The Power of Togetherness

In 2020, at the onset of the COVID-19 Pandemic, we had no choice but to separate ourselves from each other. We didn't know how the virus spread. We didn't know what was safe. And, we didn't yet have

either a vaccine or a treatment. In the years since, in many ways, the ability to *not* gather has made our lives easier. Work meetings can gather colleagues from disparate places. Not commuting saves us hours of time a week, money on gas, carbon emissions, and fits of road rage. A ZOOM meeting has a mute button! All of this was necessary, and some of the benefits certainly carry on into our post-COVID world.

It was also the case that our worship had to move to a virtual mode. For 13 months, we gathered mostly on ZOOM. For 13 months, we saw each other only through a screen. We made community there. We prayed and offered blessings. We celebrated and we mourned. Many of us learned that it's more convenient to be on our couches, in our slippers, and more comfortable than the pews (or the folding chairs) certainly!

Since 2020 and the addition of our streaming capabilities, we have seen that fully 1/3 of our congregation now primarily attends – whether Shabbat, a Festival, or even the High Holy Days – virtually. We're thrilled to be able to make our way into so many living rooms and dens, laptops and even smartphones. In many ways, the adaptations the pandemic required revolutionized the way Jews can and do interact with the community. You can turn on and participate in Kaddish, or offer a *mi sheberach*, no matter where you are, anywhere around the world.

Yet, as we approach our Days of Awe and our autumn festival of Sukkot, I can't help but wonder what may have been lost by our not all being together. I'm especially thinking about this as we approach the one-year anniversary of the October 7 attacks, which this year will fall between Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur. In the aftermath of October 7, we have seen how the Jewish community in the United States has been made to feel othered. It feels like we've spent the last year defending our right to exist and our right to live. We're all exhausted and wearied; and we know that it is not over, and that an end to the war in Gaza (may it come speedily) won't end it either. Unfortunately, the pandora's box of antisemitism seems to have been opened.

Our ancestors understood the importance of community as a rejoinder to the difficulties of living as Jews. They understood that there is restorative power in coming together. There is restorative power in hearing with your own ears, not through a speaker, the ancient and powerful words and the beautiful and majestic melodies of the High Holy Days. The Rabbis of old even teach that one must actually hear the call of the shofar, live and in person, in order to fulfill the obligation. To hear the shofar as an echo or as a broadcast is not enough. It requires interaction with others, as does the requirement for 10 to gather for prayer. As powerful as prayer is and can be, being alongside others in the act of prayer may be more powerful.

What comfort might it bring us in these difficult days for our people to physically be shoulder to shoulder with our community, as we reflect on this last year and seek the answers to the unanswerable? Studies show that communal experiences, especially those with rituals performed by the entire community, deepen a sense of belonging, safety, and trust. Being alongside one another helps to heal rifts and deepen relationships in ways that speaking across screens simply cannot do.

I do, of course, recognize that there are members of our community who cannot, for a variety of reasons, join us physically. For those who cannot be with us, the ability to stream provides as much of a sense of connection and as much of the benefits of community as possible.

If you can, if you physically have the ability, and you haven't already planned to, I encourage you to join us inperson this year. Let the wisdom of our communal customs bring comfort to your soul and ready you for the year ahead. Come and see an old friend. Come and count the *tekiah gedolah*. Come and beat your chest in confession next to your neighbor. Come and be alongside others fasting and seeking atonement. To be a part of a community can be so powerful, if we use all that the community can offer to us.

Wishing you and your family a *Shanah Tovah, a Shanah shel Shalom*, a good year, and a year of peace.





<u>reformjudaism.org</u> reminds us that the High Holy Days is a time of personal reflection and repentance, and that the New Year is also "an opportunity to reaffirm the Jewish tradition's longstanding commitment to *tikkun olam* (repair of the world)."

Last month's **Reverse Tashlich** and **Gun Violence Prevention** programs provided different ways to focus on repair of the world, one through care of creation, the other through care of each other. Thank you to all who organized and participated in these excellent programs.

Thank you to all who represented Social Action/Social Justice at the **Membership Engagement Fair** last month and to all who stopped by our table to learn more about us and the work we do!

This month we continue our **High Holy Day Food Drive** on behalf of Island Harvest and Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger. To add to the relevance of the Yom Kippur fast, consider donating the amount of food you might have consumed that day or the amount of money you would have spent to feed yourself and your family during the day.

For your traditional **Tashlich** observance, consider using small pebbles instead of breadcrumbs in remembrance of "those who face daily hunger, for whom even the crumbs might mean the difference between life and death." <u>https://reformjudaism.org/jewish-holidays/rosh-hashanah/social-action-guide-high-holidays</u>. Bread has also been found to be harmful to ducks, geese and other waterfowl and marine life. (<u>https://reformjudaism.org/blog/how-cast-away-your-sins-and-protect-environment</u>)




