Deepening our Congregation's Engagement with Israel.

The Jewish people's connection to Israel, as a land and as an idea, is deep and important. As Jews who live outside of Israel, it is important that we remain engaged with Israel and aware of the complexities as well as the

beauty. To help us kick off a deeper connection to Israel, I am excited that we will be welcoming Rabbi Neal Gold as our Scholar in Residence this month! Information about the weekend's events can be seen on the flyer on the front cover of this edition and on **page 6**.

Throughout Israel, in many cities and towns, there is a street named 29 November. That's right, the street is called 29 November Road or avenue or street. Why does this date get a street? Because on this date in 1947, the UN approved the partition plan for Palestine, dividing the British Mandate into two states, one for Jews and one for Arabs. This date ended one phase of the Zionist project that Theodore Herzl began some 60 years earlier, the creation of a nation-state for the Jewish people. Though the aftermath of this partition has been an unfortunate constant conflict, there is no doubt that for Israel, and for the Jewish people, this is an important date, a date worthy of naming a street after!

This year will mark 72 years since that partition was approved. Upon hearing the news of approval, the Jewish community took to singing and dancing, for not only was Herzl's project coming to fruition, but also the hope of 2000 years, to be a free people returned to our homeland. Coming so soon after the near destruction of European Jewry heightened, for many, the importance and significance of this decision by the global community vis-à-vis the Jews.

There is no question that supporting Israel from afar isn't always easy. Israel has become, even among Jews, a topic that seems to divide more than unify as it once did. The political situation is complicated. The security situation is always tenuous. The rights of Progressive Jews are limited, not to mention the other internal divisions.


Throughout all of this, however, we ought to remain committed to Israel, and committed to advocating for the best version of Israel. Over the weekend, our Scholar in Residence will help us to work toward just that: connecting to Israel, recognizing its importance, and learning how to best support and advocate for Israel as American Reform Jews in the 21st century.

With Rabbi Gold, we will have occasion to hear about how we can participate in Israel through the upcoming World Zionist Congress, as well as how to support Progressive Judaism in Israel. We will study Torah together through a lens of Israel. Rabbi Gold will also have a chance to connect with our Religious School students and our Youth Group throughout the weekend. It's going to be a great weekend of learning for our entire community, and I hope you will join us for some or all of the programming. It will be a great kick off to what I hope will become a deepened connection to Israel.

We're also very excited that we've got a Congregational Family Trip to Israel planned for summer, 2020. In terms of creating a connection to Israel, there is no better way than going and experiencing the land, the people, and the complexities for yourself. Our itinerary is varied, and thorough, including connecting with representatives from a variety of communities in Israel, and opportunities to discuss the complexities from up close.

The creation of the state of Israel is a modern miracle, brought to fruition through prayer and a lot of hard work. I'm looking forward to our congregation and community's deepening connection to and engagement with Israel in the months and years ahead.

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



Each of us has a name, given to us by God, and given to us by our father and mother..." (Zelda).

"There are three crowns. The crown of Torah, the crown of priesthood, and the crown of kingship. And the crown of a good name is superior to them all."

(Rabbi Shimon in Pirkei Avot 4:17).

What's in a name? Since Biblical times, naming has been important to our people. Our Torah readings during this season include powerful naming moments for Avram/ Abraham, Sarai/Sarah, Jacob/Israel, etc. As an example, in Parasha Lech L'cha, this month, God tells Avram that he will make his name great (Gen. 12:2). Later God tells Avram that his name will be known as Avraham (Gen. 17:5) and Sarai will be known as Sarah (Gen. 17:15). Those name changes include the extra Hebrew letter 'hay,' a letter connected to God's name. Some sources in our tradition read the added hay as a symbol of God's presence. There are many examples throughout the Bible of our ancestors' names carrying great meaning and significance.

As a people, we have adapted the tradition to take special care in naming our children twice, once with their familiar name and a second time with their own Hebrew name. For centuries the meaning of names often shed light on the parents who chose the name, on the previous generations' names shared, as well as on those who received the name. While names do not determine our destiny, they provide us with the opportunity to bring honor to the names we bear and to assure that those for whom we were named live on.

Names have meanings and attributes of their own, too. For instance, I am delighted how often I meet someone named Shira who turns out to be connected to music and song later in life.

Those who join our Tribe later in life have the unique opportunity to choose their own Hebrew name. How significance and powerful it is to be able to name yourself as part of committing to become Jewish! Rabbi Bar-Nahum and I have helped many people choose Judaism, and during that journey, choose their new Hebrew name.

This month we will offer two special programs at Temple to explore and celebrate our Hebrew names. Our Fourth Graders will research and share their names during a special Shabbaton on Saturday, November 23rd. I will be joining our Sisterhood for a Rosh Chodesh program on Sunday, November 24th, as we study and rejoice in the rich histories of our names together. We will also have an opportunity at both programs for everyone to make a personal piece of jewelry with their own Hebrew name. And for those who don't have a Hebrew name? Please reach out to either Rabbi Bar-Nahum or me and we will be happy to help you choose a name full of meaning and significance for you and your family.

If your family is part of this year's Fourth Grade class or if you are a member of Sisterhood, please look for more information on both these programs and join us as we explore and share the significance of our Hebrew names.



Calendar-wise, the High Holidays are behind us. We have greeted a New Year, engaged in the difficult work of introspection, forgiveness and spiritual renewal and made quiet and open promises to find ways to "do better" this year. We are already on the road to finding ways to incorporate that difficult work and those promises into actions that we can take throughout this year. Thanks to the generosity of our TBT family, Island Harvest and the Kosher Food Bank have been able to provide for our Long Island neighbors struggling with food insecurity and Mazon has more resources to continue their work to educate and advocate for systemic changes that can, hopefully, minimize/prevent the conditions contributing to food insecurity.

Last month, Social Action/Social Justice and BNTY teamed up for a Sukkot event at the Garden of St. Francis in Bellmore. Our Youth group helped with the harvest, learned about organic farming, and learned ways to help the environment as well as provide for those in need.

Our committee has been working on ways to be more mindful of being stewards of our planet. Finding ways to reduce our use of plastics and other resources, to increase recycling efforts at TBT, and to repurpose or properly dispose of items is underway. 

Let's treat women with dignity. These health products are a necessity, not a luxury.






