RABBI'S MESSAGE

Israeli Holidays on our Calendar

This year's Hebrew Calendar moves three important Israeli holidays into the month of May. Given recent events in Israel and the broader Middle East, there is no doubt these days will be filled with many emotions, for Jews in Israel, and around the world. On the plus side, that is part of how these days were designed. Each one of the three days, which all come shortly after Passover each year, gives us the opportunity to reflect on our relationship with Israel and the Jewish People. Like all Jewish holidays, each of them begins at sundown and continues into the next day.

Beginning in the evening of Sunday, May 5, the Jewish people commemorate *Yom HaShoah*. Its official name, Holocaust and Heroes Remembrance Day, recognizes that in addition to honoring and remembering the victims of the Nazi war against the Jews, the day is meant to honor those who risked their lives to try and save Jews. This is a date that Israel designated in 1951. (There is a UN designated International Holocaust Remembrance Day in January, which commemorates the liberation of Auschwitz, which was established in 2005.) On this date, ceremonies of remembrance are held throughout the nation. Across Israel on the morning of *Yom HaShoah*, a siren sounds at 10:00am and everyone and everything stops in honor of the victims. Our community annually honors this day with a short service led, in part, by our 7th-graders who have been studying the topic. This year, we will gather on Monday, May 6 at 7:15 for our *Yom HaShoah* Service.

The following week, on Sunday May 12, as the sun sets, yizkor candles are lit as we move into *Yom HaZikaron*, Israel's Memorial Day. *Yom HaZikaron* honors all those who have fallen in battle defending Israel, as well as those who died in acts of terror. This year, the list is so much longer than last. There is no question that ceremonies throughout Israel, if the security situation allows, will be powerful and sad, as the number of those lost on and since October 7 continues to

grow. Israel remains a nation in mourning. *Yom HaZikaron* will be an outlet for a nation's grief. It can be so for us as well. Be on the lookout for information about ways to honor those fallen and show our support for our siblings in Israel.

In a powerful juxtaposition, immediately following the mourning of *Yom HaZikaron*, as the day gives way, the evening of *Yom HaAtzmaut* Israeli Independence Day erupts with jubilation. On May 14, 1948, David Ben Gurion declared Israel a sovereign nation and extended a hand of peace to both all within her borders and all her neighbors. This year, we will celebrate on Tuesday, May 13. *Yom HaAtzmaut* is often marked by music, festivals, fireworks, barbecues, family gatherings, and fun. This year, the situation may call for a more muted celebration. Though it is unclear how the celebrations will unfold, celebrate we should. These last months since October 7 have shown all of us the importance of a Jewish state. As antisemitism continues to surge worldwide, we know all too well the ramifications of not having a safe haven.

This is part of why these three days are put where they are on the calendar. *Yom HaAtzmaut* is the anniversary of the Hebrew date in 1948. Eight days earlier, *Yom HaShoah* reminds us starkly of the importance of Israel's existence, and the consequences to our people of losing sovereignty and power. *Yom HaZikaron*, purposefully, reminds us of the lives lost to keep Israel in existence honoring those who fell in battle. It also recognizes the loss of those lost simply for daring to live as an Israeli, those who perished at the hands of terrorists.

This year especially, as we approach these meaningful days, let us honor them alongside our siblings in Israel. Let us stand with Jews everywhere to recognize the sadness and the power, and the resolve and the joy that come with these days. Let us remember that from the ashes and the sadness, the People of Israel Live. Am Yisrael Chai!

Dear friends, as I have said many times in the last several months, my heart remains in the East. As Rabbi Bar-Nahum did, and as many of our colleagues from around the country have, I will be going on a mission to Israel next month in late June through early

July. I deeply appreciate our Temple family's support as both Rabbi and I take turns to join missions to Israel with other clergy.

Under the auspices of the American Conference of Cantors, our group of colleagues are readying ourselves to travel throughout Israel to bear witness, to volunteer, to comfort, and to meet with hostage families and organizers who continue to struggle with the reality of this war. We hope to be a support to our exhausted and overwhelmed Israeli colleagues, meet with soldiers, and bring light and comfort where ever possible.

As with Rabbi's trip, there will be opportunities for our TBT family to help! The situation in Israel is constantly evolving and our tour company is understandably finalizing our itinerary closer to our departure. But I know that during this mission I will be visiting the Western Wall and welcome taking your prayers

with me. There will be opportunities to make donations to Israeli organizations who need our support the most right now. As Rabbi did, I am collecting monetary donations to be distributed to these organizations through the Cantor's Discretionary Fund. In the next few weeks, I will also be sharing more timely information regarding ways to help. For now, I look forward to preparing for this journey. I know that it is unlike any other I have taken.

This May we will focus on Israel as we commemorate *Yom Ha'atsmaut*, Israel's Independence Day. But the reality is we remain focused on Israel every day in the news, or lack thereof, with the hostage posters hanging in our Temple foyer, with our prayers from the *bima*, with the solidarity gatherings we attend, and with the dog tags many of us wear. I know you join me as we continue to pray fervently for an end to this war, for all the hostages' release, and for our Israeli family.

Am Yisrael Chai!

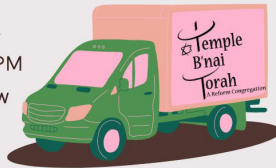

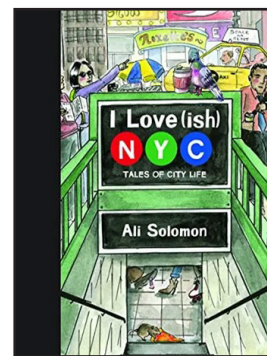
Washington Post, The Believer, and WIRED, among other places. When not drawing, Ali teaches art at a middle school in NYC.

YOUTH GROUP

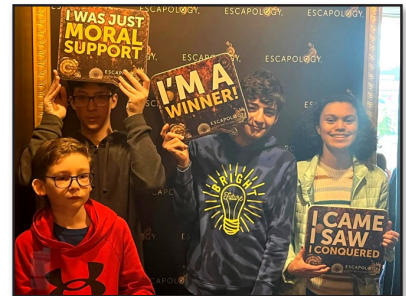
