INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Dispatch from the Southern Border

I've just returned from my trip to the Southern US Border at Brownsville, TX, where I spent some time with Rabbi Steven Sirbu, Rona and Bob Kauffman, and Marti Michael volunteering in the asylum-seeker camp in Matamoros,

Mexico. The 2500 people, including many children, living in that camp are each hoping to be granted asylum in the US, due to the difficult and dangerous conditions of their homelands in Central and South America. Seeking asylum is a legal way to gain entry to a nation under international law.

Last year, the US government implemented a new series of regulations called MPP, the Migrant Protection Program, which includes provisions that those seeking asylum be detained in Mexico rather than enter the US. The MPP also includes new restrictions that state that one cannot claim asylum in the US if you did not apply for it in another country along the way. Those fleeing violence and danger are now caught in a legal limbo and have no choice but to live in a tent city in sight of the border and await a court date for their application to be heard. Currently less than 1% of asylum requests are granted.

While we were there, we met a Norwegian documentary crew working on a project about the American Dream. They asked me why I was there and what I was doing. I answered that Jewish tradition reminds us over and over again that we are welcome and not oppress the stranger, for we were strangers in the land of Egypt. I explained that our people know all too well what it means when borders are closed, quotas are established, and people are sent away to face certain death.

We crossed the border three times over three days by foot, hauling supplies on wagons. When we crossed back from Mexico to Texas, at the exact spot of the border, two ICE agents are stationed asking everyone for proof they are a citizen or allowed to be in the US. Why there? Because, as soon as one sets foot in America one can legally claim asylum. The agents are there to prevent that. Our borders are closed to these families, and the results are devastating.

The Norwegian film crew also asked me if I was for open borders. For the record, I am not. But neither am I for closed borders. And currently, that is what we have. There ought to be a legal, safe way for our Nation of Immigrants to welcome and vet those seeking a better life. There ought to be a system that upholds the dignity

of the human beings seeking shelter from danger, and there ought to be legitimate reasons before people are denied entry or deported.

We saw families working hard just to live, not knowing what might happen or how long it will take. We saw kids eager to learn, play, laugh and sing. We saw hundreds upon hundreds come to the newly built mess tent to get one hot meal a day. We saw a medical tent, only open a couple times a week, and undersupplied. We saw busloads of women in shackles being led onto planes and deported to Guatemala, even though many of them are not from Guatemala. We saw people living in difficulty, understanding that wherever they've come from must be that much worse. We saw what it means when America turns its back on the tired, poor, huddled masses.

The crisis would be much worse were it not for the work of the volunteers of Team Brownsville and World Central Kitchen who are on the ground every day providing food, water, and a message that the policies of a nation do not represent every citizen's opinion. We met and worked with people of all faiths, who were drawn to the border in the recognition that the MPP policies and practices are immoral, un-American, and contrary to scripture. We saw a crisis made worse by intentionally cruel policies, and a crisis with no end in sight. The backlog for the courts is months-long.

There is a lot more to share, to be sure. I am still only just beginning to process my experiences. I urge you to join us on Friday March 20 as we commemorate the second annual HIAS Refugee Shabbat, during which Rona, Bob, Marti, and I will each be sharing about our experience and bearing witness to all that we saw.





PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE





Joni and I are fast approaching completion of our first year as Co-Presidents of Temple B'nai Torah. It has been such a pleasure working with Joni and

trying to improve our Temple. It has also been a pleasure to meet so many wonderful fellow congregants!

Our motto from the start of our presidency has been to be as open and honest as we can about Temple matters. We encourage all Congregants to reach out to us with compliments as well complaints. We realize we can't fix everything and make it to everyone's liking but we do try to listen to see if an amicable compromise can be worked out. We try, as much as possible, to bring problems and complaints to our terrific and hardworking Executive Board and Board of Trustees so we can brainstorm and come up with a working solution.

One thing we, as well as the Executive Board and Board of Trustees, have heard complaints about is fundraising. Sometimes people feel that they pay a lot in dues and that everything should be covered by dues. Others feel that a substantial amount of money was made from the sale of legacy TEEM's property when we merged, and we should use that money and not fundraise.

Let me dispel one myth – dues do not cover all of our expenses. The rest of the expenses are covered by Fundraising – primarily the Fundraising efforts of our wonderful Bingo volunteers.

As for the money from the sale of legacy TEEM's property - it was decided to invest that money in an endowment fund as a way to invest in the future of Judaism. When we merged, we spoke of making Temple B'nai Torah a beacon of Reform Judaism for the South Shore of Long Island. Hopefully we will be able to use this money wisely to insure this can happen and that our Temple will be here for many future generations.

I know it seems like every time you hear from the Temple you feel we are just soliciting money. We do have a lot of fundraising activities - we try different things or target different age groups with the expectation that not everyone will participate in any given activity. Some fundraisers are things you just do - such as a Kol Nidre pledge or a donation for a High Holy Day

honor or a birthday or anniversary blessing. Some of our fundraisers, like Shalach Manos for Purim or the Honey Sale at Rosh Hashanah were brought to us when a congregant remembered this was a tradition at his or her old Temple. Still other fundraisers, like the upcoming Auction on March 21 are meant to be an evening of food, and fun entertainment, as well as an opportunity to make a lot of money. Other fundraisers, such as the square dance make some money but primarily serve to bring fellow congregants together for a fun evening.

Please remember that each time you participate in a fundraiser you are helping to preserve what we hope is (or will become) your second home. The money a fundraiser brings in helps to run this house and also helps when we want to make improvements on this house. The second thing a fundraiser can do is help foster comradery among fellow congregants. If you come to an event once and have a good time with some of your fellow congregants you might want to come back again and have a great time with your new friends! We don't expect everyone to participate in every fundraiser but we do hope you will lend your support to at least a few of them.

One other thing to remember is that all fundraising does not have to mean you must give money. Bingo relies heavily on its great group of volunteers to help this fundraiser be a great fundraiser. You can always come down on a Wednesday afternoon or Thursday evening and volunteer your time. It is absolutely as valuable as cash.





Last month Rabbi Bar-Nahum and the Kauffmans joined a small delegation to the southern border to assist in providing humanitarian aid to asylum seekers who are waiting in Mexico to be allowed to enter the U.S. for their asylum hearings. It was a heartbreaking as well as inspiring experience. Thank you to all who lent their support to this mission. You made it possible for us to provide hot meals, to assist in the one day per week of school that is offered to the children, and to purchase items urgently needed by the asylum seekers when we arrived. This month, as we celebrate Refugee Shabbat (March 20) we will share our experiences with you. Refugee Shabbat is organized through HIAS to highlight the needs of refugees around the world and to remind us of our need to Welcome the Stranger. We will be joined that evening by Marti Michael. She will speak with the congregation about her experiences, the asylum seekers, the current situation at the border, and ways that we can be of help. Join us for a very important evening.

The World Zionist Conference will be wrapping up its elections this month so if you are planning on participating please do so before March 11. Feel free to let us know if you have any questions or need assistance in registering or submitting your vote. We are aiming for the entire congregation to participate in this important process and will be happy to arrange for assistance with the computer-based election process.






