RABBI'S MESSAGE

Bigger and Bigger, a Passover Teaching

As I write this, we're putting the finishing touches on our celebrations for Purim, a holiday which tradition teaches us is meant to increase our happiness. We are reminded, " מי שנכנס אדר מרבים בשמחה (the month of Adar arrives, our joy

increases." The entire month of Adar is a time of joy and celebration as the spring arrives. And it seems like as soon as we finish our last hamentashen, we turn our attention toward Passover, our celebration and reenactment of freedom. This year, Passover begins with our Chametz Burning on Wednesday, morning, April 5. That evening is the first seder. Interestingly, just as we increase our joy in Adar, Passover calls on us to increase as well.

The story starts with increase and the Haggadah then rewards an increase. Many of us are familiar with the singing of Avadim Hayinu, we were slaves in Egypt, during the early parts of the seder, right after the four questions. The end of that paragraph in the Haggadah often gets overlooked, as we make our way into the stories of the rabbis' seders of old. The end of the Avadim Hayinu paragraph reads: "And even if we were all sages, all discerning, all elders, all knowledgeable about the Torah, it would be a commandment upon us to tell the story of the exodus from Egypt. מְּלֶבֶּה לְסִבֶּר חַמֶּרְבֶּה לְסִבּר And anyone who increases in telling the story of the exodus from Egypt, behold they are praiseworthy."

First, we read that no matter our level of learning, we

are supposed to tell the story. Then, we read that by increasing the telling of the story, we gain extra points. What does it mean to increase the telling of the story? On one level, it means to do whatever we can to make the story exciting and interesting. We come back to the same story every year, so we have to find ways to make it exciting and interesting. It could be something silly and fun for the kids like puppets or masks of the 10 plagues, to keep their attention and teach them in fun ways. It could look more like a discussion about what freedom really means to each of us with teenagers. It could be a discussion among adults and making a donation to an organization that works toward freedom, in whatever way you understand that. The Seder is supposed to increase our thinking and acting as much as our remembering.

Increasing the telling of the story is often understood to mean speaking at length. But the increase is debated, and there is a dispute about how long the Seder should continue. Should we go on, like the rabbis in B'nei Brak, until morning? Is that what it means to be free? Ultimately, the rabbis say that going on for too long is not ideal either. A seder should keep our attention, and remind us of the price and importance of freedom, and the empathy we are called to as we see ourselves in the shoes of the Israelites in their escape. It shouldn't take all night. As we increase our telling, we increase our connection.

Increasing our discussion and interest in the seder is but one positive result of the work of increase. According to the Ephod Bad, a 19th century Polish commentary on the Haggadah, "Those who speak at length about the Exodus come to perceive divine guidance in all things." If we find ourselves able to talk about and discuss our redemption epic, we will come to see God's role in world in a new way. In delving deeper, finding the fun and joy, and retelling the story to the next generation, we will come to open ourselves up to the divine in the world. When we allow for the wonder and joy and praise of freedom, then we allow for God's presence to increase in our lives and then the work of Passover will be made all the more complete. For a holiday that seeks to get rid of the leaven, there's so much we can increase!

Wishing you a Chag Pessach Sameach, a very Happy Passover!

Pesach is here! It is a celebration that is predominantly home-based. For weeks we have been cleaning our pantries, shopping for special Pesach foods, collecting new recipes, learning new songs and practicing old ones, and inviting our Seder guests. But one aspect of Pesach preparation that should not be overlooked is reviewing the

haggadah tucked away on a shelf.

In the Torah we read the epic story of our freedom from slavery. We are then also commanded in Torah to celebrate the festival of Pesach and retell the story of our redemption to our children each year. Every haggadah edition contains the basic structure and order of the 'telling' and there are many interesting variations in print. Nevertheless, we can each tailor the ancient story (and our personal stash of haggadot) to include modern day elements.

Relevance is vital to keeping Judaism alive, especially for our children. By adding and explaining newer Seder symbols like the orange or Miriam's cup, or adding modern plagues to the

ten plagues discussion, we deepen the ritual and create a more significant family tradition. One way to update the haggadah is to consider looking at the themes of social justice throughout the story and create questions for discussion around the Seder table. Last year I added both sunflower seeds to my Seder plate and a special prayer for the Ukranian people and their current struggle from war and persecution. Sunflower seeds will be added to my Seder plate again this year.

After our Seders are completed we will join as a community for Yizkor and final day Festival services. Please note that we will hold our evening Yizkor on Tuesday, April 11th at 6:30pm and a final day Pesach Festival Morning Service, Yizkor, and luncheon on Wednesday, April 12th at 10:30am. Please check our Ritual Calendar for more details.

May the festival of Pesach be meaningful, joyful and sweet as we gather together! As we celebrate the ancient story of freedom and renewal, may we also be inspired to bring new depth and relevance to our own Jewish journey.

But most importantly, Passover to me is a story about becoming who I am meant to be, each and every year. Each year I challenge myself to try a new recipe, read about a new topic. Hello, I'm Elliott Greenberg, your Temple B'nai Torah Treasurer.

Two years ago, I was asked if I would run for the position, and needless to say, I was unaware of all that job entailed.

As the treasurer, I work with the Finance Committee to prepare a budget and help manage the temple's finances. It's quite the task. There are many people who do a lot to support the work that allows us to run effectively.

When I began my term, we were in the midst of Covid and there were many uncertainties.

We survived Covid! We continue to "re-open" and provide the kinds of fun and meaningful events we've all grown accustomed to as we continue to face a challenging economic environment.

The temple's finances are funded primarily by four (4) income streams:

Dues, Contributions, Bingo, Investment income

As everyone is aware, we increased dues last year after not having raised dues for 5 years. The increase was long overdue and has provided a boost in our due's income. Our Bingo revenue has been slow to return to pre Covid levels, but continues to trend in the right direction.

I'm sure I don't need to tell you about the investment environment. Not good is an under-statement, but we know, over time, things will improve.

Lastly, the constant kindness of our congregation is truly a blessing. Our fundraising efforts continue to bring in meaningful donations that help close the income gap.

The Finance Committee and I are committed to running a balanced budget. Under the current model we are failing to meet our goal.

With the help of the Long-Range Planning Committee, the Finance Committee is focused on presenting a budget and a 5-year capital improvement plan that will give the temple the financial stability required.

As we work to present a plan, there are 3 ways we will work to close the budget gap. Most synagogues operating under a loss, are faced with either an increase in cost (dues) and/or a reduction of services. We are fortunate to have an additional option, our investment funds.

While we are wary of dipping into our "savings", it's obvious it must be a consideration.

All options are being discussed.

I invite you to get involved with the finance committee and look forward to speaking to you at our congregational town hall on Sunday, June 4th.

SELLING OF CHAMETZ

According to tradition, Jews are not allowed to have in their possession any chametz (leaven) during Passover. Literally, this means that before Passover, we must throw out all breads, cakes, cookies, dishes, pots, pans, anything that was used during the year, and any foods not permitted during Passover.

Recognizing the financial burden this would create, the Rabbis instituted the tradition of "m'chirat chametz – selling of the chametz". By observing this tradition, a Jew can symbolically sell all their chametz to a non-Jew for the period of Passover, and thus, technically, not own any chametz.

According to tradition, during our preparation for Passover, we place all our chametz (dishes and food) in a closet or cabinet that is not opened during the holiday. However, we still technically own the chametz. Therefore, on the morning before Passover, it is customary for us to symbolically sell our chametz. You may fulfill the obligation of selling your chametz by filling in the coupon below, clipping it, and returning it to the Temple office. Your name will be added to the document that legally (in terms of tradition) relieves you of chametz ownership. You will have then fulfilled your obligation.

Please include at least one dollar with the coupon. This dollar will be passed on to the non-Jew buying the chametz in keeping with the tradition of paying the non-Jew for the service they are rendering. Their deposit for the purchase of the chametz will be paid to the Rabbi.

According to tradition, the remnants of our chametz (bread, cookies, food, etc.) are burned the morning before the first Seder. Since the first Seder falls on Wednesday evening, April 5, 2023, chametz will be burned that Wednesday morning, April 5th at 9:45am. If you have any chametz you would like disposed of in this manner, please bring it to the Temple no later than Wednesday morning, April 5, 2023 at 9:45 am, and join us in our "*Bi-Ur chametz*", the burning of chametz.
