution on fair treatment of our transgender population), to study torah with scholars, to learn about people to whom we are connecting with at the URJ (Union of Reform Judaism) who will be helping us with our staffing needs, to sing (and to dance with the Torah showing our joy on Shabbat) and to pray, and to hear people such as Rabbi Rick Jacobs, the current leader of the URJ, Ambassador Rabbi David Saperstein, a man who has worked tirelessly to repair the world, and Vice-President Joseph Biden who discussed our government's relationship with Israel.

We all attended workshops on interpreting torah, on improving membership, on creating a pipeline of educated lay leaders, on interim rabbis and healing the congregation when rabbis change, on securing rabbis educated to serve congregations, on clergy transition, and other topics. We received some timely information and made some valuable connections that will assist us in the coming months as we prepare for our clergy transition.

We experienced Sabbath services and were truly amazed at the singing which was an essential part of the service. Five thousand Jews were singing as one. They were singing uplifting melodies. Imagine 5,000 people chanting a line of torah as one. Imagine 5000 people coming up for aliyahs at different times.

More importantly, we learned that our temple is part of a major movement in Judaism. We suffer the same problems and rejoice in the same successes as other congregations. I am certain all who attended experienced a sense of forward motion and learned that the URJ will be guiding us on our journey ahead. May we all be able to attend the next Biennial in Boston in December 2017.






TRADITION!






