INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



This month, I along with Cantor Timman, Morah Meredith, the Co-Presidents, and a handful of congregants will travel to Chicago for the Union for Reform Judaism Biennial Conference. This conference brings together over 5,000 Reform Jews from all over the world to pray together, share our

commonalities, and learn from one another. I've only been to one prior, and it was truly a wonderful experience. We will learn about new initiatives the Reform Movement is planning. We will hear what has been working in other congregations that will hopefully inspire us in our plans for the future. We will join in prayer as one community to welcome in Shabbat.

This conference is an important part of our connection to the larger Reform Movement. Though each congregation creates its own rituals and policies, being part of the Reform Movement helps us to determine some of the direction we will go on issues of social justice, communal norms, and worship. While we don't take direction, we do take inspiration, and then make the choices that best respond to the needs and wants of our congregation. And when we join in these larger initiatives, we join with congregations around the world to speak in a loud voice for our values and our faith. Sometimes the movement helps to direct us, and sometimes the congregations help to push the movement in new directions. Either way, we continue the tradition of a dynamic Judaism, constantly adapting and changing, while maintaining a connection to the past and to tradition.

The month of December also reminds us of the dynamic nature of Judaism, as we celebrate Chanukah. The history is more complicated than the story of the miracle of the oil. It involves rival factions of Jews, shifting allegiances between regional powers, and the ever-present question of how much influence the outside world ought to have on Judaism. Chanukah commemorates the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem by the Maccabees, after they defeat the Seleucid Greeks. The Seleucids had banned central tenets of Judaism, including Shabbat and Brit Milah, and had turned the Temple in Jerusalem into a Temple to Zeus. The Maccabees fought a war to keep Judaism alive and to keep it thriving in the face of forced Hellenization.

But, we also know that while the Maccabees were successful in their battle for Judaism and self-rule, ultimately, the influence of Greek culture would be too much for Judaism to ignore completely. Within a couple hundred years, the rising Greek influence can be seen in the philosopher Philo, who as a Jew in Alexandria works to reconcile Greek Platonic philosophy and Jewish texts and beliefs. By the time of the Rabbis of the second century, CE, the practice of a Greek Symposium, where a meal was coupled with extra glasses of wine and deep conversation, had been incorporated into what we now know as our Passover Seder.

The Maccabees may have won a war against outright Hellenization, but they could not prevent the eventual incorporation of Greek culture into Judaism. In fact, it was the Maccabee's autocratic ways and inflexible attitudes toward their fellow Jews which helped lead to their downfall, as the populous turned against them.

What do we learn from this? That Judaism has always been dynamic and willing to incorporate new ideas, even if they come from places we might not expect. Judaism is made better when we allow space for creativity and new ideas, as long as we don't abandon our past. There is a middle path between the Maccabees' autocracy and the Hellenizers' eschewing of all tradition. That middle path is why we are Reform Jews, and why we are proud to be part of a larger movement that has always sought that middle path.

I wish you and your families a wonderful Chanukah celebration! May the light of the Chanukiah fill your homes, your hearts, and your souls!

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



Are you ready for Chanukah this year? Join us on the 6th night with your Chanukiah for a fun (wear your favorite Chanukah sweater) and musical Chanukah Shabbat on Friday, December 27th, at 6:30pm.

I love the music for this joyous festival ranging from traditional classics

to some very wonderful and new melodies from the best and most creative performers in the field. Once we've exhausted all the many extra verses of "I Have a Little Dreydl" and "Maoz Tsur," I encourage you to explore some of the wonderful songs created by our leading Jewish music artists. Each of these composer/performers have delightful songs and compilations offering an opportunity to learn about the miracle of Chanukah and the story of the Maccabean victory for freedom through a contemporary lens. Important lessons, stories and traditions are often learned through music and these settings are all excellent. Just in time for last minute shopping here is my list of favorite artists for Chanukah music ranging from songs for our youngest crowd to music for the family and more eclectic ears.

For our youngest children I suggest selections from Chanukah Favorites by Judy Caplan Ginsburgh, Shine Little Candles by Rachel Buchman, and Ellen Allard's "Sufganiot," "Yodelay Do Potato," "Chocolate Gelt," and "Judah Maccabee, the Hammer." The compilation Celebrate Hanukkah with Craig Taubman and other artists is delightful, as is Light These Lights by Debbie Friedman, It's Chanukah Time by Julie Silver, and Sam Glaser's Rockin' Chanukah Revue. For a great jazz recording enjoy

The Hanukkah Lounge by Craig Taubman and other artists. For the best Klezmer recording I recommend Oy Chanukah! by the Klezmer Conservatory Band. Michelle Citrin's "Pass the Candle" and jazzy "Hanukkah Lovin" have fun videos to go with wonderful music. Jewish boy bands like the Maccabeats and Six13 have several awesome Chanukah video parodies to enjoy. Finally, for a very well performed eclectic collection of songs from around the world I suggest: Chanukah in Story and Song performed by The Western Wind and narrated by Leonard Nimoy and Reggae Chanukah by Alan Eder and friends.

Finally, here is an opportunity to do a mitzvah for TBT: Did you know that you can earn money for TBT while doing your Chanukah shopping on Amazon? 





Chanukah Menorah Lighting and Blessings 101:



One candle is added to the menorah each night. The first night you light the shammus (the one at a different height), and one Chanukah candle; by the eighth night you light all the candles. The Menorah must be seen publicly.

Put the candles in the menorah from right to left (1, 2, 3) - like Hebrew writing.

Light the candles from left to right (3, 2, 1,) - the newest candle first. Use the shamus to light the other candles.

The menorah is preferably lit at nightfall, and should remain lit at least 30 minutes, and left to go out on their own. On Friday the menorah should be lit 18 minutes before sundown, and then the Shabbat candles should be

Did You Know?

The origin of the dreidel game is not clear. One theory is that it was used as protection in times of persecution: to avoid being caught studying the Torah, Jews would quickly pull out the dreidels and pretend they were gambling.

The exchanging of gifts is a secular Chanukah tradition that bears little religious significance. Often, parents or grandparents give children a small amount of money, called gelt, or larger Chanukah gifts, though it is unusual for adults to exchange presents with each other. Gift-giving, by all accounts, derives directly from Chanukah's proximity to Christmas.






