INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



A Season of Thanks

November has always been and continues to be one of my favorite months of the year. Some of it has to do with the weather, and my preference for a brisk, clear day with a sky of steel blue. Also, November often coincides

with the Hebrew month of Cheshvan. As I discussed in this space last month, Cheshvan is a month without additional holidays on the Jewish calendar allowing us to put to practice what we learned over the High Holy Days. But November, for me, has always been more about what it means to be a part of American culture, rather than Jewish.

As the calendar flips to November, there it is every year, on the fourth Thursday of the month: Thanksgiving. Growing up in a family of immigrants, Thanksgiving represented our opportunity to be Americans like everyone else. Elementary school would get us all ready for it, as each year, another turkey craft would come home in my backpack.



As a kid, I recall waking up to watch the Macy's Parade (I still do) with my brother and sister, and helping my mom and dad cook our big meal (I still do).

We'd eat at the dining room table, which was only ever used on the High Holy Days and Passover. This, to me was a sign of the importance of the day. As a child, Thanksgiving was about family and about being like everyone else on the block and at school.

As an adult and a rabbi, I still love Thanksgiving, though these days my reasons for enjoying the holiday as much as I do are somewhat different. These days, I am appreciative of the opportunity to express gratitude, which we so often don't take the time to do. In our liturgy, three times a day we are supposed to express gratitude to God for our lives, our souls, and God's miracles which we experience. This blessing, found toward the end of the Amidah, is recited on all days of the year. There is not a day that goes by that Jews are not supposed to take a moment in reflective thanks. Every day is an occasion for giving thanks!

This year, however, I am thinking about so much more. I am thinking about the fact that even though our nation seems so divided, I have a suspicion that most people in America, citizen or not, will be sitting down to a family meal of some kind on that Thursday. Studies estimate the number at 85% of Americans who participate in the holiday. These are the kinds of numbers rarely seen, and

which remind us that as much as we disagree, there is still much that we share, and many values we all have in common.

As this month sees us go to the polls for our midterm elections, there is no doubt that what divides us will be

on full display. Let us, therefore, use the occasion of Thanksgiving to remind us of what unites us: namely, a desire to offer thanks to God for the many gifts and blessings we have.



Please join our community at our two opportunities to give thanks at our Interfaith Thanksgiving Services. The East Meadow service will be held at The East Meadow Jewish Center on Prospect Ave on Sunday, November 18th at 8:00pm. The Wantagh service will take place at St. Frances de Chantal on Wednesday, November 21 at 7:00pm. I will be preaching the homily at the Wantagh service and Cantor Timman and our choir will also be participating. I hope you join us for one or both of these opportunities to add a little extra thanks to this season.

INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



An old midrash:

... There was once a great rabbi, who had many students who hung on his every word. One morning, the students were surprised to find their rabbi was not at breakfast. Later on, they were shocked to discover he did not come to the classrooms, either. The students missed

their rabbi and wondered where he was. Finally, they knocked on his door, wondering what had befallen their beloved teacher. The students opened the door and were surprised to find their rabbi, still in his night clothes, sitting up in his bed, a dazed expression on his face. "Rabbi," cried his students, "Are you ill? Where have you been all day?" The rabbi gazed at his students and explained. "This morning, as every morning, I awoke and immediately said the prayer upon arising: I thank you, Eternal...And then I stopped as the words hit me. I thank God? I...thank...God? Students, do you realize what a privilege this is, to commune with the Almighty? I realized the power of this statement! And I have been sitting here pondering the greatness of this ever since!"

Our liturgy, so familiar to us, is filled with prayers of gratitude to the Almighty. We bless, we praise, we thank God continually. It becomes second nature as we chant and



read the "Daily Miracles", the "Bar'chu", Bar'chu and the "Hoda'a" blessings. Many of our prayers begin with the blessing...Baruch Ata Adonai Eloheinu Melech Haolam...

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Ruler of the Universe...

As that ancient and wise rabbi said, what a privilege it is to communicate with the Eternal! Who of us pauses enough to pay attention to our prayers? Who of us connects with the awesomeness of that communication? Who of us continually has an attitude of gratitude? It requires praying and blessing with kavanah, with intention, not only with kevah, by rote.

Thanksgiving gives us an opportunity to reset our focus, to pause and reflect on our deep gratitude for all we have. We could say that it affords us a kayanah moment of gratitude. As we gather with loved ones to celebrate the holiday or meet with neighbors for an interfaith gathering of Thanksgiving, how wonderful it would be to pause long enough to feel a connection with God, to thank and bless and praise with one voice and feel gratitude for all we have!

This month, I am doubly blessed as we celebrate Thanksgiving and then celebrate our TBT lifecycle moment as Rabbi Bar-Nahum and I are installed as the clergy of our congregation. Installation weekend will celebrate our entire congregation, all the gifts we share as a vibrant and caring community. I am filled with an

attitude of gratitude for all my blessings and especially the blessing of my TBT

May an abundance of gratitude fill us all with awe and joy as we celebrate together and give thanks for all our blessings!


We had a very busy October. Our membership dinner was attended by almost 150 women. It was a wonderful night

BLOG FROM ISRAEL

Close to twenty years after being ordained in Jerusalem, I will begin a Sabbatical and leave my position as the rabbi of Kehilat Birkat Shalom at Kibbutz Gezer. On December 1, 2019, I will officially retire at the age of seventy. I will be handing over the reins to Rabbi Steve Burnstein, who is a long-time member of the congregation as well as a member of Kibbutz Gezer.

My decision to become a rabbi was prompted by the recognition that we needed a liberal rabbi to serve our kibbutz community. When our first boys approached

bar mitzvah, they went to the ultra-Orthodox kibbutz and yeshiva down the road from Gezer. Two pioneering girls were driven to Jerusalem to study for their bat mitzvah preparations. I chose to provide "in house" services and therefore decided to go to rabbinic school. At the age of forty-four, with three young children, and the support of my husband David Leichman, and my kibbutz community, I became a student

once again. We affiliated our small synagogue community with the Israeli Reform Movement, defining ourselves as a regional Reform synagogue, open to any and all who wanted an egalitarian and innovative synagogue experience for life-cycle and holiday events.

On the kibbutz, some people took the stance that Birkat Shalom was the synagogue they rarely attended, as opposed to the large number of Israeli Jews who would joke that the synagogue they NEVER went to was Orthodox. Too often, Israelis who did not feel at home in their neighborhood synagogue were throwing the baby out with the bath water. We wanted to offer a warm and welcoming community that celebrated together, supported one another in times of need, and enjoyed holidays and Shabbat together. It is a long journey. Even today, at the end of a bar or bat (still not the norm) service, someone will inevitably approach me to tell me, with surprise in their voice, how much they enjoyed the service, which was a totally new experience for them.

Given the iron grip of the Orthodox establishment on the Knesset, our task is to present viable and attractive alternatives to Israeli Jews who do seek a connection to their heritage. Over the High Holidays in Israel this year, there were sixty-five places in Israel offering Reform Jewish experiences. A year ago, the 100th rabbi was ordained in Jerusalem. Back in 1999, I was the third woman to be ordained in the Reform Movement in Israel and there were approximately fifteen Reform congregations.. Today there are over fifty women who are serving communities.

We've come a long way, but the task is not finished. I am confident that Rabbi Burnstein will bring our congregation onwards and upwards, and I hope that we will continue to cultivate strong bonds with Temple B'nai Torah. Thank you for your support and encouragement.

Rabbi Miri Gold is the founding rabbi of Kehilat Birkat Shalom, a regional Reform congregation located at Kibbutz Gezer between Tel Aviv and Jerusalem.







As of this writing, the Attorney General has approved the land sale of Temple Emanu-El to the Beechwood Organization. Hopefully, by the time you read this article, the sale will have been completed. As large amount of funds is realized from this sale, a long range planning committee will be put into place, not only to manage the funds, but to determine a course of action moving

forward. So much has been done in the last 110+ days; we are moving in the right direction!


