RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Daniel Bar-Nahum



Each year, one of the most powerful experiences for members of our congregation is the opportunity for our 10th-graders, as a part of the Confirmation curriculum, to travel to Washington, DC and attend the L'Taken Seminar at the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, affectionately known as "The RAC." This year, we are very excited that not only will our 10th-graders (and also our 11th- and 12th-graders!) be in Washington on the weekend of January 10-13, but for the first time, a cohort of adults from our community will be attending the seminar over the weekend of January 31-February 3. This is the first year that the RAC has invited adults as participants and not just as chaperones, and we're excited to hear about the experience from them! It's our largest teen delegation, and we are excited to be sending eight members as our first adult cohort

Washington, DC is always interesting, and often unpredictable in terms of whom we might meet. This year, our teens, Morah Sheryl, and I will be heading down shortly after the new Congress will be inaugurated, but before the Presidential inauguration. Our adults will be there after the Presidential transition. What that means is that we will be getting in on the ground floor with the new Congress. No matter who is in charge in the White House or who our local Representative might be in any given year, our responsibility as citizens and Jews remains to make our voices heard by our leaders. We seek to ensure that the values we hold dear are at least a part of the conversation, even if we know that it is not always the case that a bill, we advocate for will become law. This experience reminds us also that there is a place for voices like ours, Jewish voices in particular, in the public square.

After a campaign season of so much division and strife, and with an electorate and a government that is less and less trusting of folks across the aisle, this opportunity to learn how government works reminds us of the common ideals of our representative democracy. As citizens or residents, we don't get to vote on any bills ourselves. One blessing of America is that regardless of background, anyone has the right to advocate directly to their representatives. Each of us can pick up the phone or write a letter or send an email to try and influence the direction of this nation. Does it always work? Of

course not. That can be hard for young people, especially, to wrap their heads around.

What we also know, however, is that without advocacy, there is no chance of change whatsoever. A small chance of making this nation live up to its highest ideals is better than no chance. And so, we go every year, and we advocate for what matters to our young people: gun control, reproductive rights, LGBTQ rights, anti-bias legislation, support for Israel, economic justice, and a host of other issues. When a new Congress begins, all previous bills under consideration must begin from scratch, with new writing and a new bill number. Coming to Congress so soon after inauguration in January means we will be asking our leaders to co-sponsor and sign on to bills that are under consideration.

While in DC, we also tour the Holocaust Museum, the Smithsonian, the National Mall, some of the memorials, and Georgetown. The experience of being together with hundreds of other Reform Jewish teens, gathering for prayer, making new friends from across the country, and finding commonality only heightens the power of the weekend. It is my hope that the adult cohort will find similar power in their experience and make new connections and friends.

These weekends are important for so many reasons. All of the above and all that I don't even have space to write about here helps to explain why I am such an advocate of participation in this program. I hope that this year's adult cohort will inspire others to join us next year and, in the years to come.

Mark your calendars for our Shabbat with Social Action/Social Justice, on Friday, January 17, when we hope that some of our teens, having just returned from Washington, will share the issue papers they presented on Capitol Hill. We'll look forward to an opportunity to hear from our adult cohort after they return, as well.

epic song celebrating the miracle of the parting of the Sea of Reeds and the safe crossing of the entire Israelite community. We at TBT will celebrate with both our Adult and B’nai Shir Youth Choirs singing special music that Friday night. Although our choirs’ year is at the midpoint, this January rehearsals for Shabbat Shira are starting up and it’s an awesome time to jump in! Need more inspiration? Check out some of my favorite benefits of being in a choir:

Musicality: *Singing in a choir improves the way you hear music. It draws out your innate musical abilities and intensifies your appreciation of harmony.*

Confidence: *Singing together in a choir gives you permission to make a joyful noise as part of a group, building confidence and singing as leaders of our congregation.*

Physical: *Singing in choir is a great workout for your lungs! Breathing deeply opens up the diaphragm and oxygenates the blood, strengthening the whole body. Singing helps with posture and tones your stomach muscles.*

Mental Health: *Studies show that choral singing benefits brain function, reinforced feelings of togetherness, and the release of endorphins and oxytocin resulting in reduced stress.*

Belonging: *Being together in a choir creates community and a feeling of belonging. We have fun together and learn some of the best contemporary and traditional settings of our Reform tradition. We forge social bonds, support each other and make new friends!*

About our Adult Choir: Our choir of congregants partner with Rabbi Bar-Nahum, our Music Director, Sean Cotty, and me to help make the High Holy Days meaningful and beautiful for our sacred community. During the year they continue to rehearse and sing at select Shabbat services.

About B’nai Shir Choir: Co-led by Emily Altman and me, B’nai Shir Junior Choir (3rd grade and older) participates at Family Services and special events (like Shabbat Shira this year).

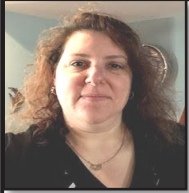

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

The secular New Year is a great time to make resolutions. It's a great chance to look back at the last few months and see what we've accomplished since Rosh Hashanah. It's an opportunity to do *Teshuva*, the act of repentance, and analyze your *tzedakah*, your generosity towards others. *Teshuva* is about consciously walking a better path. Have you made better choices when given the opportunity, have you worked specifically to repair the relationships around you? When given the chance, do you apologize and actually mean it? *Tzedakah* encompasses more than just giving to charity, which I highly recommend. It involves caring for the planet, *Tikun Olam*, as well as *Hachnas Orchim*, welcoming the stranger. Our students have shown this past year that these principles are second nature. When called on, their generosity has filled our *Tzedakah* boxes, as well as our clothing and food bins. We've made a point to spend time in our garden, even using our compost bin to help out. You'd be hard pressed to notice who in our school started this year, or even mid-year. Welcoming others is something we take pride in. For our students and their families, these aren't resolutions that are made, they are lived already. We are nearly 5 months into the Hebrew Year, so now is a great time to take stock. Can you take better care of the earth, and the people who inhabit it? Can you be more welcoming, kinder, gentler, more accepting of others?

Their trip ends with a presentation to their Senators and Representatives. It's an opportunity for them to give back, to take stock of their place in the world.

Chai Club Program American Heroes of the Holocaust

Back by popular demand is Howard Kerner, who has given us presentations on "Priests and Nuns" and "Teenage Rescuers of the Holocaust."

Through the years, the Israeli Holocaust Center, Yad Vashem, has awarded some 27,000 Holocaust rescuers around the world the title of "Righteous Among the Nations." These men, women, and couples saved many Jews. Some European countries have thousands of such rescuers awarded; the U.S. has only five such designees. We will learn about nine brave Americans who displayed courage and compassion during some of history's darkest days.



Retired professor Howard Kerner's passion project is recognizing and celebrating human goodness, even during the Holocaust. He finds it sad that we always know the names and deeds of history's villains but not the names and deeds of the heroes. *This is a 60-minute program.*

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Happy secular New Year to all.

I hope that 2025 brings peace, health and happiness to us all.

I am writing this article just after Thanksgiving, even though it is for the January Voice, so in that spirit, I am most appreciative for our wonderful board, our professionals and staff, and you, our congregants!

Thank you to those who made the Chanukah brunch happen. It was wonderful and wonderful to celebrate with our extended community. An added benefit is that this time, my Grandson joined us and had a ball! Speaking of Chanukah, the Chanukah Shabbat is one of my favorites of the year. I think it is beautiful to see each family light their own chanukiah among the sea of every other family. In these trying times, seeing the light of Chanukah is so important and so moving. It is heartwarming to see that we are still proud American Jews who can light our menorahs in public.

As of the writing of this article, I am very close to having 100% Board(s) participation in our Kol Nidre pledge drive. It is so important to me to be able to reach this goal. I thank you from the bottom of my heart. I hope it makes your heart feel good too, knowing that you helped Temple to meet its financial needs and help to keep our doors open for all those that need and want a Temple in our community. The ethics of giving are strong within Temple B'nai Torah.

Question of the month: I want to spend some time in this article answering the question, or multiple versions of the question, why have we chosen this year to honor Rabbi Bar-Nahum at our spring gala? The short answer is: Temple B'nai Torah is very fortunate to have a Rabbi who takes his job seriously and is involved with our community so deeply. But I also know that many of us may not understand what is involved in being the Rabbi of a congregation. Let me share with you a sampling of the areas where our Rabbi focuses his energies.

When I joined a Temple, I thought that the Rabbi ran services and was involved in life cycle events. Services repeat each Shabbat and each year, so I did not have any appreciation for what is involved on a day-to-day basis. As I became active in the religious school and other committees, then the Board, then a Rabbi search committee, then the executive committee and finally as President of the Temple, I learned what is really involved with being the Rabbi of a congregation, and how blessed we are with Rabbi Bar-Nahum.

Though we may only see the end results, much of Rabbi's time is spent preparing for communal events. Rabbi is an important

presence at many of our Temple's committees and on the Board. He works in close partnership with Cantor Timman, Morah Sheryl, and Eileen to create a cohesive, professional leadership team that gets along (which is not always a given) and that has brought our community to new heights. Through mergers and the uncertainty Covid, Rabbi Bar-Nahum's leadership has ensured that we are a stronger congregation today and that we are working toward our vision of being a congregation of excellence, and a regional hub for Reform Judaism.

Every Shabbat, holiday and life cycle event can be the same, but at TBT every Shabbat, holiday, and life cycle includes thought and preparation to run smoothly and to ensure that they are meaningful and appropriately beautiful. When members of the community participate on the bima, whether as a representative of an Arm or as Bet Mitzvah, additional preparation is required, and Rabbi is always available to guide.

Speaking of Bet Mitzvah, Rabbi Bar-Nahum spends more time with each student than many rabbis. He facilitates parent and family education, helps each student choose their verses of Torah and Haftarah and works one-on-one with each child on their D'var Torah and thank yous. He also runs a final full rehearsal with each family and works to be available at this important time. And, as some of you know, Torah isn't all Rabbi Bar-Nahum teaches. He helps our students learn how to shake hands and share appropriate greetings.

Rabbi spends time with our High Schoolers; teaching 10th-grade Confirmation and chaperoning our students on the RAC seminar in Washington, DC where they learn to be good citizens and involved in social action/social justice. There is not a student who has come back from RAC that is unchanged. They mature in that short weekend and are more confident of themselves. They also come home with a deeper relationship with Rabbi, having shared in the powerful experience together.

When someone suffers a loss, Rabbi is available and a comforting presence throughout the funeral and grieving process. If you suffer devastating news or illness, he will be there to help you through this difficult time. When someone is planning a wedding, Rabbi offers full pre-marital counseling, even if he's not officiating at the wedding, helping the couple begin their relationship on the right foot. When a new young one is to be named, Rabbi works to help pick a name and craft a meaningful service. For every event, much time and energy is put into the planning.

Rabbi teaches lifelong learning classes. As a phenomenal, exuberant, knowledgeable teacher, Rabbi always prepares

materials, readings, and slides in preparation for the classes. He is always ready with answers; and if he doesn't know the answer, he will spend time researching it and let you know. Rabbi is also involved with making sure the curriculum in our school is great, relevant and current; and also evaluating that what is taught is also what is learned.

I am pleased to say that Rabbi has an open-door policy with the children and young adults (older adults too – but they should make an appointment). Our children know that if they have any issues at school, public school, or in the community, or a personal issue, they can come speak with him. He will spend time with them and help them come up with a solution. He is always willing to meet with a prospective member,

helping our congregation to grow.

On top of all of that, Rabbi also troubleshoots tech issues for us; will record services and classes and distribute the recording, and will assist when needed. Rabbi is the face of TBT, participating in community activities as a representative of TBT.

And we know that I am only touching the surface of what Rabbi Bar-Nahum does for each and all of us at Temple B'nai Torah. The real question should be, given all the above, how can we not honor him?! I hope you will save the date of April 5 for our spring Gala and that you will join us in celebrating Rabbi Bar-Nahum for all he does for our community.
