RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Daniel Bar-Nahum



Beginnings and Endings

As this edition of the Voice arrives, we have already begun our celebration of Sukkot, one of my favorite times of year. After the majesty of Rosh HaShanah and the awe of Yom Kippur, Sukkot brings us back down to earth. This Festival of Harvest grounds us.

even as it asks us to focus on impermanence. We spend extra time in nature before the winter's rains and long nights force us back indoors. We take up our harvest and marvel at all that God created. We welcome guests into our huts mimicking Abraham and Sarah. Through these actions we remind ourselves of the importance of relationships and kindness to others.

The end of Sukkot brings us additional opportunities for celebration as we arrive at Simchat Torah and Shemini Atzeret. These holidays are about endings and beginnings. On Friday, October 6, at 6:30 we will gather to celebrate the Torah and that we are ending and beginning another cycle of reading. During this service, we unroll the entire scroll around our Sanctuary and get a chance to see the entirety of our people's spiritual history surrounding us. We read the Torah's final verses and then we immediately continue with the first verses, symbolizing that Torah never ends for us. It is a joyous evening with lots of singing and dancing.

Connecting to the cycle of learning, Simchat Torah also sees us celebrate Consecration, welcoming our new students beginning their journey of Jewish learning. All of our new students will be welcomed to the bima for a special blessing during our Simchat Torah service. They will also receive a special certificate and a treat to remind them that learning is sweet. We are so excited to see so many new students in our youngest grades, and we look forward to celebrating with them and their families.

On Saturday, October 7, at 10:30am we will gather for our Atzeret Morning Service which will include Yizkor. Atzeret serves as the end of the dry season and the beginning

of the rainy season, causing our prayers to shift from a focus on dew to a focus on rain. Shemini Atzeret is only vaguely explained in the Torah, but it is essentially the "late check out" from the High Holy Days. The way the Rabbis explain it, God has been having such a good time through the holiday season with all our prayers and good deeds, that God wants to linger a little longer with us. "Add another day," God says, "I'm not ready to go back to the mundane just yet. I know it's the end, but I don't want it to be!"

Arriving at Simchat Torah means that we go back to the beginning of our story, back to Genesis and Creation. As I explained in this space last month, the start of our Torah Cycle will be our opportunity to shift our focus to the Haftarah Cycle, learn more about the Prophets, and welcome our Scholar in Residence, Rabbi Barbara Symons. Rabbi Symons will join us for Shabbat, November 10-11, to share from and about her new volume: *Prophetic Voices: Renewing and Reimagining Haftarah*. You can see more information about all of our learning focused on Haftarah and Prophets by turning to page 5. Please also see Cantor Timman's article on page 4 which has details about our Torah and book burial scheduled for Sunday, November 5.

Arriving at Simchat Torah also means that, with the High Holy Days behind us, we pick up the work of our congregation. Over the last year, I have been working as a part of our congregation's Long Range Planning Committee, about which Dee Greenberg, our Immediate Past President had previously informed you. This committee will be wrapping up the first part of its work this month and presenting its findings and recommendations to the Board of Trustees. We look forward to sharing the plans with you in the coming months. We are confident that with this plan as our guide, we will ensure that TBT will continue to thrive and grow into the congregation of excellence we know we can be.

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

In Ecclesiastes we read "For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under Heaven." This holds true for the time when sacred objects are no longer able to be used. At TBT we have been blessed with many Torahs from our three legacy congregations. After careful evaluation by our Sofer, Neil Yerman and our Torah

Committee, one of our Torahs has been marked as both *pasul* (not kosher) and not repairable. It is now part of our Temple *Geniza*, a temporary storage for sacred objects that are designated to be buried in a cemetery.

On November 5th we will hold a Service of Farewell to our Torah during our morning Junior Congregation. It will be led by our sixth-grade class who has been studying rituals of death and burial. As a congregation we will then meet at New Montefiore Cemetery to hold a very special burial of our Torah and sacred books from our Geniza.

Do you have old sacred books that need to be disposed of properly? A book that should be buried is one that include God's name. (I have several old siddurim that I am adding to the Geniza for burial.) If you would like to donate any old sacred

books, please drop them off at the Temple office by October 22nd. If you are donating books, we ask for an \$18 suggested donation to defray our burial costs.

We extend our gratitude to Eileen Schneyman and her family for donating a grave in her family circle at New Montefiore. Thanks also to Rabbi Emeritus Lowenberg who has assisted us with Star of David Funeral Home logistics and has been working with our sixth-grade class and teachers.

Please join us for our Service of Farewell on November 5th beginning with a special Junior Congregation at 10:30am. Carpooling is recommended as we reconvene at New Montefiore Cemetery's main office at 12pm and continue to the plot for our special ceremony and burial. Please look for our flyer with updates and more information as the date approaches.

We look forward to sharing this meaningful Torah life-cycle experience with our entire TBT family.

Selichot Dinner Recipes

The Selichot Dinner, held on September 9th, was a huge success with many requests for our recipes for <u>Blintze Souffle</u> and <u>French Toast Casserole</u>. It's our pleasure to share them here with all of you. They originally appeared in the 2016 edition of the Temple Emanu-El Sisterhood Cookbook. Thank you to Amy Neidle and Micky Alterman for originally submitting them:

French Toast Casserole with Praline Topping (Credit Paula Deen)

French Toast:

1 challah (about 1 lb.) 2 Tbsp sugar

butter or cooking spray

8 lg eggs

2 cups half & half

1 Tbsp vanilla extract

½ tsp cinnamon

½ tsp nutmeg (optional)

1 cup milk (reg or fat free) dash of salt

Cut challah into large cubes, about 1 inch.

Put challah into buttered 9 x 13 baking dish.

In a large bowl, combine eggs, half & half, milk, sugar, vanilla, cinnamon, nutmeg & salt, whisk until well blended.

Pour mixture over challah, evenly distributing.

Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight or for approx. 8 hours.

When ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Spread praline topping (see below) evenly over top.

Bake, uncovered for 60 minutes, until puffed and golden.

Praline Topping:

2 sticks softened butter 2 Tbsp light corn syrup

1 cup light brown sugar, packed $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp cinnamon

1 cup chopped pecans ½ tsp nutmeg (optional)

In a bowl, combine butter, brown sugar, pecans, corn syrup, cinnamon & nutmeg. Mixture will be crumbly. Spread over challah mixture after refrigeration.

The recipe can be made with sugar substitutes.

Freezing for future use before baking works well. Defrost & add topping, then bake.

Blintze Souffle

1 stick butter 6 eggs
Cinnamon, to taste 3/4 c sugar
2 1/2 tsp vanilla

1 dozen blintzes, any flavor (frozen or fresh, using Nadine's recipe below)

Defrost blintzes, if using frozen. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Melt butter and pour into 3 qt flat dish or disposable aluminum tray,

Arrange blintzes in single layer.

Sprinkle with cinnamon.

In separate bowl, beat eggs, slowly adding sugar while beating.

Stir in sour cream and vanilla until well blended.

Pour mixture over blintzes.

Bake for 40-60 minutes, until brown.





Nadine's Mom's Famous Cheese Blintzes

Yields 8-10 blintzes

Ingredients:

1 16 oz container cottage cheese (preferable large curd or country style)

1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar to taste

2 eggs (one for the outside, one for the filling)

1 c water

3/4 c flour

1/4 cup matzo meal

butter for pan

one very clean non-stick 8-inch pan

floured paper bag to bang "bletals" (crepes) onto paper towels

Crepes:

In a large bowl beat one egg, 1 cup of water and 3/4 cup of flour with a whisk.

Pour through a strainer and mush all the flour with your fingers into the liquid in the bowl with the mixture. preheat pan on medium heat.

Put a small amount of butter on a piece of paper towel. Lightly rub butter around onto the hot pan.

Next, pour a half cup of batter into the pan and swoosh it around to coat the pan. Now pour it out back into the bowl, leaving a thin coating in pan. This will leave a lip-type flap for later.

When the ends curl down a bit take pan off of the flame and turn it over, banging it onto your floured paper bag on the counter.

As you add a couple more you can stack them neatly on top of each other. The floured surface keeps them from sticking to each other.

Cheese filling:

In a bowl, mix cottage cheese,1 egg, sugar and matzo meal. Mix with a spoon to combine. If you like a sweeter filling, you may add more sugar to sweeten it or matzo meal to make it firmer.

To fill crepe:

Lay the crepe with the rounded side by you and the flap at the top, browned side up.

Put a tablespoonful into the middle of the circle (browned side) fold it once, pull the sides in and wrap it up and flap will close it well.

Keep doing this till all are done.

To cook blintzes:

Using the same cooking pan or a larger skillet, add a small amount of butter or margarine.

Cook until it is golden brown and flip to the other side.

Take them out and enjoy with fruit compote, cinnamon and sugar, or sour cream.

These blintzes DO NOT HAVE TO BE PAN FRIED FOR THE BLINTZ SOUFFLE! They are just rolled and 12 are placed into the pan.

You may also make them into potato blintzes with mashed potato and some seasoning to your liking.

What is a Uniongram

Before 1913, Blanche Stoltz attended the wedding of a young German couple. Before the wedding, Blanche noticed that many of the letters of Mazel Tov the couple received were sent in the same kind of envelope. The bride explained that she had belonged to a Jewish girls' club in Germany that raised money for charity by sending messages on beautiful cards for its members.

After Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ) was founded, Blanche remembered the cards and envelopes. It was suggested that the cards be called "Uniongrams," after two organizations strongly connected to WRJ: the Union for Reform Judaism and Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR).

Almost from the beginning, Uniongrams were sold to raise money for the Scholarship Fund, which then supported students training to become rabbis at HUC-JIR. Since 1955, proceeds from the sale of Uniongrams have gone to support the WRJ YES Fund, which empowers Jewish

women and girls and strengthens Reform Judaism through partnerships with Reform Movement organizations.



The sending of uniongrams has been a self-supporting, "not for profit" program supported by Sisterhood for upwards of forty years. It connects congregant to congregant, family to family and friend to friend. The delivering of these wishes lets others know how much we care, spreads goodwill and of course provides the occasional smile.

Please continue to support this essential program. Uniongrams can be found monthly via online flyers, the TBT Scroll, the Voice, in the flyer rack by the social hall and the monthly invoice/hardcopy mailing by those who choose to do so.
