RABBI'S MESSAGE

On the Shamash

Almost every *Chanukkiah* I have ever seen has nine spots for candles. The beautiful ones we use here at the Temple, the ones I have at home, and even the ones our students make in Art during Religious School all have 8 spots plus one. One for

each of the eight nights of the holiday, and one extra, the *shamash*. The term *shamash* means servant, and it comes from the Hebrew root which means to make use of or to serve. This makes sense, because for most of us, this is the candle that we use to light the other candles. But this extra slot in the Chanukiah also comes with some dispute as to its purpose and as to how it is meant to be used.

As we all know, as the nights of Chanukah progress, we increase the number of candles. After a debate in the Talmud, Rabbi Hillel's argument that we increase in light as we ought to increase in holiness wins out over Rabbi Shammai's opinion that as the oil would have burned down and faded over the 8 days, so should the light of the Menorah. This year, on Sunday, December 18, we will light the *shamash* as well as the candle for the first night. On Monday, the 19th, we add a candle for the second night, and also light the *shamash*. And so on, until the Chanukiah is filled, radiating light from its 9 candles. But that *shamash*, do we need it? And, once it's done lighting the other candles, why do we keep it lit? The answer to that question has a lot to do with the debate about the 9th candle and its purpose.

According to the Talmud, in tractate Shabbat, the lights of the Chanukah lamp are special and have special purpose. In lighting them, we fulfill a Divine commandment. Because the lights are meant to be used for the fulfillment of the commandment, we are not permitted to make use of the light emanating from the Menorah for anything else. That means that we're not supposed to read by them or use them to illuminate our homes.

Because of the prohibition of making use of the lights, there is also a dispute amongst the rabbis of old about whether or not we can transfer the light directly from one lamp (or candle) to another. This argument is, in turn, based on a dispute about the Menorah in the Temple in Jerusalem. If you

recall, it was that Menorah in the Temple which was lit on that very first Chanukah and which was the beneficiary of the miracle of the eight-day-lasting oil.

Both because of this dispute and because of the prohibition of use of the lights of the Chanukkiah, it has become custom in most communities to add an additional light source near the Chanukkiah in order to officially make use of that light and not the lights on the Chanukkiah. Hence the name *shamash*, because we make use of its light. This is also why the Shamash is often situated at a different height than the others. Some rabbis say the *shamash* must be higher than the others, even, in part because the eight *shamashes* that we use over the holiday represent a higher level of holiness, akin to the Priests of the Temple whose responsibility it was to kindle the lamp. Others say that as long as it is distinct from the eight, the placement is not important.

Because there is no obligation to use the candle for lighting as the additional light, some communities have the custom of using an additional candle, or flame, above and beyond the nine, to light the shamash for the purpose of the light, as well as the flames for the nights of Chanukah in order to fulfill the mitzvah. This custom is more prevalent in the Sepharadic world. Most of us are used to taking the one candle and making use of it to light the others, and then making use of its light.

No matter how you choose to light your Chanukkiah, this year, as we bask in its light, let us remember that 9th spot, and make use of the light of the shamash to inspire us to continue to spread God's light, especially at this darkest time of our year!

Remember to bring your Chanukiah with you to our Chanukah Candle Lighting Shabbat service on Friday, December 23 at 6:30pm. On that night, the sixth of the holiday, we will all need 6 candles for the night and one candle as the shamash. I'll leave it up to you to decide if you'd prefer to bring even one more candle to use as the lighter candle for all seven.

Wishing you and your family a very happy Chanukah! May the lights of this season brighten our hearts and our souls!

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

As the days grow shorter, we know that Chanukah is around the corner. The traditions we shared as children we pass on to our young ones each year. Chanukiot are lit at night and blessings and songs are sung retelling the story of bravery, miracles and freedom. Perhaps a game of dreidel and a plate of freshly made latkes will fill

the house with laughter and our bellies with special treats. And then there are the presents. Do you follow the custom of giving gelt or giving presents each night?

A colleague of mine shared with me a new 'tradition' one of his congregants added to their family Chanukah celebration. Here is the concept: Instead of eight nights of receiving presents how about introducing four nights of receiving and four nights of giving? Our children seem to lack for nothing, thank goodness, and the commercialization of the season only adds to that notion. As our kids enjoy their presents, we can use this opportunity to remind them that there are also those who are in desperate need.

Tzedakah and mitzvot come in many forms. Perhaps one night we might allocate a portion of the gelt to make an online donation to Mazon or another favorite charity. Another night, collect the winning pot of the dreidel game and buy bulk socks at Costco or BJs to donate to a local shelter. A third night could

include collecting gently used coats to bring to temple for our annual collection. With Chanukah falling during Christmas, how about volunteering to help at a soup kitchen on Christmas when regular volunteers would like to be home with their families? (My mom and I did that for several years when I was young.) You get the idea. Let the choice of tzedakah or mitzvah be a family discussion so that everyone is included.

We all know that this time of year, there is a greater need than ever for compassion. We hear daily of food pantries that are running low on supplies, soup kitchens that have long lines, and shelters that are overflowing. Instead of celebrating only excesses, let us use the Chanukah message of miracles to create a couple of our own for those who are so less fortunate than us. What a wonderful message we then offer our children. Perhaps a new 'tradition' might take hold this year in your family? Let me know if you try it out.

Chag Urim Sameach! May the Festival of Lights bring you and yours warmth and light and may we find ways to spread that warmth and light to others.

Social Action/Social Justice Committee

The entire Social Action/Social Justice Committee wishes you and your families a very Happy Chanukah!

Chanukah provides many themes for reflection and inspiration. The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism's *Sustaining the Light: A Social Justice Program Guide for Chanukah* (https://www.rac.org/sites/default/files/Chanukah%20Guide%20May%2025.pdf) illustrates the connection between Chanukah and a variety of current social justice issues. For example, "because of its theme of light in the midst of winter, Chanukah lends itself to thoughts of energy conservation. Energy conservation not only helps to ensure the wise use of our natural resources, it also helps to reduce pollution and slow global climate change" One day's worth of oil lasted for eight days - now that's energy conservation! Gift-giving has become a big part of the Chanukah celebration. The guide suggests that "we can become excited not only about the great gifts we'll receive, but also about the ways we can use our blessings and our gifts — by making monetary donations, material donations, volunteering, and participating in advocacy— to ensure the well-being of all..." Chanukah has certainly become a children's holiday. When we work for social justice in any or the many areas that need attention, we also ensure the wellbeing of all children and future generations. In the time of King Antiochus many Jews (led by those whom we know as the Maccabees) needed to stand up for their beliefs and to fight to be able to practice their religion freely. Consider that preserving the separation of church and state protects against the dangers of government interference with religious practice and learn about how to protect that freedom.




