

INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Raise a Glass?

Purim, which this year we celebrate on Wednesday, March 20th and with our carnival on Sunday, March 24th, shares many characteristics with raucous spring

raucous spring celebrations around

the world. Mardi Gras and Carnivale, for example, have origins in a desire to shake off the winter doldrums and celebrate before an intense period of introspection. While Purim does not



immediately precede Passover and the Omer period, the function of the holiday for our people remains. It is an opportunity for us to let loose a little and bask in the warmth of the impending spring season while commemorating a great victory for our people.

The *Megillah* tells us, through Mordecai's words, that the 14th of Adar is to be a day of banqueting and rejoicing to recognize that the Jews had gained a respite from their enemies. The Hebrew word for banqueting, *mishteh*, has a root that connects it to libation, meaning that it might not qualify as a Purim banquet without wine or other strong spirits.

Due to its role as a boisterous end of winter festival,



Purim developed certain requirements that ensure a party-like atmosphere, and one of those was the presence of wine and spirits. By the time of the Talmud's completion, around the year 500 CE, the festive aspect of Purim was already a key component to its observance. In the tractate that deals

with Purim known fittingly as *Megillah*, we read on 7b: "Rava said: A person must drink on Purim until he could no longer distinguish between cursed Haman and blessed Mordecai." That's a lot of drinking to be sure!

The sages of old tell us that we're supposed to drink until we can't tell the difference between friend and foe. Though no reason is given for this obligation, perhaps the notion is that we don't need to tell our enemies apart from our friends, because we know that God will help us with that.

But, the rabbis also recognize that this is not necessarily the best way to go about celebrating, and seek to highlight some of the potential dangers that come with a drunken festival. Immediately following this rule, on the same page of Talmud, a brief story about two rabbis celebrating Purim is recounted: Rabba and Rav Zeira celebrated Purim together. While intoxicated, Rabba killed Rav Zeira. The next day he prayed for mercy and Rav Zeira was resurrected. The next year, Rabba invited Rav Zeira to celebrate Purim together again. Rav Zeira declined the invitation, explaining that miracles don't happen every year.

The slightly tongue-in-cheek answer from Rav Zeira to Rabba shows that the Rabbis recognize the dangers of Purim getting too crazy or getting out of hand. This year,

he was able to be revived, but he's not about to take his chances next year, and so he declines an invitation!



Later Jewish legal codes highlight the theme of tempering the revelry for safety as well as character. In the 19th

Century, Rabbi Israel Mayer Kagan, known as The *Chofetz Chayyim*, focused his teachings on morality. Regarding Purim, he explains: "We should not become drunk and demean ourselves by rejoicing. We are not commanded to rejoice for the sake of debauchery and stupidity, rather we should rejoice with a delight that leads us to love God and acknowledge the miracles wrought for us." Here the *Chofetz Chayyim* returns to the reason for all the drinking in the first place. Namely, that it's in order to recognize God's role in the many miracles that were wrought for us in generations past and celebrate God. It's not about us and how we feel at all. Today, we also recognize that those struggling with addiction may have trouble celebrating as part of a community if there is too much drinking going on.

I hope to see you at our Purim celebrations later this month. Together, may we raise a glass, but not too many, in thanks to God for the miracle of Purim. May we celebrate God in ways that highlight our sense of reverence as well as revelry.

CO-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Will the Mets' strong pitching staff remain healthy, and will the young Yankees continue to excite and mature? Ahhhh, the green grass, sunshine, and the "crack of the bat," brings a smile to our face for two reasons - we enjoy baseball and golf season is just about ready to begin! This has been a cold winter for most, so we all are looking forward to the outdoors!

As we enter the second half of our transition year, many of the operational components of our community have been addressed. New processes and procedures have been implemented, others, updated. All departments and operations have been reviewed, in some cases considerable changes have been made, in others minor fine tuning was all that was necessary. The IGC and the amazing members of all the TBT committees have been extremely busy and vigilant in making this transition year as smooth as possible. Bumps in the road were expected, and have been addressed as they arose.

More direct attention is now underway regarding TBT finances and putting into place plans to insure the financial stability of our community. This includes the proceeds of funds from the sale of the Temple Emanu-El building — these funds have been invested in short term treasury notes until a long-term plan is designed by our finance & planning committees. We need to be extremely vigilant on the use of these funds for the sustainability of our future.

Fundraising is a continuous process and one that must be successful year round. To assist in supplementing these funds, our Fundraising Committee is busy organizing events. Some one-of-a kind, others in place year round, that develop additional revenue streams to assist in the daily operation of TBT, and in addition, to maintain our dues at a manageable level.

Saturday, March 30th is our first new TBT Gala Event - "This is Us......Now!" Join us as we roll out the red carpet for a star-studded celebration of our Temple family. This will be an evening of food, music, dancing and most importantly a night for us to party together! You should have received your invitation in the mail. We look forward to an amazing night of celebration!

BLOG FROM ISRAEL





Just recently I was officially installed as rabbi at Kehilat Birkat Shalom at Kibbutz Gezer. It's been a busy time! In just a few months I have officiated at a wedding, funeral, two conversions, and more than fifteen bnai mitzvah ceremonies! I'd like to share a couple of stories about some of the these lifecycle events.

At one of the bar mitzvah ceremonies, the boy's great-grandmother attended. She was born in pre-state Israel in Hebron, into an ultra-Orthodox family. As a young woman she stopped being Orthodox and considered herself a "secular" Jew, even though she lit candles every shabbat and holiday. Even though she kept a Kosher home. Even though she always attended a Passover seder – she still considered herself "secular."

When her great-grandson was preparing for his bar mitzvah and Torah reading, I suggested they invite family members who had never had an aliya (recited Torah blessings) or had never read from the Torah to participate in the service. To everyone's surprise, great-grandma agreed both to read Torah and recite the blessings!

She shared with me at the ceremony that she never imagined she would be able to sit with her family, men and women together, in the synagogue at a bar mitzvah. She never dreamed, as a woman, she would be able to read Torah and recite the blessings! I was completely overwhelmed. As I was trying to say a Mi Shebayrach blessing for her – she was saying a blessing for all of us in the Reform Movement for giving her a way to return to Judaism.

A few weeks later my phone ran Shabbat afternoon. It was Amos, my friend, neighbor and member of the synagogue who is also a tour guide. He asked me if I was free that evening. When I replied yes, he said "Great! Do you want to officiate at a wedding?"

It turns out he was guiding an extended family in Israel for a bar mitzvah trip. The bar mitzvah boy's aunt was there with her long-time boyfriend/fiancé. The previous day they found matching wedding rings at a jewelry store here in Israel. Amos overheard them say to each other "too bad we can't get married now, here in Israel!"

A few hours later, there we were, standing under a

beautiful *chupa* (wedding canopy). Members of our congregation joined their family for a spontaneous Jewish wedding! Among the members from our community included a baker who made a delicious wedding cake; a photographer who came to ensure the couple had photos to remember the event; and lots of good spirit to help them celebrate the joyous occasion.

It is extremely rewarding to share the beauty and joy of Reform Judaism. Our successes are due in great part to the generous donations from friends like you. 
