




October 20 Jared Levine


this month, Marcheshvan, noting that we should read it as Mar Cheshvan: it's mar, bitter like the *Maror* at Passover,

because there are no additional celebrations. Most rabbis and clergy I know today appreciate the break after the long High



Holy Day season. But it's not just that this month has less to do that makes it a time worthy of appreciation.

This month comes on the heels of a busy month for us spiritually. We've celebrated the beginning of

BLOG FROM ISRAEL

As the New Year approaches, we are preparing ourselves

to October this year marks the end of the High Holiday season and brings with it the month of Heshvan, which traditionally has no Jewish holidays. In the last few years, the 7th of Heshvan has been designated as Israel-Diaspora Day, a time to celebrate partnership in the wider Jewish world and to make the deep bond between Jewish communities around the globe and between these communities and Israel—a bond that has lasted for thousands of years.



For thousands of years, Jews have lived around the world, scattered across five continents. The relationships among the Jews in each place where they settled, and between these places and the Land of Israel, underwent numerous and diverse changes over the generations. Throughout the centuries, a complex and rich dialogue has been maintained between all Jewish communities, creating a delicate and unique thread that binds Jews living in different parts of the world.

Diaspora Israel Day, which was initiated by project Domim-alike—a joint program of the Israeli Reform movement and the Israeli government, is a holiday celebrating the ongoing connections between Jewish communities worldwide, and the continued sense of peoplehood among them. The festival cherishes thousands of years of united and full Jewish life in different locations around the world.

A "hagada" has been developed to celebrate this day, with both Hebrew and English for all the texts, including readings and songs, recipes and blessings. By going to www.domin-reform.org.il, one can download the tractate. It is also possible to order the hagadot through Domimalike.

Why the 7th of Heshvan? It is said in the Mishna,

Ta'anit, 1:3 that on the third of
Mar-Heshvan,
prayers for the rain
are to be said, but according to Rabban

Gamliel, it should be marked on the 7th of the same month, fifteen days after Sukkot,

in order that the last Israelites might have reached the Euphrates River. From the 7th of Heshvan to Pesach, we ask God to bless us with rain: "Ten tal u'matar livracha או -- -- Grant us dew and rain for a blessing". Our change in attitude, from blessing to plea, reflects the journey that the Jews took to the Holy Temple and back for the Sukkot holiday. The pleas began after they get home, so they can have a safe journey.

We pray for rain in Israel even if we do not live there. We pray that those who made it to Israel have a safe journey to the Diaspora. Such is our interconnectedness. Israel remains a spiritual center, even when we choose, legitimately, to live our Jewish lives outside of Israel.

The Temple B'nai Torah Voice reflects the vibrancy of your lives, and we in Israel are nourished and encouraged by its presence.

I personally will begin a new journey. On December 1st, I begin my Sabbatical, and one year later, on December 1, 2019, I will retire, at the age of 70. My successor is Rabbi Steve Burnstein, a member of Birkat Shalom and a member of Kibbutz Gezer. I trust that our connections will continue even as we make these changes.

the future, more planning is needed to place all of our boards in our building in a respectful


manner.

PACK AND TROOP 189



Hi everyone,

No new pictures yet, so I thought I would talk about Family Scouting, why it happened, and how it is being implemented.

The Boy Scouts of America's

leadership has always operated on the premise that we are to ensure that the Scouting program and learning the values (as stated in the Scout Oath and Law) would be made available to as many youth as possible. BSA has had coed programs for decades and also recognized that because Cub Scouting was designed to be a family oriented program, girls had been attending meetings for years. They also did research



and found that there were a significant number of families that wouldn't consider Scouting for their boys because they were looking for one organization that would accept the entire family.

So, they decided to make it available to girls as well. We implemented accepting girls into Cub Scouts (grades K-5) this past winter and will accept girls into the renamed Scouts BSA program (grades 6-12) starting February, 2019.

In Cub Scouts, packs can choose to be single gender or family packs. Family packs accept boys and girls, but they go into single gender dens. Most of the learning activities are done at the den level and most meetings are den meetings, so they spend most of the time in a single gender environment. Pack 189 is a family pack.

At the Scouts BSA program, boys and girls will be in separate troops. Each will have their own adult and youth leadership and, while they can do some activities together, the bulk of the meetings are separate. When all of the talk about accepting girls started, I thought we would be better



off with coed troops (as is done in many other countries), but I have come around to thinking that single gender troops are better. From the boys' perspective, girls typically mature faster from ages 10-14, which would make them more likely to get selected for leadership roles, inhibiting the boys' leadership

development. From the girls' perspective, while studies have had mixed results about whether single gender is better for boys' learning, the studies are pretty convincing that girls learn better in single gender environments. So both genders benefit in different ways from being separate at the troop-level ages. We will be forming a Girl Scout troop in February.

That is the short version. Anyone who has more questions is welcome to reach out to me or any of the Scout leadership here at Temple B'Nai Torah, including Andrea Sternlieb (Scoutmaster of the boy Troop) and Lee Nevo (Cubmaster of the Pack). Come on down on a Thursday night and see what Scouting can do for your family!




