RABBI'S MESSAGE

Hearing God's Call

As I'm writing this article for The Voice, I'm in the midst of preparing for my mission to Israel. Over the course of this month, I will look forward to sharing about it with you, and I will be looking forward to donating the many items we collected and making

good use of the funds donated toward Israel. Thank you to all who donated for your generosity, and for all who sent notes of encouragement and wishes for a safe journey. It's really great to know that I have the community's support behind me as I proudly represent TBT on missions like this.

In my note to the congregation announcing my trip, I mentioned that I often feel God's voice calling me to places. I'd like to think that I have at least a little bit of an understanding of Abraham when he hears God's call in the book of Genesis: "Lech lecha / Go forth." This is, for me, not a new feeling, and also not one that I feel very often. So, when it does come about, I try to pay attention to it. Listening to the call has guided me to many of my most powerful experiences.

I felt this sense of being called to a place when I volunteered as the chef at the HUC-JIR Soup Kitchen, where every Monday we provided a hot meal for over 100 guests, many unhoused, others scraping to get by. I knew during my time working there that I could have spent my Monday afternoons doing any number of other things, as a busy seminarian. Yet, each week I knew that the right place to be, for me, was in that kitchen. Each week we welcomed young people to come and help out, as well. We taught them the importance of giving with grace and treating those in need with respect. We were able to put into action the words of the prophet Isaiah who reminds us that God prefers we feed the hungry rather than fasting or offering sacrifices. Each week, I knew I was in the right place.

In pre-COVID 2020, when we saw what was happening at the US southern border, I felt called to go see what was happening and to help. Together with a few congregants and colleagues, we visited the border, cooked food for those held in limbo in Mexico, taught some school lessons, and learned a lot about the complexities and injustices of the current immigration system. As an immigrant, and as someone whose family

benefitted from the United States's opening its doors to provide access to a better life, I felt and continue to feel strongly about allowing people into the United States who seek the same opportunities. As a Jew, we are commanded over and over again that there should be one law for citizen and stranger alike. While the commands of the Torah should not be used to make American Law, the value of welcome and allowing others to live among us prompts me to seek ways to make our nation more welcoming. Being at the border was powerful in ways I could not have foreseen and opened my eyes to so much.

Early last year, as Reform Rabbis gathered in Israel for our annual conference, I felt compelled to join my colleagues at a Demonstration for Democracy, and against the then-planned Judicial overhaul legislation in the Knesset. I believe in an Israel that strives for equality and equal treatment under the law. I believe in an Israel where the power to govern is shared so that no one person or party can dictate from the minority. I feel strongly that there is an ideal version of Israel that we will constantly work toward. I felt compelled to join these demonstrations because Israel is so important to me that I don't want to see it undermined from the inside. These last months have shown us we have enough adversaries to contend with. Standing with so many other Israelis of all stripes, advocating for a better Israel was a powerful and emotional moment for me.

This sense of God's presence in the form of a call to go somewhere first comes to Abraham, who is sent to the land of Israel. Since October 7, I'm sure many of us have felt the pull toward Israel. I'm sure many of us have been reminded of Israel's importance to the Jewish People in deep and powerful ways. I know many of us have sought ways to help from afar, and to support from afar.

I'm on the precipice of a trip to Israel unlike any other in my lifetime, and I am excited and nervous. The opportunity I have been given to be an emissary of our community is truly a blessing. I am sure that this experience will be powerful, meaningful, and difficult. It will be made all the more impactful when I get to share about it with you in the weeks ahead.

A New Year and New Hope

As I write this, Israel is fighting courageously to eradicate the Hamas terrorist organization embedded in Gaza. Approximately 137 Israelis are still in

captivity and have not even been seen by the International Red Cross. We hear from those who have been released horror stories from their captivity. Our hearts are in the East and Rabbi Bar-Nahum is set to go on a rabbinic mission to Israel in just a few days.

I am so proud of our TBT Family for the generous donations to his mission. You heard the call for help and answered with needed essential winter clothing for Israelis who are displaced and for IDF soldiers. Generous monetary donations have been coming in and Rabbi will disseminate them to the organizations he works with on his mission. On this cold and dark December, we are watching and praying with Israel. I have hope that with this new year we will begin to see a light at the end of the tunnel to a very difficult, painful, and exhausting 2023.

With antisemitism all around us in our community we at TBT are holding on to each other, finding ways to stay connected,

sending messages of support to our college students, holding information sessions with congregants, and increasing security around our Temple campus. We are strengthening our temple entrances, beefing up our security for events and services, and joining in rallies and gatherings to support each other and Israel. Many of you have joined me in attending local large rallies and information sessions regarding the war and antisemitism issues. Eileen Schneyman and I also look forward to bringing home helpful tools from the URJ gathering this winter.

I have hope that we will get through every bit of this dark time together, stronger and more connected. More than ever TBT is a place of community in addition to being a place of worship. Our community is active, thriving, and continually moving forward. If you are feeling a little lost or unengaged, reach out to Rabbi Bar-Nahum or me to chat. We are here for you!

With this new secular year, my prayer is that 2024 brings renewed peace and security to Israel, a return of all the captives to their loved ones, and an end to antisemitic acts here and everywhere.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The Gregorian calendar has one New Year at the start of the new year. The Jewish calendar has four new years throughout our secular year. The most popular and well known is Rosh Hashanah (the head of the year). The others are the first of Nissan (when the exodus story begins), the first of Elul (new year of animals), and Tu B'shevat (the new year of the trees).

As I reflect upon the New Year, I have much to celebrate and be grateful for including family, friends, community and Temple B'nai Torah. But I feel like we talked about gratitude in November, so let's move on to our resolutions for the new year.

This will help TBT continue to be up and running and a leading Reform Temple of Nassau County. We would like to continue to provide a Jewish home for those in this area. We would also like to continue our cordial relationship with our community and other religions around us.

Now for the question of the month – why does TBT have to charge for everything? TBT is a non-profit organization that is not sponsored by an archdiocese or any other organization. Our dues only cover a little over 50% of our budget. The religious school is subsidized by the Temple by approximately \$100,000, which is very typical. We must fundraise for the rest. At the minimum, we must cover our costs for events, but realistically we must fundraise to meet our operating needs and maintain our level of service to our members.

A Collection to "Support the Girls"





This year, Sisterhood will be collecting new and very gently worn (and laundered) bras to assist I Support the Girls to help women experiencing homelessness, impoverishment, or distress with essential items like bras to take care of their self-esteem and personal health. Bras are more than just an everyday essential; they also provide women with dignity and protection.

Whether it digs in, rides up, chafes, gaps, or won't stay hidden under any of your clothes, everyone who wears a bra knows what it's like to have a bad one. If you don't fit into the relatively small range of sizes on offer at big retailers, they can be prohibitively expensive.

But there's no real choice. A bra is a professional, and often social, necessity for most women larger than an A cup. That includes women experiencing homelessness and other people who rely on donated or subsidized clothes. Bras are rarely given to local charities, which makes it extremely hard to find bras that fit, let alone look good under clothes (and out of clothes).

Through their affiliates, I Support the Girls collects and distributes new and gently worn bras and menstrual hygiene products around the world. The non-profit sends its donations to women and girls in homeless shelters, domestic violence shelters, refugee settlement homes, foster care agencies, LGBTQ agencies, homes for pregnant teens, and more.

Bring your items when you come to Sisterhood events throughout the year (*do not leave in coat closet or lobby collection box*) and they will be brought to an affiliate's drop off site for distribution. Currently, Soma stores are serving as affiliates and drop off sites.


