INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



What a difference a year makes!

Can you believe that the last time we were all together was Purim? That thought came to my mind as I was looking at this month's calendar. For everyone's safety, we're planning a virtual Purim celebration this year, at the end of the month; which means, we'll have gone through a full year of Judaism, a religion predicated on community, without being alongside each other. It's stunning when you think about it.

In the last year, we've all learned a lot. We've all become experts in computer programs and apps we'd never had needed to use before. Many of us long for the day when we no longer have to click on the link to see our friends and neighbors. Many of us long for the day when we can ring a doorbell again, shake a hand again, give a hug again. Those days seem closer now than ever, as the vaccine slowly makes headway through our population.

I've been reflecting a lot on this last year. Virtually, we've gathered for Passover, Shavuot, all the High Holy Days, B'nai Mitzvah, Chanukah, soon Tu B'Shevat and Purim; and soon thereafter, Passover once again will most likely be virtual this year. Like many of you, I've been saddened by what we've lost in terms of our togetherness and our ability to join alongside each other. Being in a ZOOM box next to you is just not the same.

All through this year, I have been frustrated that my time for learning has been diminished. I've either been too busy, overwhelmed, or tired to do real serious study. Any capacity I may have had for learning something new went to learning how to lead a congregation virtually, and then doing that work. "What good is that!?" I'd ask myself over and over. One day it will all be moot, because one day, we'll be back together. I was often frustrated that my Talmud sat unopened or that an email with a new D'var Torah remained unread.

But as we make our way to one year apart, I have taken to understanding what's been going on in a new way. We've all spent all this time learning a lot of new skills. While on their face they may not feel like the work of Torah, let's consider for a moment why we've learned all this. It's in order to be able to connect and maintain our community. All these new programs and apps and procedures, all the links to follow and places to click, all the muting and unmuting, is because we know that above all else comes the community. We've been spending our time, months now, creating and coming to grips with this new format for the community of TBT which we all care so deeply for. What can be more grounded in Torah than trying to reach out and be together, however we can? What could be more in keeping with our values than in working to ensure that everyone stays connected? The Torah will be back again next year. The Talmud has been there for 1500 years. The more important work was the work of community.

By the time we get to Purim at the end of the month, we'll have spent a full year separated from each other physically, but I do believe we've come closer in a lot of ways as well. We've done great work here at TBT keeping our congregation engaged and involved. And we will continue to do so until we can all safely come together again. If I were as brash as the Maccabees, I'd suggest we postpone Purim until we can be together, so that we can truly lean into the festivity, the frivolity, and the letting go that this Spring festival is imbued with. For now, we'll gather virtually and celebrate our people's survival and strength against difficult odds and in unprecedented times. I bet we can all understand a little bit about that this year.

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



During this long, cold winter I often find myself turning to music for inspiration and comfort. At TBT, we have just started a special Lifelong Learning series entitled Midrash through Song. No prior experience is necessary! This series is a continuation of Rabbi Bar-Nahum's fall classes on *midrash* (traditional Biblical commentary and interpretation), in which he focused on studying ancient midrashim and helped us develop our own creative midrash commentaries. In our winter series we turn to music and how modern composers and lyricists have embraced midrash through music. We will be exploring the contemporary songs born from, inspired, and informed by biblical narrative. As we know from our very musical services, song settings are often an accessible, meaningful, and enjoyable way to help us to expand and find relevance in our ancient texts.

During this series we are joined by two very talented singers/songwriters to help us learn about their creative processes. Our congregant, Ben Diamond, who is part of the SOBeez Band and our TBT Ensemble, is co-leading with me throughout the series, and will be guiding us through his process, helping us try our hands at becoming modern day Midrash lyricists. As a special treat, for the February 7th session, we will be joined by my colleague and friend, Cantor Robin Joseph, who has developed over the years what she calls "MidraShir", her unique style of storytelling through song. As a cantor and soloist, and as one-half of the duo B'shert, she has taught about, performed, and recorded her original Jewish folk rock.

Whether you are a budding lyricist, composer, or simply a lover of Jewish music, here is an opportunity to be inspired and creative with your TBT family this winter. No prior experience is necessary, but once we reconvene after the February break, plan to be with us for each of the three final sessions as we start working together with Ben to write and compose new midrash lyrics and music. Please check the weekly Scroll for ZOOM info and times for each session.



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



A few months ago, I challenged the BNTY Board to start thinking about Purim. They looked at me like I was crazy. It was September, and we were at our first event of the year, and to them, Purim seemed too far away to think about. I had issued the same challenge to the leadership of the Youth Activities Committee earlier that day, but they understood why right away. This year, like everything else, Purim is going to be different and we had to figure out how to make it work.

Fast forward a couple of weeks and the teens kept asking what we were going to do for the Purim Carnival. Last year, we had our traditional games, but we also had inflatables and pizza and cotton candy and we were hoping to one-up ourselves again this year. Of course, with safety protocols in place, we can't eat inside TBT, let alone play communal games and bounce around in groups in an enclosed space. Finally, I said to the

teens, "Listen. We are not going to have a carnival this year. We can't. Not only can we not gather like that, but Purim is in FEBRUARY. We can't even move it outside onto the lawn and continuously wipe everything down. Time to think outside the box, friends."

And think outside the box, we did. I asked the teens what it is about Purim that they love so much; what is it about Purim that makes it so much fun? They said that they love deciding on a theme, dressing up, playing games, having fun together, and being silly. They mentioned hamantaschen more than once. And in that list, we found our solution.

This year, we can't have a carnival, but we can still do something fun together. The teens are going to be leading a Community Hamantaschen Bake on Sunday, February 28th. In lieu of tickets for a carnival, they will be selling hamantaschen making kits that they are putting together themselves. The kits, which must be ordered ahead of time, will be available for pickup at TBT during the week leading up to the event. Once you have your kit in hand, all you need to do is sign onto Zoom and let the teens show you, step by step, how to make hamantaschen. All the while, they will entertain you with silly games, songs, stories, and more peppered throughout the process, and of course while your cookies are baking in the oven.

It might not be a carnival, but it will definitely be everything we love about Purim: fun, silly, raucous – and yes – even costume filled. We hope to see you there!




Shalom From the PTA! By Rachel Minkowsky



Under his direction, the exhibition looks at how artists have historically responded to the rise of authoritarianism and xenophobia as well as racism, anti-Semitism, and other forms of bigotry. The exhibition also addresses issues surrounding immigration, assimilation, and cultural identity." 

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
