INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



November has always been one of my favorite months. Though we are in the midst of the Hebrew month of Cheshvan, which has no holidays and is therefore defined as bitter by the rabbis of old, November always held one of the most important days of the year to me. As a kid, I always looked forward to Thanksgiving, because it meant that everyone was home together, and we would spend time laughing, cooking and being together; welcoming friends, and enjoying each other's company.

Almost any blessing can be said on someone's behalf. But not the blessing of Thanksgiving in the Amidah prayer. That blessing must be recited by the individual, even if there is a prayer leader. The rule about that blessing emphasizes that no one can offer thanks on our behalf. We have to do that ourselves.

I have been thinking a lot about what it means to be grateful in these difficult times. Before I say too much more, let me once more thank the many people who worked with us to achieve all our Holiday celebrations, from the High Holy Days, through Sukkot, Simchat Torah and Confirmation. We were blessed to have so many in our congregation step up and help us to make these important days on our calendar all they could be! We cannot do this without all the help we received, and we are grateful!

I am also grateful for your sticking with us through this. We knew it would be different, and we knew it would take some time to get everything all set up. But we didn't know that you would stick with us. With so many changes this year and with the pandemic keeping you away physically, it would have been easy to walk away or take a break from the congregation, but you didn't. Instead, you gave us a chance! And we are grateful to know that the hard work paid off. The feedback we've received has let us know that we made the right decisions for our congregation. (It's not so easy to know that when you're leading a service to an empty room!) We hope to never have to do it like this again, but we also know that if we need to, we can. We also anticipate that some of the new additions may stick around for future years, too. Necessity is the mother of invention!

While I know that this year's Thanksgiving celebrations will probably be markedly different for many of us; given travel restrictions and limitations, it does give us an opportunity, and a nudge, to move toward gratitude. We've all been, rightfully, focused on so much of what we have lost over this last year. We have all been, rightfully, keeping lists of the things we miss, and that we can't wait to have again. But this year, perhaps Thanksgiving is coming at just the right time to allow us to take a break from the worry and the disappointments, which are many, and focus on all that is good in our lives, which is also a lot!

I challenge each of us at our Thanksgiving tables to take a cue from the rabbis of old and make a point to share the thanks that we have. Spend time leading up to or on Thanksgiving and create a couple of lists. One list should be filled with things we are grateful for in general, like we tend to do each year around our tables. The other list might be more difficult, but I think even more important this year. Take time to think of some of the unexpected good things that have come out of this pandemic. There may not be many, and creating this list doesn't mean that we should be grateful for the pandemic, but I imagine there has been unexpected goodness at least a few times over these last eight months.

Even in the midst of troubling times, we are asked to find opportunities for gratitude. While we are certainly not grateful for the pandemic, we can and should show our thanks for some of the unexpected blessings that have arisen due to it! It will remind us that while times are indeed difficult, we still do have much which blesses us.

Wishing you and yours a happy Thanksgiving and a beautiful season of gratitude.

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



We have just completed the most extraordinary and intense period of the Jewish calendar: The High Holy Days and Festivals. Even though it lasted for a month, because of the Pandemic it required several months to plan, beginning this past Spring when the reality began to settle in that Covid-19 was now a part of our lives.

Back in March, our community (and the world) instantly socially distanced and we all had to adjust to our new situation. How do we remotely bring services to our congregation? Pastoral work became a necessary focus as our community suffered too many illnesses, losses, and difficult uncertainties. But by late Spring, we somehow managed to figure out how to share Shabbat and the

Festivals of Passover and Shavuot virtually. Religious School went online and B'nai Mitzvah were postponed to the Fall in the hopes that we would be able to gather, or at least figure out how to create meaningful ceremonies with the help of technology. We then began to focus on the Fall and the High Holy Days. OY VEY!

We started preparing for the High Holy Days in ways that no one ever imagined in our lifetime: researching streaming services, camera installations, tech support, stagecraft, and studying the science of singing and music in a Covid-19 world.

Thank God for our exceptional community and our extraordinarily dedicated congregants! We banded together a High Holy Day Ritual Team to aid us in crafting the logistics and facilitate which services and elements needed to be pre-taped. We worked with our sound and video company to install new Sanctuary cameras, researched new streaming software, and searched to find someone to help us with the most technical aspects. Our army of Torah and Haftorah chanters studied and prepared to come and prerecord all of their parts weeks earlier than normal. Our Shofar blowers prerecorded and joined us for three live drive-in Shofar services. I reworked our choral musical settings so that I could sing them without the choir, keeping everyone safe. Cue sheets expanded to include every element of our reinvented services.

We were blessed to partner with our congregant, Dennis Cashton, who with his expertise, volunteered to record, edit, and produce every aspect, including all of our live services. We spent many hours prerecording sections of the musical service just in case the internet failed. Dennis, ably assisted by Susan Weber, never said no. Every concept we developed, they made happen. Starting in August, our Sanctuary began to look like a recording studio with lights, cameras, microphones, and many days of video recordings.

Without our exceptional TBT community, we could not have made it to this day! In this season of gratitude, I am thankful for so many people who helped make an impossible time into a meaningful, creative, and unique season of High Holy Days and Festivals. What will this next year hold? We are praying for the best, but now we also know that we can do it together, a united TBT community, devoted to our special Temple family.

Social Action/Social Justice Committee

As this is the month of Thanksgiving and the season of gratitude, we wish to express our gratitude to the TBT community and its support of our Social Action/Social Justice initiatives.

We would like to thank our TBT community for its generosity in donating to our 2020 High Holy Day Food Drive. This year's response was amazing and has enabled the Wisdom Lane School's food pantry to provide for our local children and families struggling with food insecurity. We are grateful to be part of such a caring and generous community.

The Garden at TBT's cumulative produce donation (as of this writing) was well over 515 lbs. and was sent to safe houses in Wantagh and Freeport, to the Island Harvest Warehouse and to Community Solidarity in Hempstead. During the High Holy Days our Religious School held a special Taschlich service in the garden for our students. During Sukkot, the Kindergarten group learned about Sukkot and assisted in a Sukkot Harvest and our Mazel Tots were treated to a morning of Sukkot related activities; both events included a visit to our mini sukkah in the garden! It was wonderful to have our young people enjoying and learning in the garden and look forward to many more ways to expand opportunities to use the potential of the garden. We are grateful for Morah Meredith for leading such meaningful events for our students. We are now preparing our garden beds for the winter, planning new Spring plantings and adding educational elements to the garden. We are grateful for our garden volunteers and we are grateful for all of you who came to visit the garden, who asked questions, who made donations and who supported our efforts in any way.

In support of the Religious Action Center of the Union of Reform Judaism's 2020 Civic Engagement Campaign, we provided information about voter registration and about the many voting options available this year; we provided information about voting to our newest voters, through our College Connection program (thank you Helaine Schnall for your assistance); we invited congregants to participate in local Candidate's forums. and we encouraged and worked towards 100% voter turnout from our congregation. If you haven't already filled in your Pledge to Vote, please do so so we can see just how close to that goal we can get. This edition of the Voice should be received before Election Day so, there is still time for us to remind you to be sure to vote. Please let us know if you have any questions regarding the voting process. We are grateful for our democratic process and to the League of Women Voters and the RAC for their guidance and resources.
