INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Refugee Shabbat at TBT

This month, we will once again be participating with congregations around the nation, and with HIAS, in National Refugee Shabbat on March 5-6. This initiative grew out of a desire to bring to light the additional difficulties put in place on refugees and asylum seekers by the U.S. government. The newly inaugurated administration has reinstated some policies that were halted, and ended some other policies to bring America back to being a nation that welcomes those with nowhere else to go. Whether fleeing violence, political or religious oppression, or a life where basic needs are not met, the United States has always made space for a

certain number of refugees and asylum seekers.

Though borders have been closed off more tightly due to COVID-19, there are still, according to the UN, 80 million people displaced from their homes around the world. Of those, some 26 million are classified as refugees. The goal is not to open America's doors to everyone, but to advocate for a policy that is compassionate and in keeping with our values. It's not about open borders, but borders governed by care and welcome. As Jews, we understand what it means to have borders closed on us. We know what it means to not be able to get out of a perilous situation. Too many of our family fell victim to isolationist policies in the 1930s and 1940s.

Immigration is complicated. Seeking refuge or asylum is even more complicated. There are international and federal laws that govern how our nation is supposed to respond to these requests. These requests don't get a simple yes or no. Refugee status requires years of paperwork and vetting through the UN, in an important but often Kafkaesque endeavor. Asylum seekers are entitled to enter the nation, and then make their case. The previous administration changed these rules and required asylum seekers to remain outside the border while making their claim. Last year, I had occasion to see the effects of this policy firsthand on my trip to Texas and Mexico.

On Refugee Shabbat, we'll have the opportunity to learn more about what's happening at the southern U.S. border, as we welcome Marti Michael to share a presentation before our Shabbat Service highlighting the ongoing crisis at the border. As of this writing, it seems like things are slowly beginning to change, and Marti will be able to share the most up-to-date news. The presentation before services at 6:15pm on Friday, March 5, will highlight what we saw last year at the border and discuss what happens next. During the service at 7:15pm, we'll include some additional readings and prayers to highlight the Jewish call to welcome the stranger.

This year HIAS is also including two additional events for the weekend. On Saturday evening, March 6 at 8:00pm, HIAS is hosting a Havdalah, during which we will have the opportunity to come together with hundreds of fellow refugee advocates and activists across the globe. The program will also include a live performance of the song "You Were Strangers" from the spiritual folk-rock show REVIVAL. Pre-registration is required. Please look for links in the Weekly Scroll.

Finally, on Sunday, March 7 at 1:30pm, HIAS is hosting Perspectives on the Global Jewish Movement for Refugees, an afternoon conversation about how global Jewish communities are working to make a meaningful difference. We'll hear from leaders at HIAS and other organizations working in collaboration with Jewish communities in Europe, Canada, Latin America, and the United States in support of and in solidarity with displaced people, and explore how the emergent global Jewish movement for refugees is evolving. This also requires pre-registration and the link will be in the Weekly Scroll.

We are looking forward to continuing our learning and advocacy efforts with regard to the refugee and displaced persons crisis in this world. Join us for the special weekend!

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



We have reached an extraordinary milestone this month. Exactly one year ago we made the heart-wrenching decision to close our building to services, programs, classes and all gatherings. It's difficult to believe that we have completed an entire year of Temple life from Shabbat and holiday services, B'nai Mitzvah, and Religious School classes; to social programming, fundraisers, and most sadly, challenging losses within our community.

Yes, we have accepted this new, and hopefully temporary normal; but on this one-year anniversary I want to pause and reflect, not on what we have lost, but what we have gained in these past twelve months.

We all found out that despite (some of us) having technical deficiencies, most of us could become proficient in online platforms, enough to educate our students and adult learners, pray with each other from our homes, connect socially with each other, share our simchas, and hold each other through difficult times.

Our community remained connected as we found ways to reach each other with gift bags delivered to our homes, shofar services at the beach, programs restructured for ZOOM, hybrid classroom learning, socially distanced programming for our youth, classes taught and hundreds of pounds of food harvested in our beautiful vegetable garden, and many events outdoors under our extended -season Sukkah.

Our streaming cameras were mounted just in time for all of us to be able to share meaningful High Holy Days together from our Sanctuary. Our Torah chanters, Haftarah chanters, and blessers deepened our most holy time of the year with their outstanding and socially distanced pre-recorded moments on the bima.

Friday night and Saturday morning B'nai Mitzvah Shabbat services streamed on Facebook, our website, and on ZOOM have brought together a continually increasing circle of the TBT community, including those who live in other parts of our country. How wonderful that B'nai Mitzvah grandparents in Florida or beyond are still able to make an *aliyah* to Torah for their grandchildren's simcha through ZOOM. We even had one grandparent recently chant his *aliyah* while quarantining in Samoa!

We know that the end of this COVID ordeal cannot come soon enough! But in the meantime, we have learned in this past year new ways to be separate and still be together. We have learned that our TBT community is so much more than the walls of our building. When we do come out of this ordeal, we will have learned many new lessons of how community happens. I am optimistic and excited to see what the new normal will be; but through all this, I am certain that our sacred TBT community will be stronger.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



Passover time again. Last year, I shared with all of you that this is one of my favorite holidays. I gave you the recipe for my Great-Grandmother Jennie's Passover Sponge cake. While telling you all about how this was one of my favorite holidays because I get to see a portion of my family that I see only once per year. Days after I wrote that article, we had to shut down our building completely for COVID.

As I'm sure you can guess, I did not see my family for Passover that year. At least, not in person. Like many of you, my family had a Zoom seder. My nuclear family, my partner, and all of my father's cousins – even the ones who can't usually join us due to time or distance – gathered around our screens and had the same seder we always have...sort of. This was still in the days of toilet paper shortages and scary grocery store runs, and I won't lie to you all; I couldn't find parsley in the store because restocks were few and far between so I brought a shaker of dried McCormick parsley to my seder "table" (it was a couch). It was a weird time,

but it was lovely and special in its own way.

This year, I know I'm still not going to be able to have my whole family (we usually equal somewhere around 25) together for a Passover Seder. We live in two different countries, five different states, and three different time zones all with different infection rates and quarantine rules and everything else. We are, for sure, going to have us another Zoom seder this year. But here is another thing I know; this year will still be better than last year because even though I might not be surrounded by two dozen or so people that I love, I will almost definitely be able to sit at the table with my parents and my brother, and that is something.

As many of you probably know, I recently received my first dose of the COVID vaccine and by the time you are reading this I'll either have just received or will be getting ready for my second. Just days before my writing this, my parents and my brother received *their* second. By the time it is Pesach, the four of us will be able to safely and comfortably sit in a room together and enjoy a festive meal, likely with all of the trimmings. We are all of us very thankful that we were able to qualify (my mother as a healthcare professional, my father due to a heart condition, my brother as a police officer, and me as an educator) and are afforded this opportunity to spend this time together without fear.

All of this is to say, friends, that oftentimes, the articles I have been writing have been about hope. Hope that we can all be together soon, hope that we can return to "normal" as soon as possible, and hope that there is a light at the end of the tunnel. For me, Passover with my family is that light. I can finally start to imagine a day when we have full classrooms, and I can hear laughter and learning and children trying their best to (as Morah Emily says) embrace the phlegm and make that "ch" sound that we all try to achieve perfectly when practicing our Hebrew. This is my light.

Happy Passover, friends, and I wish you the ability to join me in finding the light.



Many thanks to those of you who participated in our **Warm Winter Wishes** project and took the time to send cards, letters, and drawings to the residents of the Meadowbrook Care Center. Isolation is particularly hard on the elderly and just knowing that someone is thinking about them goes a long way!

Civic Engagement does not end at the ballot box. Learning about current issues and communicating with elected officials allows us to participate in the legislative process and increases representation of Jewish values. A number of on-line conferences have highlighted recent or upcoming legislative issues. For example, the **RAC-NY** has selected **Less is More** as their 2021 legislative campaign. On February17 we presented a **Virtual Docent-Led tour** of the Jewish Museum's Exhibition: We Fight to Build a Free World and follow-up discussion. We saw how artists have portrayed their reactions "to the rise of authoritarianism and xenophobia as well as racism, anti-Semitism, and other forms of bigotry," learned about viewing important socio-cultural issues through an artist's lens, and discussed our own responses to the material presented. Thank you all for a lively and informative exploration of the role artists play in highlighting social justice concerns.

TBT is proud to participate, along with over 200 congregations nationwide in HIAS' **National Refugee Shabbat**. We have a full weekend of offerings highlighting the plight of refugees and asylum seekers and the Jewish community's response in addressing our responsibility to "Welcome the Stranger." SELLING OF CHAMETZ

According to tradition, Jews are not allowed to have in their possession any chametz (leaven) during Passover. Literally, this means that before Passover, we must throw out all breads, cakes, cookies, dishes, pots, pans, anything that was used during the year, and any foods not permitted during Passover.

Recognizing the financial burden this would create, the Rabbis instituted the tradition of "*m* 'chirat chametz - - selling of the chametz". By observing this tradition, a Jew can symbolically sell all his/ her chametz to a non-Jew for the period of Passover, and thus, technically, not own any chametz.

According to tradition, during our preparation for Passover, we place all our chametz (dishes and food) in a closet or cabinet that is not opened during the holiday. However, we still technically own the chametz. Therefore, on the morning before Passover (or two days before if Passover starts on Saturday evening), it is customary for us to symbolically sell our chametz.

You may fulfill the obligation of selling your chametz by filling in the coupon below, clipping it, and returning it to the Temple office. Your name will be added to the document that legally (in terms of tradition) relieves you of chametz ownership. You will have then fulfilled your obligation.

Please include at least one dollar with the coupon. This money collected will be passed on to the non-Jew buying the chametz in keeping with the tradition of paying the non-Jew for the service he/she is rendering. His/her deposit for the purchase of the chametz will be paid to the Rabbi.

According to tradition, the remnants of our chametz (bread, cookies, food, etc.) are burned the morning before the first Seder. Since the first Seder falls on Saturday evening, March 27, 2021, chametz will be burned Friday morning, March 26th. If you have any chametz you would like disposed of in this manner, please bring it to the Temple no later than Friday morning, March 26, 2021, by 9:45 am, and join us in our "*Bi-Ur chametz*", the burning of chametz.




