# INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Over a long weekend in March, I was blessed to travel to Washington, DC with our Educator, Morah Meredith, and five of our 10th-grade Confirmation students to attend the *L'Taken* Seminar at the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. This seminar introduces the students to the workings of our

government, in its many complexities and complications, and teaches the students about their role as citizen advocates.

The *L'Taken* Seminar happens multiple weekends each year in the winter months, and it brings together students from Reform congregations around the country, to learn, explore our nation's capital, and ultimately to advocate for policies in the halls of Congress, guided by our Jewish values. Our students did a wonderful job, and prepared powerful speeches about immigration reform and reproductive rights which they presented to the offices of Rep. Peter King and Rep. Kathleen Rice, respectively. Our students were mature, professional, and respectful in advocating their positions, and I could not be prouder of them and the hard work they did over that weekend!

The *L'Taken* Seminar is an important part of our Confirmation year because Confirmation asks our students to take the next step in their Jewish lives and journeys. Bar and Bat Mitzvah render one responsible for the fulfillment of the mitzvot, the commandments. Confirmation asks our students to embrace their faith as adult thinkers, and grapple with their connections to God, Torah, their Judaism, and the world around them. As adult Jews, we are to recognize that our responsibilities extend beyond the walls of our Synagogue and even our community. Reform Judaism especially places emphasis on our calling to repair the world, and to follow in the footsteps of the Prophets of old who spoke truth to power, advocated for the Godly, moral path, and gave voice to the voiceless and marginalized. Confirmation takes place on Shavuot, the festival which

commemorates receiving the Torah at Sinai. After Passover, the Torah commands we count seven weeks of seven days, known as the Omer. (For more details, please see Cantor Timman's article this month.) On the fiftieth day, we celebrate the connection we made with God at Sinai, when we received the Ten Commandments. In order to make a free will commitment to God, the Israelites first needed freedom. It is only a free people that can truly enter into a covenant with God.

That covenant with God is reinforced in the Scroll

of Ruth, traditionally read at Shavuot, as Ruth commits to following God, and becomes the first Jew by Choice. Ruth commits to join the Israelites and confirms her place in God's covenant by a powerful statement: "Your people shall be my people, and your God my God" (1:16). Ruth confirms her belonging in the community of believers, and ends the story blessed and content because of it. At Confirmation, our 10th-graders will do the same, and we look forward to bestowing blessing upon them!

Shavuot's message affirms, in a way, that we are all Jews by Choice. God gives us free-will, we believe. We must actively and purposefully choose to connect ourselves to God and God's word, which calls us to act in the world in a certain way: with kindness, compassion, and an understanding that it is up to us to advocate and work for the world we wish to live in, to make it more than it is now. I look forward to hearing our students share their vision for their future as adult Jews.

Please join us for our Confirmation Service, which this year will take place on Erev Shavuot, Saturday, June 8th at 7:15pm. Our students will be leading us in service, chanting the Ten Commandments from the Torah, and sharing a little bit about their connection to and relationship with God. It is always a powerful evening, and we look forward to celebrating this important life cycle moment with our 10th-graders and their families!

# INSPIRATION FROM OUR CANTOR



May is all about counting. Some of us are counting the days until a child graduates or finishes another year of school. Some of us are counting down to summer plans and celebrations. But in the Jewish world we are counting the days leading up to Shavuot, the festival in which

we received the Torah at Mount Sinai. We call it "S'firat HaOmer," the counting of the Omer.

The period of the Omer begins on the second night of Passover and continues until Shavuot. Literally translated, Omer means "a sheaf." It refers to the measure of grain that was offered at the Temple in Jerusalem. The Torah commanded that seven weeks be counted for the *Omer*; (Leviticus 23:15-21). It says:

"From the day on which you bring the sheaf of elevation offering the day after the Sabbath, you shall count off seven weeks. They must be complete. You must count until the day after the seventh week - fifty days; then you shall bring an offering of new grain to Adonai. You shall bring from your settlements two loaves of bread as an elevation offering; each shall be made of two-tenths of a measure of choice flour, baked after leavening, as first fruits to Adonai...On that same day you shall hold a celebration; it shall be a sacred occasion for you; you shall not work at your occupations. This is a law for all time in all your settlements, throughout the ages."

Shavuot in the Bible was not connected with the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, as it is now. It was an agricultural festival. And its focus was the Temple in Jerusalem. Since the Temple no longer stands, and most of us are no longer involved in agriculture, what's the point of counting the *Omer* today?

While there is no longer a Temple or an *Omer* offering, our ancient sages declared that we should still count the days between Passover and Shavuot. The Kabbalists (mystics) saw the *Omer* period as a spiritual preparation for receiving the Torah on Mount Sinai. Our tradition also teaches that we all were present at Mount Sinai. "Didn't I see you at Mount Sinai?" Each day we take one more step away from the impurities of Egypt that have remained within us as we march toward Mount Sinai and Shavuot. For us today, counting the *Omer* can be a time of meditation where we renew our spirits. *Mitzrayim* means both "Egypt" and "a narrow place." We can use the image of counting our days to account for our actions, to rejoice in our freedoms, and let go of our own *Mitzrayim*, narrow places.

At TBT we are counting the *Omer* together in a couple of ways. During all our evening services, we are pausing to fulfill the mitzvah by chanting the *Omer* blessing and announcing the day. Each evening of the *Omer* we are also posting on our own temple Facebook page a daily inspiration from our ancient sages, teachers and contemporary thinkers. Join us as we count our way to Shavuot and enjoy these posts as a meaningful opportunity to pause, reflect and refocus. And whatever else you are counting this month, we look forward to greeting you in June at Mount Sinai!






