### INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI

Confirmation: What's it all About?

Shalom, Chaverim - Hello, friends,

I hope you are having a lovely spring. This time of year brings a special ceremony to our congregation, but

many of you may not know what it means or what it entails. On Friday night, May 17, six students in our tenth-grade class will be "Confirmed." They will be leading the Shabbat service, surrounded by family and friends. They will read from the Torah and the Haftarah, and we will shower them with accolades and Mazel Tovs. Yet, many of our students do not continue until this important ceremony, and many of them drop out of religious school following their Bar/Bat Mitzvah celebrations. Consequently, they miss out on intensive, personalized years of learning.

Confirmation began in the mid-1800s in Germany in early Reform Jewish communities. These leaders believed that a 16-year-old was better equipped to confirm his/her Jewish identity than a 13-year-old. Additionally, Bat Mitzvah did not yet exist as a ritual for Jewish girls, so Confirmation allowed for an egalitarian celebration of Jewish youth. The first confirmation ceremony in the United States took place in 1846. Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise officiated over this confirmation service in a Reform temple in Albany, New York. By the end of the 19th century, the ceremony had become widespread in Reform communities.

Eventually, Bat Mitzvah (now celebrating its 90th anniversary) was created, and Bar/Bat Mitzvah celebrations were reintroduced into Reform congregations. Confirmation remained as the next milestone along the Jewish learning timeline. Here at Temple B'nai Torah, Confirmation is celebrated at the end of 10th grade, and then we have another celebration for our 12th graders who are graduating from Hebrew High School.

An important component of the curriculum involves encouraging the students to develop their own opinions about current events, hot topics, and controversial subjects — all while viewing them through a Jewish lens. We examine issues such as gun control, abortion rights, discrimination, sexuality and relationships, body image, wellness, and more. I am honored to teach both the 9th and 10th graders in our religious school, and to guide them through these important discussions.

Whereas Bar and Bat Mitzvah ceremonies focus on an individual child becoming a Jewish adult, Confirmation ceremonies focus on a community of young adults confirming their commitment to Judaism and Jewish living. Reform leaders drew a parallel between the Jewish people's acceptance of the Torah at Mount Sinai, and Jewish confirmation students accepting the role of Judaism in their lives. Thus, it has become customary to hold confirmation services close to the celebration of Shavuot, which celebrates the anniversary of receiving the Torah. The graduating class stands in front of the ark, just as the Israelites once stood at Mount Sinai.

I hope you will consider joining us on Friday, May 17, for this moving and special service. I also hope you will remind your children or grandchildren that Jewish learning does not end at Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Rather, there is so much more exciting learning to come!

I conclude my series at 1 pm, in the Kiddush Lounge. Next year, I will continue with Jewish journeys around the world, including Belize, Malta, Greece and Tunisia. We are fortunate to present a very special Sunday afternoon program with the highly acclaimed dancer and author, Judith Brin Ingber. A world-recognized authority on, and performer of, Jewish dance, Judith will present a special, multi-media program, highlighting her latest book, "Seeing Israeli and Jewish Dance." Discover the lively and unusual story of dance in Judaism with Judith's illustrated talk. On Sunday, May 12th, starting at 2 pm, you can even dance some yourself (or watch and tap your feet), and have an opportunity to purchase the only book on this highly specialized subject, a new, richly illustrated "coffee table" creation.

"Using dance as a lens to look at Judaism is something fresh. That's what I love doing when I get audiences to listen to lively stories about dance in Judaism over the ages and to join me in dance. That approach to seeing the life of Judaism through dance is what I do in my new book, Seeing Israeli and Jewish Dance," says dancer/writer Judith Ingber. Judith's book, containing 182 Jewish dance photos, will also be for sale for \$36.00.

After her initial presentation, "All ages will enjoy the easy dancing based on our rich wedding traditions. Every Jewish community is commanded to dance at a wedding, and it doesn't matter whether or not you're a kid or a grandparent! Everyone's obligated---that's why dances are called mitzvah dances; you must! Imagine what an unusual commandment that is---to make sure that the bride is happy at her wedding, we all must dance!" Judith will turn this "obligation" into great fun for her audiences, who will learn some of the big differences in the dances of several Jewish communities world-wide.

Judith has learned the elements of Jewish traditional dances from Europe and from the Middle East and around



the Mediterranean, since she first lived in Israel, where she did field work for the Israel Ethnic Dance Project, assisted the director of Israel's premiere company, the Inbal Dance Theatre, and taught for the Bat Dor Batsheva Dance Society.

First trained in ballet, Judith returns often to Israel and New York for work, and taught for many years as Professor of Dance, in the Department of Theater Arts and Dance at the University of Minnesota. She co-founded *Voices of Sepharad*, a chamber group of musicians/dancers who have toured around the United States, Canada, and Europe for the

past 25 years, appearing on television, in theaters, Jewish Community Centers, churches and synagogues.

Judith was born and raised in Minneapolis, Minnesota, the daughter of Israeli archeologist Howard Brin and the writer and pioneering Jewish poet and liturgist, Ruth Brin. She is married to newly-retired attorney Jerome Ingber, who practiced immigration law in both Israel and Minneapolis. They have two sons, Shai and Noah, and three grandchildren.

Please join us for this outstanding and unusual opportunity to learn about and join in the wonderful world of Jewish dance!

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



So, where is the warm weather? It feels like we are going to go from winter directly into summer, with no springtime to adjust; just a drastic change in temperature. And speaking about change ...

I am sure that many of you have expected to hear about the finalization of the sale of the East building. Every month, I put off the writing of this article (ok, I'll admit that is not my only reason) in the hopes that I can report the good news. Luckily I haven't had, and still don't have, any bad news to report. And some would say that no news is good news. As you might or might not already know, the Attorney General gave us a stamp of "No objection" on our petition to sell the building a few months ago. The petition was then given to a judge in the New York State Supreme Court system. The judge has given us back the petition three times now, with requests for changes, modifications, additions and deletions. This last iteration should be back in the judge's hands, once again, before you read this article. Please let's all pray for the strength and patience to get through this last hurdle. Some finger-crossing might help, too.

Once we do close on the building sale, you will notice some changes to our building. The first will be the overhaul of our parking lot. This repair is necessary and long overdue. With the necessary cash in the bank, we will finally be able to fill the holes and smooth the bumps in our much-used parking area.

Another noticeable change will be stained glass windows in the social hall. The stained glass currently in the East building will be moved and fitted to the existing frames of three of the windows in our social hall. This will provide some improvement to the look and atmosphere of our social hall. There is still much that needs to be done to improve that space, though.

The social hall is not the only part of our building that needs some TLC. The lobby and entrance floors have become an eyesore and a safety hazard. The windows in the entire school wing are old, ugly and inefficient. Our memorial boards, President's Plaques, Tree of Life, and other dedication items still do not recognize and honor those who have died, served and celebrated *simchas* since we became Temple B'nai Torah. And these are just the necessary improvements that are visible to all. There are many more planned repairs and enhancements to our building that are

not directly noticeable. I am sorry to say that the proceeds of the sale of the East Building will not cover them all. To achieve our goal of completing all identified improvements within the next 2 to 3 years, a Capital Campaign is necessary. A capital campaign raises funds through large donations, not through small fundraising events. Your current, former and future leadership are all aware of the steps necessary to achieve these goals which will ensure and solidify our place in the Jewish community.

At this year's Annual Congregation meeting, you will vote to retain the Cantor and accept the terms of his contract, approve the proposed budget for the years 2013 - 2014, accept the amendments to the TBT constitutions presented by the Temple Board, and to support the new slate of Officers and Trustees as proposed by the Nominating Committee. This meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 22 at 7:30 pm. Please try to attend and be an informed and participating part of our community. Hopefully by then the weather will be warmer and I might actually have that good news we are all eagerly awaiting.


As our year is winding down, we still have several exciting events planned: a May Scavenger Hunt, Greenwood Cemetery on June 9th, and a Summer Boat Ride.


