### **INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI**





For many of us, the hardest part about the holiday of Chanukah may be a dispute about how we choose to spell it. Since it's what I remember from my childhood, I happen to prefer (and tend to type by default!) the more anglicized: 'Hanukkah'. Though the items for sale in the Target Hanukkah Section seem to gree with me here at TPT we out for a

agree with me, here at TBT, we opt for a more Hebraic transliteration: Chanukah. Luckily, Jewish tradition allows for what is called a *machloket l'shem shamayyim*, a dispute for the sake of heaven. We can disagree, as long as we do so respectfully, and in an effort to promote our faith and our tradition, not merely to be contrary

or argumentative. No matter how you spell it, the word from which our holiday takes its name is important to understand!

The disagreement over the spelling of this holiday's name may pull some of our attention, but we ought not forget what it is that this holiday commemorates. When we talk about Chanukah, we often remember the story of the oil that lasted for eight days instead of one day. But that oil served an important purpose beyond

frying donuts and potato pancakes. That oil was necessary to rededicate the Temple in Jerusalem. The eternal lights of the menorah signified God's presence in the Temple, just as our eternal light does today in sanctuaries around the



world. And so, it was only after the seven-branched menorah was lit that the Temple was again consecrated to God.

Chanukah means dedication. Dedication means to be committed or designated to a specific purpose. When the Maccabees, after their military victory, rededicated the Temple after the Syrian-Greeks had defiled it, their purpose was to reinstitute the worship of God in that place. They sought to bring the purpose back to the place by ensuring that everything went on as it had before the Greeks had taken over. The Maccabees were dedicated to their cause of rededication!

We know that dedication can have a lot of meaning in our modern lives as well. The notion of dedication has been on my mind a lot lately, especially as we approach the six month mark after the merger. Our congregation has been blessed to have so many who have dedicated their time and efforts to the ongoing success of our new congregation. I am grateful that so many have seen fit to commit their time and effort to the purpose of our congregation. We couldn't do it without you!

Dedication also has a sense of sticking to something, a sense of loyalty. The Maccabees were dedicated to their faith. And, even though they turned out to be imperfect leaders, they fought for the values they held dear. We are also blessed to have so many congregants whose dedication to our congregation has ensured that even though much is new, we are still making decisions based on the values we share.

As we bask in the warm glow of the Chanukiah, let us consider these many notions of dedication, just as we consider the many spellings of this holiday. Let the lights, shining through the darkest time of year, push us to dedicate ourselves to the ongoing work of our community. Let us rededicate ourselves to the project of our new Temple. We may be reaching the six month mark, but there is much to do over the next six months, and then the six after that. Just as the lights increase each day of Chanukah, so may our dedication to our Temple increase!

May your holiday be filled with light, love, and joy! May you and your family have a Happy Chanukah and may we all merit a peaceful New Year.



### **INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR**



Chanukah (there are many English spellings!) is almost here. It begins on the 25th of *Kislev* and ends on the 2nd of the month of *Tevet* (first candle will be on Sunday, December 2nd).

As the nights grow longer and the Chanukah lights increase I am reminded that we can bring light into the darkness

of this world one kind act at a time. So this year during the eight days of Chanukah, I invite you to join me and be part of your own family Chanukah Chesed Challenge. (Lots of my colleagues are introducing this across the country!)

*Chesed* means "kindness", and the idea of the Chanukah Chesed Challenge is to work consciously, every day, to do one act of *chesed*, or kindness, to someone you encounter throughout the day. This act should be something that does not necessarily come easily and automatically to you, something that you probably wouldn't have done in the past. It should be an action, small or large, that feels new and is outside your comfort zone, something that you make a conscious and deliberate choice to do.



What might the Chanukah Chesed Challenge look like for you? The answer, of course, is personal. If you are outgoing, an extrovert, with a tendency to be chatty, smiley and upbeat, it will probably mean something very different to you than if you are quiet or introverted. But a common thread will connect all our efforts with the Chanukah Chesed Challenge: we can all commit to opening our hearts wider, to working harder to notice others, and to reaching out beyond our comfort zone. In the



process, we hope to make ourselves better people and the world a kinder place. If it works for you, make this a

family project this year. Use your imagination!

In the V'ahavta, we are commanded to love God with all our heart, with all our soul, and with all our might. A classmate of mine once asked... But how can we fully love God if we don't love people? And how can our love of either God or people be complete if we don't love the more-than-human would that is surrounding us? In considering these questions, let's feel free to take our personal *chesed* campaign beyond the human world and be kind as well to animals, nature, our air and water.

It might take time to figure out what to do. You may not actually do anything different on the first or the second day, or even the fifth or the sixth. The important thing is to be thinking about it and figuring out what it will be for you.

So, I invite you and your family members, including your children, to join me in the Chanukah Chesed Challenge and to continue our daily kindness practice until the end of Chanukah. Let's see what happens! And feel free to come share your efforts with the rabbis and with me.

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### OUR TBT SISTERHOOD SOURCE



Over the last weekend of October, Louise, Patti, Marlyn and I had the opportunity to attend the 10th WRJ Northeast District Biennial Convention. Whew,

a real mouthful! WRJ, Women of Reform Judaism, is the women's branch of the URJ, Union of Reform Judaism, and the Sisterhood of TBT is part of the Northeast Region.

I was a first-time participant at this event, and enjoyed a very special and unique experience. I met women from all over the Northeast, from Toronto to Staten Island, from Rochester to Oakdale, from Buffalo to Cape Ann and many



places in between, including several New York Metro area Sisterhoods. Interesting, smart, warm, welcoming, creative and remarkable women, who share some of the same successes and struggles as we

do. I met a woman who came from a 120-family member congregation, and has 50 active Sisterhood members. Another woman came from an 850-member congregation, and was only able to find 10 women to be on her Sisterhood board. We shared program and fundraising ideas and will make plans to attend events at other synagogues.

The director of the National WRJ organization spoke at services on Friday night about Abraham and Sarah, and 'audacious hospitality'. She spoke about Sarah's role in Abraham's wandering in Canaan, and how she was the one who made their tent welcoming to strangers, just as the women of our Sisterhood have been doing in our community for many years.

I also attended a workshop presented by the Jewish Women's Archive. Their website has collections about dozens of notable Jewish women, all throughout history. They are developing pages honoring the notable women in our everyday lives. We will do a bit more research to see if this is something we could bring to our community.

As time goes on, we will share more of what we learned at convention and try to bring some of the programs to our Sisterhood and congregation.

Back here in Wantagh, on November 13th, we had our day of beauty at Bangz salon in Bellmore. As always, it was a great success. Our annual Chanukah Sale was on Sunday, November 18th in the Temple lobby, during Religious School. This year we also added hours for the sale on Monday, November 19th, so our high school students had a chance to shop as well. Our program, Healthy Eating, Healthy Living, was held on November 19th. It was very interesting and well attended.

Join us on Wednesday, December 5th for a book talk with Rachel Beck, as she talks to us about her new book, Finding Your Way. The next Book Club will be on Tuesday, December 18th. Coming in February, we will hold our annual Lottery with the daily Pick 3 numbers. Tickets are \$5. More information to come. We will also host an Antiques and Collectibles sale on Sunday, February 17th, with dozens of vendors and lots of beautiful merchandise. Look for more information after the New Year.

### **BLOG FROM ISRAEL**



My brother-in-law has many talents. In addition to playing the banjo, he's a builder and carpenter; attorney specializing in environmental issues; and all-around good guy. His passion is olive farming. With the help of volunteers from around the world as well as friends and family from our home at Kibbutz Gezer, he just finished the olive harvest.

Olives are also a rich part of the history of Gezer dating back to the time of King Solomon who built a famous fortress city here. We know King Solomon traded olive oil for cedar wood to use in the building of the temple – possibly including oil from olives harvested at Gezer!



In the early 1900s archeologists at Gezer found small piece of limestone with an ancient Hebrew inscription – an agricultural calendar dating to the time of King Solomon. Known as the Gezer Calendar, it mentions the timing of various harvests – including olives.

Olives are deeply embedded in Jewish history, text and ritual. In fact, olives and

olive oil are mentioned well over 200 times in the Hebrew Bible. We are all familiar with this use of olive oil from the story of Hanukah which focuses on the miracle of the oil

used to light the menorah and ner tamid from ancient times. Kindling the lights for Shabbat was done with oil lamps long before the advent of wax candles.



Olives are one of the seven

species (fruits) with which the Land of Israel is blessed (Deuteronomy 6:11). Olives are a symbol of peace, used for food and anointing oil, cosmetics and healing, strong enough to grow into rock, and able to live for hundreds of years.



Because of their ability to survive in harsh conditions olive trees are often used as a metaphor for the Jewish people. We have survived multiple challenges over the course of our history. Our roots, even in times of physical and spiritual draught, have been nourished by the deep waters of the Torah.

Here at Kehilat Birkat Shalom at Kibbutz Gezer we have several olives

trees planted when we first dedicated the site of our new sanctuary. Today they are strong and giving fruit - just as our community continues to thrive.

I am honored to be the new spiritual leader of Kehilat Birkat Shalom, building on the strong foundation built by Rabbi Miri Gold. I pray that we may all appreciate the fruits of the past as we look to the future. May the lights of Hanukah remind us to appreciate the beauty and wonder of creation.

**Why did you choose to join TBT? What do you hope to gain from TBT membership?** I wanted my children to learn about their religion. I heard all positive things about the temple and the school.


#### If you were a kind of Jewish food, what would you be and why?
