

INSPIRATION FROM OUR RABBI



Yes, the High Holy Days are right on time!

It is a refrain among Jewish professionals that the High Holy Days are never early or late, but they are always right on time. This year, these important days on our calendar arrive especially on time! Now, of course, that's a tongue-in-cheek way of saying that they arrive in early September this year, not late September, or even October. Nonetheless, they always arrive right when we need them, if not always when we might want them.

This year, I'm considering the High Holy Days right on time because Rosh Hashanah arrives as we celebrate Labor Day. On the surface, this might not mean too much, Labor Day and the Days of Awe seem to have very little in common. Labor Day denotes the unofficial end to the summer. It is the date we circle on the calendar telling us that everything reverts from the breeziness of the long sunlit days to the regimen and routine of school and work schedules. The days get shorter as the shadows lengthen, and Labor Day affords us one final opportunity to gather together and revel in the summer warmth.

The High Holy Days can be seen to serve a similar purpose. These days arrive to remind us of the routines that we may have left behind over the previous year; the connections to our history and traditions, the seeking out of the Eternal in our midst, and the commitment to a life on the path of mitzvot, of commandedness, and *ma'asim tovim*, good deeds. The High Holy Days are circled on our calendars to remind us that it's time to come back, it's time to return to that which brings added meaning to our lives: our traditions, our confessions, and our Jewish community.

The High Holy Days have also always been a time when our entire community gathers together; all generations, all kinds of families, all standing before God as one community and congregation. One of the many names for a Jewish house of worship in Hebrew is *Beit Knesset*, literally translated to a house of gathering. How sad it was when we couldn't gather together as a community, and what joy we feel now being back together again for prayer and worship! This year, the especially on time nature of the High Holy Days seems to tell us that we ought not wait any longer than necessary to come together again as a full community.

This year, we will be excited to be able to offer our full High Holy Day worship opportunities both in-person and via live stream. We know that there are members of our community who cannot come in person due to health issues or distance, and so we are grateful that technology and Judaism have evolved to allow for members to be with us from afar and join in all we do. In addition, we know that so many of you are looking forward to being back in person for these important days on our calendar. While we are grateful to have heard that last year's streamed services were meaningful and beautiful, we know that being present adds another layer of power to the days. From the bima, I can also tell you that having the congregation present adds a level of energy and immediacy that are all important parts of the prayer experience. If you can be with us in person this year, we'd love to see you!

The High Holy Day calendar can be found on **page 3** of this edition of the Voice. As we approach these extremely on-time High Holy Days, let me preemptively thank the members of our Ritual Committee and our High Holy Day subcommittee who put in so many hours and days to ensure that everything is taken care of, from ticket distribution to assigning honors, and everything in between and around that is needed. We cannot do it without our dedicated volunteers. In addition, our many participants, readers, shofar blowers, our choir and musicians who put in time over the summer preparing and practicing so that our services are truly our community. How wonderful it will be to have everyone together again, whether live or pre-recorded.

It is an old custom not to wear white after Labor Day. It's an even older custom to wear white on the High Holy Days. This year, as these two days on our two calendars coincide, let us think about the meaning of opportunities for gathering, and let us give thanks that we have the opportunity to come together to ring in 5782. We were apart as we welcomed 5781. The calendar calls us to not spend more time apart than absolutely necessary. Let us hear that call and gather together once again at our Beit Knesset, our house of gathering, to celebrate these sacred days of assembly.

Wishing you and your family a Shanah Tovah u'Metukah! A Sweet and Happy New Year!



NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR



New beginnings are upon us at TBT! As I write this in July, we are welcoming Sheryl Gordon as our new Religious School Director and Eileen Schneyman as our new Executive Director. Our new President, Dee Greenberg, our Board, and our committees are working hard with all of us to bring everyone up to speed over the summer as we work through these transitions and prepare for the High Holy Days around the corner. We are upgrading our Sanctuary, Social Hall, and Kiddush Lounge with state-of-the-art retractable screens this summer along with other improvements throughout the building. What makes this extra "new?" As the vaccination rates reach a comfortable rate, we are also navigating the re-opening of our congregation to normal gatherings, including those extra on-time High Holy Days!

Reopening the Sanctuary to those who are ready to be together again is a wonderful thing. Our Reopening Task Force met throughout this year, determining the safety of our community gatherings. Many thanks to them for helping us navigate this most unusual and difficult year we just experienced. With our new technology, we will not merely go back to "the way it was." Instead, we are reimagining the way we connect with each other to include multi-access Judaism. Our congregation has increased to include those who live a distance away and those who are homebound. We have learned that everyone can experience our TBT community with a bit of help from tech! For services, it means that those in the Sanctuary will be able to see the same videos and images on the new screens that those at home enjoy.

The nature of the lingering pandemic also means that singers and shofar blowers are not yet able to sing together safely in close quarters. In a normal year our magnificent Adult Choir would have been rehearsing together weekly since the spring to be prepared for the High Holy Days. God willing, next year we will be able to do just that! Instead, with a series of intensive rehearsals this summer, our Choir is creating several videos of High Holy Day selections to be shared both on those new screens and on our stream for congregants either in the sanctuary or at home.

Likewise, our Shofar Choir will take on different formats this year. Among other things we are planning to return to Jones Beach after the 2nd Day Rosh Hashanah service for our Shofar Service and Tashlich.

Finally, our TBT Chanting Corp., as always, is working on Torah and Haftarah readings for the High Holy Days. Using our new video tech, we will be able to include those chanters who cannot be with us in person; including our young adults who are either in college or live a distance away.

There is a buzz at Temple with all this excitement and "newness." I am readying for this fall, looking forward to sharing this New Year with an extra dose of gratitude that we have made it through so much *together*, strengthened by our connections, our resilience, and our care for each other.



Since our last issue of the Voice, we hosted an important and informative presentation by Mom's Demand Action and their BeSmart program. BeSmart addresses **Gun Violence Prevention** in a commonsense, practical way. It offers parents and grandparents the tools needed to have important conversations concerning gun ownership and safe storage, and raises awareness of gun ownership issues at the local level. We are most grateful to Janet Goldstein for bringing the program to us. If you were unable to attend, we may be able to provide a link to other BeSmart presentations that are coming up. Let us know if you want info.

Over the summer, SA/SJ again organized a **School Supplies Collection**. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation, many students will be able to start school confident they are prepared for their class and homework assignments.

As we prepare for the building's eventual full re-opening, our **TEVA** committee (Temple Environmental Vision and Action) has begun meeting again to explore TBT's environmental practices and to make recommendations for environmentally responsible and sustainable practices.

This month we are holding our **Annual High Holiday Food Drive**. Despite many re-openings and opportunities for people to return to work, pantries continue to find it difficult to keep up with the food needs of our neighbors here on Long Island. Let's do what we can do to help. See the flyer in this issue of the Voice for details.

The Garden at TBT is now over a year old and continues to grow. As of this writing, we have already tripled the amount of produce donated at this time last year and have increased the number of recipient agencies receiving that produce. Our Garden Volunteers have much to be proud of! Please do not hesitate to let Rabbi Bar-Nahum know, if due to financial difficulties, you are in need of fresh produce. The information will be kept strictly confidential and you will be able to receive periodic deliveries of harvested items. Come visit and follow us on our Facebook page, The Garden at TBT, to learn about what we are up to. Some congregants have asked how they can donate to the garden. There are a few ways: 1) ask about any items on our "wish list", 2) monetary donations are always appreciated and should be made out to Temple B'nai Torah with SA/SJ Garden in the memo, 3) donate your time by volunteering at the garden (a "green thumb" or "good back" is not required.) Thank you for your interest and support.

Last year we co-sponsored, along with a variety of other faith-based groups on Long Island, an on-line presentation by **Integrity**First for America. We learned about IFA's groundbreaking federal lawsuit against the neo-Nazis, white supremacists, and hate groups responsible for the Charlottesville violence and which was scheduled to come to trial last October. That trial will finally be held in a few months. This year, IFA has already won recent judgements such as sanctions against the National Socialist Movement (NSM) for ignoring court orders and concealing/destroying evidence. Anti-Semitism and Hate Crimes continue to plague our country and will be among the committee's themes in the coming year.

Our next meeting will be on Sept. 21 at 7:00 p.m. The TEVA meeting will follow at 8:00 p.m.

A Conversation With... Sarah Hurwitz

After a decade as a political speechwriter for leaders like Hillary Clinton and President Barack Obama and as head speechwriter for First Lady Michelle Obama, Sarah Hurwitz decided to apply her skills as a communicator to writing a book...about Judaism.


