RABBI'S MESSAGE

The Meaning of Chanukah

Chanukah is a joyous time for the Jews: games and fun foods, songs, and candles in the darkness. We all have a great time at our annual PTA Chanukah Brunch (this year on Sunday, December 10). We have

focused our attentions in recent years on ways that the messages of this holiday are universalist: dedication, identity, light. This is, in part, due to Chanukah's coincidental closeness to Christmas. There is nothing wrong with seeking broad, feel-good connections to our holidays. It makes them more accessible, and easier to share with those around us.

At the same time, are we doing a disservice to our traditions and history if we don't fully know and understand where they came from? Chanukah isn't really about the oil lasting. That story, like most of our miracle stories, is grounded in myth. The historical Chanukah was really about the right to be a free people in our own land. The historical Chanukah was a battle for Jewish survival. The historical Chanukah shares many parallels with the world as we see it today.

The Maccabees were not perfect heroes. Much has been written specifically to remind us of the ways that the Maccabees, after their victory, leaned into the worst impulses of leadership and power. The rabbis of old were not fans either, which is why the Maccabees story doesn't even make it into the Bible. And yet, the Maccabees remain the heroes of the story for us, and for Jews for generations. We sing about them, we honor their grit and determination, and we hold them up as the saviors of our people and our religion. They defeated the Syrian-Greek King Antiochus in battle.

What was so bad about Antiochus? According to the book of Maccabees, in response to what he incorrectly perceived to be a revolt against his rule, Antiochus outlawed Jewish practice. He forced the Jews to eat pork and to work on Shabbat. He outlawed circumcision and desecrated the Temple in Jerusalem through syncretic worship. Though we cannot be certain that this all happened as written, the Jews were angry enough at whatever was done to begin a revolt against Greek rule. According to Josephus, Antiochus then seized land, erected pagan altars throughout the countryside, and massacred many Judeans.

And this is where the Hasmonean family, later called the Maccabees, come in. It is the family of Mattathias, a priest from Modi'in, who begins to fight back against the oppressive Greek policy.

Mattathias refuses to worship the Greek's idols. He kills both Jews who do participate and the Greeks who are forcing them. He then flees with his family to the hills and begins a guerrilla revolt.

The Maccabees sought to preserve their way of life, their Judaism, on their ancestral homeland. They sought to fight back against those who sought to kill them and end Judaism. They banded the Jewish people together to fight back and to expel the foreign influence from their midst. Chanukah is a story about a war for the homeland. In victory, the Hasmoneans establish an independent monarchy in the land of Israel, lasting for about 100 years.

Hatikvah is not the anthem of Chanukah. When the Israeli anthem speaks about the 2000-year-old hope, it does look back, in part, to the last time the Jews were sovereign on their land before 1948, which was the period of the Hasmonean kingdom. The hymn for Chanukah is, instead, *Maoz Tzur*, Rock of Ages, which was written during the 13th century CE, the time of the Crusades. We often sing one verse in English, praising God's word as breaking the sword of the Greeks. But the hymn in Hebrew has six verses, which go through God's miracles of old. The hymn retells the Jews' redemption from Egypt, Babylonia, Haman, and ultimately, the Greeks. It reminds us of the many times in our history that our existence has been threatened and how each time God came to save us.

Yet, we know from history, that though God was certainly present, it was the Jewish people whose grit and fight helped to redeem themselves from Antiochus. It was the Jewish people who postponed the 8-day festival of Sukkot due to war, celebrating it, instead, in the winter after the Temple was cleansed and rededicated. It was the Jewish people who took matters into their own hands and wrought their own miracles when necessary.

Like the Maccabees of old, as of this writing, we are in a time of fighting for the continuation of the land of Israel. The fight between Israel and Hamas is the fight to maintain the freedom of the Jewish People on our ancestral homeland. This year, as we light the candles of our chanukiah, let us think about the fight and sacrifice of the Maccabees of old, and be grateful for the fight and sacrifice of the IDF of today, which ensures that our millennia-long dream remains a reality.

May the lights of this Chanukah be a harbinger of peaceful days ahead for us all, and may they inspire us to remember all that is needed to sustain the land of Israel.

Gathering this December. Originally planned as a few days of celebrating the Reform Movement's 150th anniversary and exploring the Movement's future, programming will now be focusing on solidarity with Israel and information and tools to effectively lead through this moment.

Dear friends, my heart remains in the East. Both Rabbi Bar-Nahum and I, along with our colleagues from around the country and under the auspices of the CCAR and ACC, are also looking for the right times to go to Israel on short missions over the next few months. We are ready to help when asked. Colleagues who are there right now are consoling those in mourning, counseling those who are in deep distress, supporting our exhausted and overwhelmed Israeli colleagues, and bringing light and comfort wherever possible. Rabbi and I deeply appreciate our Temple family's support as we take short missions to Israel in the next months.

And as we find opportunities for our TBT family to help, we will continue to share timely information through our social media platforms and email. For now, I encourage taking breaks from the news, continuing to send monetary donations when possible, practicing self-care, and praying fervently for our People. Am Yisrael Chai!

May the extra brightness of Chanukah bring light to these dark times.





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RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

This month we will celebrate Chanukah, a time to rejoice in the miracle of defeating our enemies, but also it is about the miracle of finding enough light to sustain us through the darkest of moments.

We can sometimes feel like we are in a state of exceedingly pervasive darkness. We are facing a rise in antisemitism, we are watching wars happen all over the globe. We have two options: We can hide our heads in the sand and ignore the problem or we can be a beacon of light to all who need it. (The third option, fighting with strangers on the internet, should never be a viable alternative.) Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr is quoted as saying "Darkness cannot drive out darkness, only light can do that".

That is the essence of Chanukah. With our light, we will squash the darkness. With our candles, with our hope, we will remove the darkness from our days. 

Programs hosted by Milton Berle, Steve Allen, and Ed Sullivan featured a wide variety of musicians including Bill Haley & the Comets, Fats Domino, Buddy Holly, and Elvis Presley, who appeared on all three shows to an electrifying response. Afternoon dance programs like American Bandstand played a role as well in bringing rock to large and eager teenage audiences. Then, in 1964, the appearance of the Beatles on The Ed Sullivan Show would change the face of pop culture, leading to an explosion of televised rock, from prime-time rock variety shows like Shindig and Hullabaloo, to the sitcom rock antics of The Monkees, and the jubilant renewal of Elvis Presley in the "Comeback Special" of 1968. This is a 60-minute program.

We will also celebrate December birthdays.



In my family, the question I am asked most is how much have you cried so far since they know that I am sensitive? I can honestly say that I have not cried too often yet! Thank you all! Please – if anyone has any questions, do reach out to me. I will try to find answers and solutions or reason why it is not the best practice.

Oddly, December is going to be a mostly guiet month for PTA—at least the second half will be. The first half is a flurry of activity.





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
