

INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI

"Celebrating with Bride and Groom"



Shalom, chaverim – Hello, friends,

It is hard to imagine, but later this month, I will be getting married. It has been such a delight to celebrate with you all in so many different ways. I feel that the congregation is my second home, and I am grateful for the way in which you have

all welcomed Seth into the community with open arms. We truly enjoyed the beautiful "Jack and Jill" shower hosted by the synagogue (under the wise direction of Julia Brite) – it felt so special to know that you cared enough to celebrate with us.

Marriage is one of Judaism's highest values. From the beginning, we learn that we are encouraged to have life partners: "It is not good for man to be alone; I shall make for him a fitting helper." (Genesis 2:18) This does not, of course, mean that those who are not married are unable to find happiness (and we all know many people who live incredibly fulfilled lives as a single person). Rather, above and beyond the choice made by any particular individual, Judaism holds up an ideal for humankind which includes marriage.

The name given to marriage reflects this emphasis: *Kiddushin*, from the word *kadosh*, which means "sacred" or "holy." Marriage, in other words, is a sacred union between two people, so holy that it is held up as a metaphor for the eternal bond which links God and the people Israel.

Traditionally, there were three distinct phases to the Jewish wedding ritual. The first was *shidukhin*, "engagement," which was a promise to marry at a later date. The promise could be broken, and neither side could be forced to marry if one changed one's mind. The second phase was *Kiddushin* (or *erusin*), which was a legal act of "betrothal." This could only be broken by death or divorce, and could last as long as a year. The couple, however, did not live together until the final phase – *Nisu'in*, or the "nuptials" themselves. This took place publicly, under a *chuppah*. In medieval times, these last two phases were combined into one ceremony, which is how we typically celebrate today.

Interestingly, the bulk of today's wedding ritual is custom rather than law. According to Jewish law, there are only three things needed to get married: the groom gives something of value to the bride (often a ring), a contract is signed (this is the *ketubah*), and the marriage is consummated. Everything else has been added over the centuries to enhance the beauty of the day. Of the many *mitzvot* related to lifecycle events, "celebrating with bride and groom" is considered one of the most important. Maimonides taught that, even though the Torah doesn't specifically mention this particular *mitzvah*, it falls under the greater umbrella of "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Lev. 19:18). Therefore, it is *as if* it is one of the most important commandments, and fulfills one of these major obligations.

To that end, I hope you will consider celebrating with us one more time, at our *Aufruf* blessing on Friday night, April 19. Seth and I are hosting a special "pre-neg" that evening at 5:45 pm, and then we are honored that Cantor Sher, Rabbi Pasternak, and our congregant, Rabbi Howard Nacht, will be blessing our upcoming wedding on the *bimah* during the Kabbalat Shabbat service at 6:30 pm.

I'm sure that we will feel all the love coming to us on our wedding day, April 28, emanating from the South Shore of Long Island. And know that we are sending love right back!

April is a wonderful month for many programmatic activities here at Temple B'nai Torah. The big news is that the Sheba Ensemble, who delighted us at a Friday evening special musical service in 2011, will reprise their performance on Sunday, April 28th, at 2PM. They will present a gala concert of a variety of selections, both Jewish and secular, ranging from the worlds of classical music to contemporary jazz, to traditional and contemporary popular Jewish pieces. These five women, all classically trained instrumentalists, are not only a wonderful ensemble, but also individual virtuosi in their own right. They will regale us with not only the beautiful sounds of violin, cello, piano, flute and voice, but also the wonderful anecdotes they will delight

in sharing with their audience. And, they are as easy to look at as they are distinguished musicians! We are most grateful to Barbara Held, who is underwriting this event in celebration and memory of her beloved Mort. I am, indeed, appreciative of her generosity. This event is free and open to the public.

My new adult education series, "The Wandering Jew," continues on April 7th, with the Jews of Taipei, Taiwan. A unique, mostly ex-patriate community in the heart of this bustling metropolis, you will find their lives and lifestyles most engaging. I will share with you, in photo and story, among many anecdotes, my very special experience leading Jewish music in a Chinese school! My last session of this series, about the Jews of Malta, will be held on Sunday, May 5th; I will elaborate on this in the May bulletin.

April is also the month for my annual "Adventures in Jewish Music" series. This year, I have an extraordinary array of personalities who will visit us on 4 Monday afternoons at noon:

On April 8th, join us for an afternoon with Father Paul Mayer, author, speaker, Jewish Holocaust survivor, provocateur, Catholic Priest and spiritualist. Hear him explain how a German Jewish survivor became a Catholic priest and still maintains his Jewish identity! Father Mayer is, indeed, a fascinating teller of stories who will mesmerize you with his real life anecdotes.

On April 15th, we welcome Dr. Joel Hoffman, iconoclast, teacher, scholar, linguist and world authority on the musical language of the Torah. I had the opportunity to work with Dr. Hoffman in my former congregation. He is, to say the least, a commanding presence!

On April 22nd, you will enjoy the haunting and beautiful sounds of Pastor Rene Sahir. Pastor Sahir, a Methodist minister to the Indonesian Christian community, is an accomplished classical guitarist and composer, who will delight us with his interpretations of our own familiar biblical liturgy.

On April 29th, Naomi Zeitlin, singer, performer, cabaret artist, and raconteur, will regale us with her wonderful renderings of the great repertoire of the American Songbook and the great American Jewish popular musical legacy of the 20th century and a bit of the 21st!

All these programs and more await your patronage for this exciting month of programming for April. There is something for every taste! With the advent of spring comes the sweet sounds of our people in the many manifestations of our tradition.

So many things to talk about with the arrival of April: the baseball season, the Masters (and golf in general), and, for the accountants among us, the end of the income tax return season. This April, Temple B'nai Torah has some things going on as well. On April 7, at 7 pm, there will be a service to commemorate *Yom Ha-Shoah* (Holocaust Remembrance). While no formal services are being held for these three holidays, they are, nonetheless, dates of which we should all be aware.

On a more local level, the Israeli Bond Breakfast will be held on April 28, at 10 am, and this year, we are honoring Rabbi Deanna Pasternak, and her husband, Andrew. Rabbi Pasternak is the long-serving director of religious education at TBT, and she is retiring at the end of this school year after more than 35 years as a *morah*, while Andy has also been a long-time teacher in our school. I know that we all wish them both well in their future endeavors. Looking forward to May, we will celebrate Shavuot (the receiving of the Torah), with services on May 14 and 15, and on the following Friday night, May 17, our high school seniors will celebrate their Confirmation, the culmination of their years of study and hard work. We should all show our support for these young people who have made a commitment to Judaism and Jewish learning by attending this service.

You've heard of them. Sisterhood has been offering them for sale. But, do you know what they are?



"It's that time of year again- kazoo time." Every year, our 6th/7th grade teacher, Emily Altman, calls me shortly before Purim with those words. What they refer to is a small but fun tradition that we have developed in the religious school for the 5th-7th grades. The tradition is a "kazoo concert" that we do during song session time in the school. Teachers and students play the kazoos interspersed with the singing of zany Purim songs. The tradition is also that I act offended by such noise and irreverence and then join in wholeheartedly. The reality is that I love it. This year, Rabbi Bellows heard the concert from her office and came in and took a picture of Jewish students having fun in religious school which she posted on TBT's Facebook page for everyone to enjoy.

We had a wonderful joint program with the PTA for Tu B'Shevat. The PTA had the children do beautiful Tu B'Shevat wall hangings with the leaves decorated by the children in grades K-6, as well as parents and other special persons who were visiting the K-2nd grade classes that day. These wall hangings will be displayed in the school wing. We also had a prayer service incorporating Tu B'Shevat readings and songs led by Rabbi Bellows and David Berkowitz, library time with stories about the environment and trees, and Jewish Studies workshops led by the teachers about the holiday.

There is another tradition that we have developed over the last few years. Once a year, our Performing Dance groups, led by Mrs. Edith Jason, and our Youth/Teen choirs, led by Cantor Sher, visit a senior citizen's facility where they perform for the residents. The children learn that sharing their talents and visiting the facility brings happiness to the residents. They also have fun preparing for this visit.

In our school, having fun is a synonym for engagement of the children with Judaism's traditions and values, and we strive to make it part of their religious school experiences in numerous ways throughout the year.

The school is now preparing (with the PTA) for our model Passover seders, and for Yom Ha-Shoah and Yom Ha-Atzma'ut programs. Our goal, as always, is not just academic learning, but active student participation.

We approach the holiday of freedom, Pesach, and remember that "we" were slaves in Egypt. All of the rituals are meant to remind us of the value of freedom, of the commandment to treat the stranger well, never to enslave another. As Hillel said, "Do not do unto others what is hateful to you."

Pesach 5773 (2013), and we are still waiting for our religious freedom as Reform Jews in Israel. In a great flurry of bureaucracy, we attempted to submit a retroactive request for salaries for those of us who fit the title "rabbis of non-Orthodox rural communities". The Ministry of Culture issued strict criteria, far removed from the standards for funding Orthodox rabbis. Among other things, only full-time rabbis are entitled to a salary. Ironically, due to the lack of funds, I have been on a half-time salary all these years. Therefore, I didn't qualify for 2012. That was remedied by changing my contract to full-time, so that I would be eligible for a salary for 2013. In the meantime, with the guidance of the Israel Religious Action Center, we have again turned to the Supreme Court of Israel, asking that the full-time position requirement be rescinded.

As far as I know, two liberal communities, both led by men, have had their requests accepted. One rabbi is at Hannaton, the Conservative Movement kibbutz in the lower Galilee. The other is not a rabbi, but leads a group at Moshav Nahalal. This is a positive beginning, and we will continue fighting until we receive salaries for the regional rabbis who are working part-time. An unknown factor concerns the incoming Minister of Culture and Sport. No one knows who will be appointed, and at this time there is no government yet formed after the elections. The coalition-building process is still underway. We can only hope that an enlightened person will fill the position. It is time that the Government of Israel recognizes the streams of Judaism, and understands that Judaism will be strengthened by the streams of the Reform, the Masorti and any other legitimate body that represents Jews and their worship practice.

Most recently, I learned of the "secular rabbis" in Israel, who have a school and a movement that relates to Judaism culturally. Will they be eligible for salaries? Time will tell.

In the meantime, we continue to nurture our congregation, Kehilat Birkat Shalom. With the small but steady strides forward, we were offered some government funding towards a modest, but much larger, pre-fabricated building to house our community. We are now in the process of raising the necessary funds to make this offer a reality.

Rabbi Miri Gold, of Kehilat Birkat Shalom at Kibbutz Gezer, petitioned the Israel Supreme Court in 2005, demanding recognition as the rabbi of her community. While the Attorney General declared that rabbis of non-Orthodox communities in Israel are entitled to a salary, the decision has not yet been carried out.
