INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



This month, our nation will swear in a new Congress, new Senators, and a new President. The governmental leadership of our nation is tasked with promoting the God given rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness for all those living within our borders, citizen, resident, and sojourner alike. One of the newly elected Representatives to be sworn in this month is Nikema Williams, who won the election in Georgia's 5th district, which between 1987 and this past year was held by John Lewis.

John Lewis understood the promise of America and was witness personally to times when that promise wasn't upheld equally for all Americans. He was an important leader of the Civil Rights Movement, speaking at

the March on Washington, marching with Dr. King, and advocating for the passage of the Voting Rights Act. He is most wellknown for the injuries he received marching in Selma on Bloody Sunday.

John Lewis dedicated his life to promoting equality in America and equal access to the voting booth for all Americans. The Supreme Court invalidated portions of the Voting Rights Act in 2013, and now there is a bill seeking passage known as the John Lewis Voting Rights Act, which would reinstate certain provisions in keeping with the Court's decision.

Each year in January, we commemorate Martin Luther King, Jr. Day as a way to honor the civil rights movement and the leaders who fought to make ours a more perfect union. There is much work to be done still, and no one knew and understood the ongoing struggle more than John Lewis. In honor of this year's Martin Luther King Jr. Day, our Social Action/Social Justice committee has planned an opportunity for us all to watch and then discuss a documentary biopic about the life of John Lewis titled, "John Lewis: Good Trouble."

The screening will be available to members of our congregation for 48 hours, beginning after Shabbat at 6:00pm on January 16. You can watch it as convenient for you. We will then gather at 7:00pm on Monday, January 18, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, for a discussion of the film and conversation about the work ahead as it relates to voting rights, and race relations. Building on our Elul congregational read, and our wonderful music program before Thanksgiving, we hope this conversation will encourage us to delve even more deeply into these topics. John Lewis coined the phrases "good trouble" and "necessary trouble" to describe what sometimes needs to be done. Good and necessary trouble means speaking out when things are not right or equitable, even and especially against those in charge and power. Good and necessary trouble means when the time calls for it, stand up for what you believe in. John Lewis lived a life dedicated to getting into good and necessary trouble. As he said, sometimes these are required to save the soul of America. He never gave up, and always believed in this nation, even when he was witness to its most vicious and hateful aspects.

This month, we look to new leadership in this nation. Let us all pray that our newly sworn-in leaders work every day to promote those rights our founders understood as inalienable, life, liberty, and happiness. The founders didn't extend these rights to all. Let us all be ready to get into good trouble to continue the work to right that wrong.
