RABBI'S MESSAGE

The Holiness of Study and Learning

As I introduced at this year's High Holy Days, the learning theme for the year will revolve around the Hebrew term קדושה kedushah, often translated as holiness. The core meaning of the term has to do with setting something apart as special.

Throughout this year, we'll be focusing our studies on deepening our understanding of this term, learning what it may have meant to our ancestors compared to our contemporary usage, and finding the ways that we can imbue our lives with additional *kedushah*. We'll begin the month of October with Yom Kippur, during which we read from the Torah portion known as Kedoshim, wherein God commands us to be holy as God is holy. The notion of kedushah is so prevalent in our tradition, that once we start to look for it, we can't help but start to see it all over the place. I look forward to exploring this topic with you!

The Lifelong Learning Committee and I have planned for a text course tracing the origins of the term in our scriptures, in order to gain an understanding of the history of this term, which finds its way into so much of our Jewish life and our Jewish actions. The Hebrew root is the origin for the terms Kiddush (blessing over the wine) and the Mourner's Kaddish (prayer in honor of the deceased). It's also found in every mitzvah blessing we say. When we announce "asher kidishanu be mitzvotav" in the blessing over the candles, for example, we say that through the commandments, God has made us holy. What this means, we will explore together in our course which begins on Sunday, October 23. More details can be found on page 28 of this edition.

In addition to this learning opportunity, our students in the Religious School will be focusing on the theme of holiness in various ways. We'll be helping our young people to begin to understand about the holiness of space, the holiness of time, and the holiness of objects. When we welcome our Torah Scribe in December for our special Torah Restoration Weekend, we will focus on our holy words and our holy Torah. This will culminate in a burial of holy words later this spring (more information to come).

Finally, I'd like to be sure to welcome you to our Simchat Torah celebration on Sunday, October 16, where we'll also celebrate the ceremony known as Consecration. This ceremony welcomes our new students into the tradition of study. The term consecration is derived from the Latin root for holiness. So, when we welcome our students to the act of study, why do we call it a ritual of consecration? What is it about this ceremony that deems that our young students are made holy through it? Though we can't be certain of the origins of the use of the term for this ceremony, it is based on traditions going back centuries that on the first day of a student's learning, they would lick honey from a slate with the Hebrew alphabet on it, so as to always associate learning with sweetness. For our ancestors, honey and sugar would have been available, but not as common as it is for us. It would be used sparingly, and for special purpose.

Today, we offer our students a sweet treat as we welcome them into study. And, in using the term consecration, we begin to teach our children, as we were taught by our parents, about the holiness of learning. The learning we do as Jews is holy because it is special. It is special because it connects us to our God and to our ancestors. It is special because it pushes us to see that education is not just an intellectual pursuit, but also a spiritual one. Study is understood as a commandment of God. The Talmud teaches us that when two gather to study Torah, the presence of God dwells between them. We consecrate ourselves as holy when we study, as we are reminded in our blessing for study, which includes that "asher kiddishanu" phrase. We consecrate our young ones because they need to learn how their study about these holy words, these holy ideas, and the Holy One of Blessing makes them holy, too. Just like it does for all of us.

May we all find many ways in this new year to make ourselves holy through our study and our learning!

Although some of our TBT musical programming has been on hiatus during these past couple of pandemic years, we are blessed with congregants who love music and love to participate through music. Now it is time to begin to bring back our choirs! But what are the benefits of being in a chorus?

Musicality: Singing in a choir improves the way you hear music. It draws out your innate musical abilities and intensifies your appreciation of harmony.

Mental Health: Studies show that choral singing benefits brain function, reinforced feelings of togetherness, and the release of endorphins and oxytocin resulting in reduced stress.

Confidence: Singing together in a choir gives you permission to make a joyful noise as part of a group, building confidence and singing as leaders of our congregation.

Physical: Singing in choir is a great workout for your lungs! Breathing deeply opens up the diaphragm and oxygenates the blood, strengthening the whole body. Singing helps with posture and tones your stomach muscles.

Belonging: We have been through an isolating period of time unlike any! Being together in a choir creates community and a feeling of belonging. We have fun together and learn some of the best contemporary and traditional settings of our Reform tradition. We forge social bonds, support each other and make new friends! So, what are you waiting for?

About our Adult Choir: Since this past Spring our High Holy

Day Adult Choir has been reacquainting themselves with the majestic settings of our tradition. I am indebted to them for their tremendous efforts, meeting for long rehearsals, safely masking and supporting each other as musical settings were perfected. Back on the *bima*, they partner with Rabbi Bar-Nahum and me, and our Music Director, Sean Cotty to help make the High Holy Days meaningful and beautiful for our sacred community. As we look past these High Holy Days, our Adult Choir will continue throughout the year to meet to sing at select services.

About B'nai Shir Choir: Co-led by Emily Altman and me, B'nai Shir has been on hold since the onset of the pandemic. Rehearsals are set to begin October 16th. B'nai Shir Junior Choir (3rd-6th grades) and B'nai Shir Teen Choir (7th-12th grades) participate at Family Services.

The pandemic made it virtually impossible for choirs to meet as we learned that singing spreads the virus much easier to each other. Our TBT Reopening Task Force has been focused on our community's needs, and as we begin our post High Holy Day choir rehearsal schedule we will continue to consult with our experts on the protocols we will offer to safely be together.

Please be in touch with me for more information about our choirs and to sign up. Bring your voices and enjoy creating beautiful musical moments at our services...and make new musical friends! We are just kicking off the New Year and although you can start anytime, this is a great time to join!


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



Why participate in writing a Torah?

Words of Torah are usually in our mouths. We chant the words of Shema and V'ahavta at every service. These words come from the fifth book of the Torah, Deuteronomy. With these words, God tells us how we're supposed to interact with the words of Torah. We are to place them on our hearts. In doing this we show that we love God with all our hearts, souls, and might. Rabbi Abraham Ibn Ezra, who lived in Spain in the 12th century, explains that loving God with our hearts really means loving God with all the knowledge we have, since the heart was the source of knowledge for our ancestors.

One way to increase our knowledge is to participate in an action: to experience. Writing a letter or a word in a sefer Torah is a way for us to experience words of Torah in a physical way. So often for us, words of Torah are ephemeral – ideas passed through generations, lessons we learned as children, or a story of people from long, long ago. Our Tree of Life can be hard to grasp, sometimes.

Writing in the Torah can help us connect not just to the specific scroll we'll be repairing, but to Torah as a whole, and to the idea that as Jews it's not just about the words we learn, but about ensuring that, as the V'ahavta reminds us, we teach these words diligently to our children. In scribing in a Torah, we are participating in an action of I'dor vador, from generation to generation.

Through this writing, we participate in an action of loving God with our hearts, souls, and mights: an action borne of the covenant with God. If we follow the Torah, God will bless us. There is great power in our holy words and our holy scroll, but we know that it's not the letters themselves that lead to holiness in our midst; it's our actions that do that. In writing these letters, which the midrash refers to as "black fire on white fire", we commit to action. We say that we know that these words require that we look after them, that we make sure they are clear and bright and legible for the next generation. And in doing so, we reaffirm our connection with all the words in the scroll. By dedicating ourselves to the act of keeping our Torah scrolls in excellent condition, we dedicate ourselves to the act of keeping God's call.
