INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Shalom, Chaverim – Hello, friends,

Do you believe in "love at first sight?" Do you think Judaism does? At the very end of October, we read a beautiful love story that seems to contain an instance of this kind of love – please allow me share it with you.

Parashat Chayei Sarah (Genesis 23:1-25:18) begins with the death

of Abraham's beloved wife, Sarah. Following her burial, Abraham decides it is time for Isaac to get married. Thus, Abraham sends a servant to his native land, the land of Haran. The servant reached the town's wells at evening time. He made his camels kneel down as he waited for the women to come to draw water. The servant offered the following prayer:

"Here I stand by the spring as the daughters of the townsmen come out to draw water. Let the maiden to whom I say, "Please lower your jar that I may drink," and who replies, "Drink, and I will also water your camels" – let her be the one whom You have decreed for Your servant Isaac. Thereby shall I know that You have dealt graciously with my master."

Now, the servant had barely finished, when Rebekah approached. She went down to the spring and filled her jar. When she came back up to where the servant was, he asked for a drink, and she responded, "Drink. I will also draw for your camels until they finish drinking."

Rebekah invites the servant back to the house to meet her father, Bethuel, and her brother, Laban. Abraham's servant shares the entire tale with the whole family, and when he finishes, Laban and Bethuel declare that he may take Rebekah to Isaac, yet only in ten more days. The servant explains that he really must hasten back to Abraham, at which point the family says, essentially, "Well, ask her what she wants to do." (Such respect for her own needs!!) The family asks her, "Will you go with this man?" and she replies, "I will."

Rebekah travels back with the servant to Canaan. Toward evening, Isaac went out walking in the field. When he looked up, he saw camels approaching. Looking up, Rebekah saw Isaac. She got off her own camel – some even say that she fell off, she was so in love! She said to the servant, "Who is that man walking in the field toward us?" "That is my master," the servant replied. Isaac immediately fell in love with her, then brought Rebekah into the tent of his mother, Sarah.

So, was it love at first sight? What do you think was God's role in the "shidduch?" I leave that up to you to determine. When I imagine the scene in my sometimes melodramatic way, I picture the silhouettes of Rebekah on her camel, and Isaac standing before her in a field, and the

sun setting behind them. In one moment they both look up (just like a soap opera!!), and you can almost feel their hearts skipping a beat at the sight of the other. Besides, throughout the rest of their story, it does seem as if they truly love each other, particularly when you consider that Isaac is the only one of the three patriarchs who remains monogamous.

Beyond the idea of monogamy and love, there is so much more to learn from Rebekah. We read that what makes her especially beautiful is her hospitality (she invites the servant back to her house without hesitation), and her kindness (not only does she allow the servant to drink, but she provides water for the camels until they finish drinking). We see an incredibly generous act here – allowing camels to drink until they are done could easily be at least 14 gallons. and the text tells us that there were 10 camels altogether. This demonstrates a very high level of kindness towards animals.

Understanding this metaphorically, we learn that, even when something is difficult, we need to go all the way and complete the task. Once we commit to an action, project, or deed of any kind, we should finish it. Walking back and forth to a spring and filling a small water jug 140 times is inspirational. Rarely do we find ourselves up to such a task. But Rebekah stands before us in our tradition, begging us to live up to our potentials and our expectations. We deserve to be our best, and others deserve to receive our best. Just as Rebekah was beautiful because of her innate goodness, so we are more beautiful when these inner qualities shine through.

Let us all learn from Rebekah. Let us make this a month filled with inner beauty, kindness, generosity, commitment, and humility. May we find something beautiful about every person in our lives, and appreciate the love for friends and family that fills our days.

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INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



Let's imagine a conversation between an imaginary congregant, Dr. Yoni Ploni, with our imaginary cantor, Chazzan Evets Rehs. Imagine the conversation going something like this:

Dr. Ploni (upon meeting Cantor Rehs just after Yom Kippur N'ilah services): Cantor Rhes, I'm very upset that you not

only had water on the bima, but also actively drank from the cup! I'm personally offended at such a flagrant display of disregard for those of us who maintain the integrity and piety of our High Holiday Days!

Cantor Rehs (rather mortified to be accosted in such a manner): Thank you, Dr. Ploni; and, to you, as well, a happy, healthy and fortunate New Year! I can see that the intensity of your inquiry even supersedes your sense of dignity, respect and thoughtfulness. It must be very important!

Dr. Ploni: Um....ugh, oh yes, Happy New Year to you, as well.....nu? What about it? How can you chug down water when your congregants are choosing to deny themselves the creature comforts of living in order to sincerely repent for their yearly transgressions?

Cantor Rehs: Dr. Ploni, you may not be aware, but many of the most lofty and highly respected of our teachings and commentary emphasize the concept of choosing life over all else, especially those traditional and ancient rituals by which many define themselves, as Jews. The Talmud, the Mishnah, and other of our most important tractates mandate that we "Choose life!" Knowing our tradition, will surely enlighten us to do the right thing in any situation that challenges our ritual priorities. Of course, Dr. Ploni, I know that you are well aware of this edict that defines us as Jews and prioritizes our welfare, especially in concerns over our physical well-being.

Dr. Ploni: But Cantor Rehs, you should be setting an example of maintaining the importance of our High Holiday rituals, whether or not they violate these important *halachic* tenets!

Cantor Rhes: Perhaps I didn't make myself clear. Our tradition teaches us that preserving our health and welfare, even at the sacrifice of certain important ritual practices, takes precedent and is the choice we must make in answering to our Higher Authority. For example, being able to hydrate the vocal chords and throat are necessary to be able to maintain adequate ability to continuously vocalize our sacred texts in a responsible and capable manner, further insuring that our traditional renderings maintain the integrity of the text. There are also chronic maladies that must be considered in being able to achieve this Herculean task, for which we train, long and hard, over many years......

Dr. Ploni (interrupting in earnest)....but what about our

congregants who suffer just such maladies and must remain to deny themselves?

Cantor Rhes (becoming more frustrated, yet maintaining the dignity of his station): Each congregant is mandated to take responsibility for this challenging choice; that is, to say, we must determine, independently of any projected expectation, what is the most responsible decision we can make, with our utmost regard for how this observance will impact upon our own health and welfare. Therefore, as concerned Jews, we must be asking ourselves, "What is the most meaningful observance I can practice, based upon my own integrity and the responsibility I have for, not only my own welfare, but also the welfare of those others to whom I am responsible?" A ritual decision is not made in a vacuum and should not be made based upon what others will think of your practice, but how this practice will enhance and clarify your own beliefs.

Dr. Ploni: Cantor, I think I get it! Are you saying that I should be more concerned about why I practice ritual, not why you don't?

Cantor Rehs: You've got it! The *chrain* in Spain, on the table makes a stain! Yes, ritual observance is a relative phenomenon; we will always find those who will be critical of us for not fulfilling their judgments on what is appropriate. As reform Jews, we distinguish ourselves from others in being free to choose what is meaningful, not for the other guy, but for ourselves, a much greater and more profound responsibility. Always keep in mind, that our lofty ritual aspirations should always be seen in the context of our first and foremost responsibility to our health and well being. Be not one to judge others, or we, ourselves, may be judged harshly by a Higher Authority.

Dr. Ploni: Thank you, Cantor, for your insightful comments. By the way, how come you don't wear a yarmulke???

Cantor Rehs: Oy! Get another question!

I welcome your comments. May you continue to enjoy this New Year!

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

We all know the story of Chanukah. The Maccabees, after triumphing over the Greeks, returned to Jerusalem to dedicate the Temple. There was only enough oil for the menorah to burn for one day, but miraculously it burned for eight days.



There are many other levels, however, on which Chanukah can be

understood. Chanukah occurs at the beginning of winter when the days are shortest. We all feel this transition to the coldest season of the year as the shadows of the night lengthen. Chanukah is our characteristically Jewish response to darkness. At the darkest time of the year, we kindle light. Each night we add one more light until, by the eighth night, the winter gloom is banished in a blaze of light.

The *Sefath Emet*, a Hasidic sage, explained why all the holidays, including Chanukah, are determined by the lunar rather than the solar calendar. To count by the sun requires no act of faith. The sun rises every day. We count our months and determine our holidays by the new moon. When the moon has vanished and the sky is dark, we proclaim our hope for the new month. To look to the future in the darkest moment is an act of faith.

Chanukah is a reminder that in moments of darkness we can always create light. Over and over again I am amazed at how, through acts of loving kindness by the students of Temple B'nai Torah, the faith and light are rekindled in

so many different ways. Our seventh grade students made sandwiches for the INN. Students are always organizing and collecting for those who are in need. In discussions with classes in the Religious School, they suggested that the *tzedakah* we collect in the school go to worthy causes, such as cancer research, diabetes research, sponsoring a terminally ill child to go to camp, as well as to Jewish organizations such as Magen David Adom and the Jewish National Fund. We should all be proud of how the students of Temple B'nai Torah help to rekindle the light of faith.

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

On Sunday, September 29th, I had the pleasure of having breakfast at the temple, which was sponsored by the Temple Brotherhood.


