INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



No matter when they arrive, the High Holy Days are always on time. The question for us each year is not whether we are ready to celebrate these days, but whether we are ready to be changed for the better on these days. Yes, these days are meant to be spent with family and friends and serve as an opportunity

for togetherness. Our traditions call us to more than that on these Days of Awe. As October begins, we celebrate Rosh HaShanah and enter a time period that asks us to dig deep into our hearts, our souls, and our relationships.

The work of the High Holy Days is not easy. These days ask us to reflect on our actions and our intentions from the past year and commit ourselves to doing better in the year ahead. These days ask us to put aside our materialism and our ego and focus on our spirit and our soul. These days ask us to consider our interactions with each other and with God and to work towards reconciliation, forgiveness, and apology. Hard work, indeed! Our tradition recognizes this, though, and in many ways, gives us as many opportunities as possible to make these aspirations into reality.

One of the ways is through the work of the month of Elul, now concluded, which asks us to begin to look inward. Then, at Rosh HaShanah, we celebrate God and God's creation in which we are blessed to live. We sound the Shofar to herald the new year, to announce the future, as it were, and recognize that it is yet unwritten. Our actions are not preordained. What we do is up to us and us alone.

With the recognition that the future is in our hands, we then get to Yom Kippur, which asks us to look back at the decisions we've made and commit to the work of teshuvah, the word for repentance, but which comes from the root meaning turning. We turn away from the bad path and toward the good. We turn away from sin and toward mitzvah. We turn away from our basest impulses and toward a life of Godliness and holiness.

The prayers we recite and the customs we practice on these days, push us to do this hard work. The Avinu *Malkeinu* prayer posits that God is both a ruler who passes judgment and a parent who shows compassion for those who sin. The *Unetaneh Tokef* reminds us of our mortality, but is followed by the expression that "repentance, prayer, and charity temper judgment's severe decree." The Kol Nidre reminds us that we will make promises we will not keep, and acknowledges that, while we may have the best

of intentions, we know that we will sin. The confessionals list all that we might have done in the past year; but they do so in the plural, because we believe that when one member of our community errs, we are all somewhat responsible. As it is said in the Talmud, all of Israel are responsible to one another.

The messages preached from the pulpit, in part, seek to direct our energies as individuals and as a community in specific ways in the year ahead. This year's High Holy Day sermon topics currently include: Living as a Bearer of God's Light, Climate Change, Seeking Middle Ground, and Antisemitism.

When we get to Sukkot, we celebrate the bounty that God provides, and we revel in abundance and blessing and living the values of welcome. Tradition posits that though our fates are written on Rosh HaShanah and sealed on Yom Kippur, the final decree isn't made permanent until the end of the week of celebrating in our temporary dwellings. The fragility of the sukkah is once again meant to remind us that while God may be Eternal, we are only here for a short time. We ought to make the most use of the time we have and live our lives in the best way. The calendar of Tishrei implies that God wants to give us as much time as possible to do this hard work, to commit to being bearers of God's light, and living our most important values. There are always opportunities to change our ways and to commit to being better. This time of year asks us to make this task our focus for a few weeks.

When we commit to this, we will certainly have a Shanah Tovah u'Metukah, a good and sweet year! May it be so for you and your family, and may these High Holy Days be meaningful and transformative for you!

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



As we share together the Yamim Noraim, the Days of Awe, we are greatly moved by texts and music in our liturgy that are unique to the High Holy Days. Here are two prayers highlighted:

Kol Nidre

How ancient is ancient? When it comes to the melodies of our people they are judged as *Misinai* or 'from Sinai' when they have been part of our tradition for generations. The melodies that stir our souls and help us to find that 'still small voice' within us have a special place in our tradition.

Kol Nidre is one such melody. It is perhaps our oldest known Jewish chant dating back to the 11th century. Marking the beginning of the Day of Atonement, the Aramaic text is more a declaration than a liturgical prayer. Each of us is individually called to renew ourselves and ask for pardon and forgiveness from all vows, obligations and debts that we will make to Adonai and which we may not fulfill in the year to come. Standing with the Torahs, the tradition is to sing this melody three times. Each time it is chanted a little higher and a little louder so that we might be able to approach the High Court first with humility, then earnestly and finally with purpose. The repetition allows any latecomers to also be part of this declaration.

The haunting Kol Nidre has inspired composers over the centuries. Before our service begins we prepare ourselves by hearing the composer Max Bruch's cello setting. Bruch heard and interpreted the melody through the pleading sound of the instrument, speaking to our hearts. When I chant Kol Nidre, I am humbled to be a klei kodesh, a holy vessel for each of our prayers.

Unetaneh Tokef

Our High Holy Day liturgy follows the basic structure of any of our prayer services. However, special poetic insertions, called piyyutim (the Greek word for poem) add to the overall emotional impact of the holiday. One such piyyut is *Unetaneh Tokef.* In this poem, God is anthropomorphically shown to be the judge of all humankind, examining the Record of Deeds in the Book of Life, and making decisions on who will live and who will die. The conclusion of the prayer states that penitence, prayer and good deeds may temper judgment's severe decree.

While we do not know this poem's origin, it is very similar to a Christian prayer, attributed to a man known as Romanus who probably lived in Constantinople during the 4th or 5th century. At that time in history, there was a lot of borrowing back and forth between the Jews and Christians. It is likely that a Jewish poet heard this poem and adapted and translated it to Hebrew. (Today, another similarly worded prayer is included in the liturgy of the Roman Catholic Requiem Mass.) However, it was created, this piyyut has become an essential prayer in our High Holy Day liturgy. The power of its words impels us to examine our actions of the past year, learn from our mistakes, and put into action a plan to improve ourselves regarding our relationship with humankind and the world.

We are fortunate that among a few great Jewish composers who have faced these profound words, music has been created that reflects both that power and humility. We include settings by both Max Janowski and Louis Lewandowski in our TBT services. The Lewandowski Unetaneh Tokef uses a melody in its opening statement that is part of the *leit motif*, the theme melody of the High Holy Days. This ancient musical element is also referred to as Misinai, but can only be traced back approximately three centuries to the beginning of Jewish music transcription. The Misinai motifs used in both these settings of Unetaneh Tokef can be heard echoed throughout the liturgy during the High Holy Days.

As we share together these extra-ordinary days filled with layers of meaning, may we be inscribed and sealed for a year filled with blessings, health and joy.


I hope everyone is written into the Book of Life for a healthy, happy and sweet new year. I can't believe that Fall is already here.

We are so grateful to all the new and returning Chai Club members for their support and encouragement.





We received lovely letters from Island Harvest and from Adopt-A-Battalion thanking TBT for its generous donations and continued support. 



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
