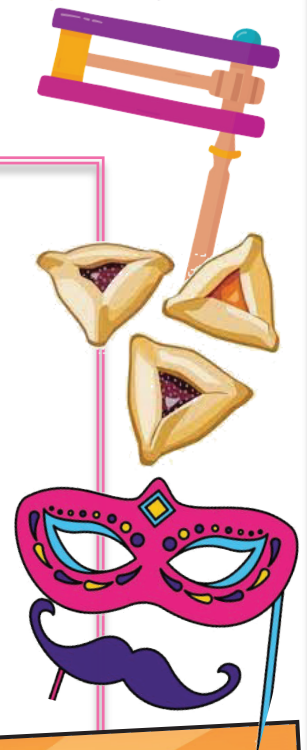

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Sadness and Resolve

"Rabbi, what are things like in Israel?" Since I've been back from my mission in December, I've been asked this question, or some iteration of it, many times. And, though it took me some time to really

process all that I witnessed and all that I experienced, I think that the answer to this question is twofold. How are things in Israel? They are filled with sadness. What's it like in Israel? There's a deep sense of resolve. These two emotions are not usually on opposite sides of the coin. Now, after October 7, while there are certainly many emotions present in the Israeli public, the two that have stuck with me are sadness and resolve.

Let me explain a little bit about what I mean. The overwhelming feeling in Israel when I was there was a feeling of sadness. Israel is a nation in mourning, and so this makes sense. On October 7, over 1200 were killed, and many more injured and traumatized. Everyone has a connection to someone lost, kidnapped, or injured on that day. Israel is a small nation in size and population. It's just the reality that among the victims is someone you know, or knew, or went to school with, or served in the army alongside, or a friend of a friend, or most sadly, a family member. Everyone is in deep mourning. At the same time, life continues, mutedly.

At the same time, Israelis are mourning more than the people lost on that Black Saturday (a term that some Israelis have started to use to refer to October 7). For Israelis, as well as for many American Jews, there is a sadness that comes from the loss of trust and confidence in the State of Israel and her institutions, and of the loss of a certain sense of life, even with an enemy so close.

Israelis have lost trust in their government to protect them. Tradition teaches us that the plagues against Egypt were meant also to remind the Israelites of God's power, not only the Egyptians. After so long an absence, the people needed to know that God was there and on their side. I surmise that the government and the IDF understand that their role now also includes shoring up public trust. The IDF has to show that it knows what it's doing to build the relationship up again. The military has already acknowledged its failures in the lead up to the attack, and now it has resolved to prove to the public that it can and will protect them, and their children who are drafted. Israelis sense of pride in their military now is coupled with the sadness. We pray that the pride will soon return.

The rockets from Gaza have been a nuisance for a

long time; Israel and Israelis had learned begrudgingly to live with these threats, in part because their relative danger is small due to the Israeli missile defense systems. The October 7 pogrom shattered a sense of complacency. The danger is no longer small. The possibility for more attacks like this only continues if Hamas is left standing. Israelis are resolved to finish the job, and many won't return to their homes until they are confident that Hamas is gone. They are resolved that the situation cannot go on like it has since 2005. This conflagration represents an opportunity to end the vicious cycle of violence between Israel and Gaza, but only via annihilating Hamas.

With very few exceptions, the Israeli public is behind the war and is resolved to come out on top. Because of this, every facet of Israeli society has been enlisted to participate in the effort. While not every person can or will, there is always a way to contribute. There are scores of volunteers making food and doing laundry for soldiers, donating and sorting goods, and picking and packing produce, making up for the loss of foreign workers who fled after October 7. On the mission we met with folks finding deep purpose in their support of the war and ensuring that the soldiers and the displaced families have all that they need. I spent a morning with my sister packing persimmons on a farm in the south. For 5 or so hours, we stood at the end of a conveyor belt as persimmons made their way to us, and we took them and packed plastic containers in large trays that were loaded onto pallets ready for sale. Everyone is chipping in, resolved to keep Israel moving forward through this crisis.

Israelis also understand that there is a sad price to be paid for their resolve. They know that their parents, spouses, and children are sent to the front to fight these battles. And, while it is true that the IDF sends commanders in first, the younger soldiers are not far behind. Each day brings with it more sad news of soldiers killed in action. Each day's news reports include clips of the funerals for those soldiers. The sadness is crushing. And yet very few of the families ask the question of why. They understand why. Everyone in Israel does. Through their sadness they find their resolve.

As I'm writing this column in early January, there is no way to know what may happen between now and when you read this, but what is certain is that the sadness and the resolve in Israel are certainly going to stick around for some time. It is my hope that by the next time I visit Israel, hopefully this summer, there will be more joy and an equal resolve to work toward a time for peace, after this difficult time of war.

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

This past December Eileen Schneyman and I attended the URJ 150th Anniversary Gathering in Washington, DC. It was a very full and powerful weekend celebrating Shabbat, commemorating our past, reimagining our future, hearing and speaking with Reform leaders from Israel, and praying and singing with one thousand of our friends: Reform clergy, temple professionals, and congregants from around the world.

There will be opportunities over the next few months to share some of what we learned at this huge and exciting gathering. Much of our time centered on Israel and the terrible war sitting on our hearts. But one piece of the weekend included marking the 150th year of our Reform Movement. Worship highlighted music that spanned the European roots of our Movement, the revolution of American Jewish music, and the sounds of contemporary songwriters and instrumentation.

One powerful moment that stays with me happened as we came to the prayer for peace during our Shabbat evening service. Two extraordinary leaders of our contemporary Jewish music movement led us in Shalom Rav. Cantor Jeff Klepper and Rabbi Daniel Frelander have been collaborating for fifty years since their days as teens at Eisner, one of our premiere Reform summer camps. They shared with us that back then they were influenced by Debbie Friedman, the pioneer of modern Jewish folk music who was their camp song leader. Debbie was

inspired by the folk song culture of the 60s and taught these two Classical Reform teens a new way to approach Jewish liturgy, making prayer more accessible. Jeff and Dan, inspired by their time at camp and with Debbie Friedman, were looking to become song leaders themselves.

They shared that later that year (1973), immediately after the Yom Kippur War they felt a renewed closeness to Israel (one which they noted is so similar to the closeness many of us feel now with Israel and this ongoing war with Hamas). These two teens explored their siddur, The Union Prayerbook, for a text about peace and found "Grant us peace". Knowing that in 1973 prayer could only be sung in Hebrew (my how we have evolved!) they searched for the Hebrew text and found Shalom Rav. They composed their very first song with no idea that most of the Jewish liberal world would embrace it as the go-to melody for that liturgical moment for fifty years and counting.

As we locked arms that evening and sang Shalom Rav we celebrated their fifty years of songwriting and songleading collaboration; we prayed that abundant peace might be restored to Israel; we held each other as we hoped for a time when our world might be safe for all Jews; and just as we do at TBT, we sang with one voice and one heart.

May we soon merit a world of abundant peace, *shalom rav*, and may we sing with one voice and one heart for generations to come.

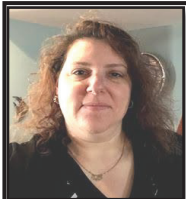

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

"I cannot tell a lie." It's the beginning of a story long attributed to George Washington.

We've all heard that Lincoln wrote the Gettysburg Address on the back of an envelope. We've told these stories so much that we believe them to be true. We believe that they are written in stone, not made-up stories used to sell books in the early 1800's. It's true, Mason Locke Weems wrote about Washington to increase sales of his lackluster book. But he was not the first to tell tales to make sense of our history. We all believe that our ancestor, Abraham, destroyed idols in his father's store. Moses had a speech impediment because he burned his hand on hot coal and put it in his mouth. In Hebrew we call these stories *Midrash*, the subtext, the between the lines. We use them to make our history more understandable, to put words to the feelings we have.

Our 5th grade is taking a deep dive into *Midrash*, making their own stories, while interpreting the sacred texts. 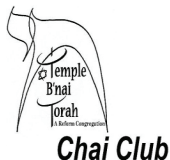

Programs hosted by Milton Berle, Steve Allen, and Ed Sullivan featured a wide variety of musicians including Bill Haley & the Comets, Fats Domino, Buddy Holly, and Elvis Presley, who appeared on all three shows to an electrifying response. Afternoon dance programs like *American Bandstand* played a role as well in bringing rock to large and eager teenage audiences. Then, in 1964, the appearance of the Beatles on *The Ed Sullivan Show* would change the face of pop culture, leading to an explosion of televised rock, from prime-time rock variety shows like *Shindig* and *Hullabaloo*, to the sitcom rock antics of *The Monkees*, and the jubilant renewal of Elvis Presley in the "Comeback Special" of 1968. *This is a 60-minute program.*

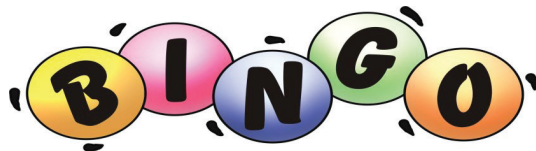

Announcing TBT's 2024 Climate Action Plan

Since the Rabbi asked us to be part of the Jewish response to the climate crisis we have, for example:

- Planted hundreds of trees for reforestation
- Converted impermeable surfaces to green infrastructure i.e., the TBT Garden,
- Installed a water bottle refilling station
- Developed a green practices policy

And, became a member of Adamah's Jewish Climate Leadership Coalition.

As a member, we are required to submit a plan of action to help address climate change. So, with the help of our Housing and Religious Education Committees and Temple Administrator, we prepared a Climate Action Plan for 2024.

Here's a sample of actions in process and planned for 2024:

- Taking steps to reduce food waste in kitchen and dining area
- Teaching our students about composting, upcycling and conservation from Kindergarten through High School
- Encouraging the use of carpooling and limiting idling in the parking lot
- Creating a "reverse" Tashlich program – i.e., taking stuff out of the waterways, as opposed to putting stuff in it!
- Considering the benefits of a lighter color roof and solar panels

We will provide a link to the climate action plan in an upcoming TBT scroll.
