Meeting called to order by President Sherrill Spatz at 8:06PM

**Blessings** / *D'var Torah* – Rabbi Bellows –Focus on Leadership Development: The Rabbi shared an article on <u>*Tzimtzum*</u>: <u>Finding the Space to Lead</u> by Steven Wernick.

**Rabbi Bellows' Report** – Wishing everyone *moadim l'simcha*! Thank you to everyone who helped out with High Holy Days. This was the 5<sup>th</sup> year of High Holy Days of having the honor of sharing the bima with Cantor Sher. School has started and the Rabbi has been spending time with the students in the Sukkah. This Friday night is Consecration and *Siddurim* presentation. Looking forward to this as well as *Rosh Chodesh* with Sisterhood and the UJA breakfast honoring Rob Saunders. There is a change in Shabbat service credit procedure.

Cantor Sher's Report –Discussion ensued regarding the role of the Caring Committee.

**Elisa Blank's Report** –There are currently 249 children in the school, with 34 being consecrated this Friday. This Sunday is Meet-the-Teacher Day and the Hebrew School Book Fair.

Treasurer's Report – Beth Cohen – June financials are complete.

**Temple Administrator Report** – Sue-Ellen Pennington – The apron to the entrance of the parking lot will be repaired beginning September 30. During that time this entrance cannot be used.

**Financial Secretary Report** – Alan Lazarus – 491 members, although an updated count is needed. Numbers of members on special arrangements noted. 39 new members.

**Investments Report** – Alan Loewenstein –Discussion of whether the Slomin Fund can be transferred. Some corrections were made regarding the wording of replacement on the committee. Discussed laddering of committee members. Rabbi Bellows raised the issue of the possible role of ethical considerations on our investments. Motion to amend the document to include laddering from the outset. Alan Lazarus made the motion, Ed Kliegman 2nd: "Motion to amend the document to say that the terms of membership will be laddered 1, 2, & 3 years for the first year. Unanimous vote. Motion passed.

**President's Report** – Sherrill Spatz – The high holidays were great. The Pass It Forward program is doing really well. Next meeting there will be a lesson on how to be a Bima Rep.

### Vice President's Reports:

**Rob and Craig/Community and Fund Raising:** Power in numbers. If you know anyone who is experienced with fundraising or grant writing please let Craig know. Discussed the possibility of connecting fundraising with special arrangements. 'Dancing Through The Decades' is October 19<sup>th</sup>. Very successful New Members Breakfast. Robin and Julia made sure that everyone received an individual mailing and got a big return. Brotherhood Breakfast was a wonderful place to do it. The two co-chairs of membership have a lot of energy and motivation. They have a lot of ideas and will work throughout the year on next year's campaign.

## **INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI**



Shalom, Chaverim - Hello, friends,

This month, I am very excited to be joining at least 12 of our staff and congregants at the Union of Reform Judaism Biennial. As the name suggests, this is a major Reform Jewish convention that takes place every two years. From Wednesday through Sunday, December 11-15, more than 5,000 Reform Jewish

teens, lay leaders, and professionals join together to learn, pray, network, and schmooze. This year's Biennial is taking place in San Diego, California, and it promises to be one of the best yet.

Two years ago, 23 members and staff attended the Biennial in Washington, D.C. Highlights of the convention included the start of a new Campaign for Youth Engagement, the installation of new leadership (including Rabbi Rick Jacobs as the president of the URJ), and an afternoon with President Barack Obama. Many dozens of workshops were offered each day (I even had the honor of leading a few about how to use Twitter and Facebook in congregationlife). Multiple worship experiences were available every morning and evening.

Some of the sweetest moments at Biennial surround the observance of Shabbat. Can you imagine praying in a room with 5,000 other Jews? These are people who LOVE Judaism, who LOVE being involved in their communities, and who LOVE enhancing the role that Judaism plays in their lives. The feeling is indescribable. We sang, danced, clapped, swayed, and prayed as one. We welcomed the Shabbat bride, took a collective deep breath together, and were carried along the waves of music and spirit. Personally, it was quite special to pray alongside members of our TBT community, rather than in front of them on the bimah. We were able to put our arms around each other and sing, and I treasured each moment with the wonderful people from home.

We also dined together in what was possibly the largest Shabbat dinner in the history of the world. Though we had to nourish our bodies, we couldn't wait to further nourish our souls at the evening's song session. Cantors, rabbis, song leaders, and musicians from all over the movement took to the stage and led us in a huge singing event. We sang classic liturgy, favorite camp songs, and even "Sweet Caroline ("So good, so good, so good!")."

There was even another song session after the song session (that's how much we Reform Jews like to sing) but most folks went to bed. Shabbat morning began with torah study sessions, followed by a large Shabbat morning worship service. Many attendees opted to sing in the Biennial Choir – quite a treat for us all! Study lunches followed, then more learning and, after dinner, a Havdallah concert by Israeli

superstars, David Broza and Rami Kleinstein. Though Shabbat at Biennial is not usually the most restful, it is always inspiring.

I look forward to bringing back reports from this year's adventures in Biennial. I will join with our fellow staff and congregants in sharing with you what we learn, what inspires us, and what will work to make our community even stronger. And I hope you will consider joining us in two years in Orlando!

## INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



As we approach the secular New Year, traditionally, we think about reparation we can make, redemption we can seek, and our all too challenging and formidable resolutions, often made with the best of intentions -- often discarded with regrets. We struggle with the thought of reprioritizing our lives, if only a cerebral and ephemeral exercise in ultimate futility.

But it doesn't have to be that way, especially if we economize on our expectations. For example.....

The next time you walk by or into the sanctuary, you might notice two distinctive paintings of two distinguished former clergy that hang together on the wall immediately adjacent to the sanctuary doors. Closest to the entrance is Rabbi Robert Raab, the beloved emeritus rabbi of legacy Suburban Temple. Next to him is Cantor Walter Lewis, the



beloved first cantor of legacy Suburban Temple. It is Cantor Lewis that I want to focus on in the context of this article.

Under this vibrant oil representation of an obviously strikingly handsome man, the memorial plaque displays, "He gave so much to the congregation he loved." I was struck by these words more than by the handsome and visibly well appointed stature,


so telling, before me. I have been told by numerous older members, who knew Cantor Lewis, many wonderful and colorful anecdotes of his life and his relationships. I am told he was also blessed with a beautiful voice and a charismatic presence which, obviously, left its mark.

Today, there is little by which to remember him besides the warm and treasured memories of his career, and his oil portrait which still looms large outside the sacred performance space that was his spiritual and professional home....with the exception of the Cantor Walter Lewis Fund.

The Cantor Walter Lewis Fund, dedicated and created in his memory, could also loom large, if only we were willing to allow it so. This fund could provide financial support for any of the many and varied music related activities here at Temple B'nai Torah. Yet, the knowledge of the fund, like the memory of Cantor Lewis, is limited. However, while we cannot expand on Cantor Lewis's memories, we CAN expand on our ability to help support those kinds of programs that Cantor Lewis would have loved.

I write about this fund and the man who inspired it so that, yet, perhaps a new generation, as well as the older one, will help keep his spirit alive by keeping the musical life of our community alive and, subsequently, helping to perpetuate that which sustains the passion of our tradition. Please help to preserve that passion, by giving whatever you can, whenever you can, to the Cantor Walter Lewis Fund.

## NURSERY SCHOOL REPORT

The beginning of this school year was hectic due to the early holidays, but we celebrated each one as it should be...apples and honey for Rosh Hashanah, making *shofars*, talking about things that we need to improve, Shabbat in the *sukkah* and, of course, edible torahs. In addition to our regular academic curriculum, we are

squeezing in preparations for Thanksgiving and Chanukah. The children are starting to learn the songs that they will sing at our Chanukah show. They enjoy their time with both the rabbi and the cantor. The children are very busy and having a ball. But that is not what I am choosing to write this article about. I ran into a parent whose child left us to go to universal (free) pre-K. She told me how she wished that she could have stayed with us. She proceeded to tell me that academically the four year old is learning what we taught to our three year olds. More importantly, she told me how much she missed being part of a "family". Of all the things that we accomplish during the year this is what makes me proudest. Any teacher can teach letters, colors, holidays, but it takes a special school to make the children and the parents feel at home. A safe place where their child will grow socially and academically, where the teachers will always take time to discuss your concerns and will report anything special that your child accomplished. When I talk to a family that is interested in enrolling that is what I tell them. So the next time someone says, "But your school is so small", my answer will be, "In a big school will the teacher call if she heard that someone in your family is ill?

In a big school do the teachers have the time to sit and talk with every child? At other temples when the children who have graduated see their nursery school teachers, do they get a big hello, and sometimes a hug?" Maybe they do, but I do know that when our teachers are here for services, we get LOTS of hugs. Most of the families that send their children to nursery school, and join a temple, do choose to join Temple B'Nai Torah. So if you know of any families that are looking for a nursery school, please keep us in mind. We may be small, but we have so much love to offer. Isn't that most important when you are dealing with young children?


