RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Daniel Bar-Nahum



A Note of Thanks

I'd like to share my immense appreciation for all who planned, assisted, attended, and donated toward our Gala last month in honor of the Bar Mitzvah of my rabbinate. The whole weekend was beautifully planned and executed, from the special presentations on Friday evening through the dinner and dancing on Saturday evening.

Thank you for the leaf on our Tree of Life and the beautiful kiddush cup, yad, and certificate. I am looking forward to making use of the cup and yad for many years and special occasions to come.

I'd like to share here some of my remarks from that evening, for those who were unable to join us:

The rabbis of old instituted the custom of Bar Mitzvah at age 13 and a day. 13 years of life, they surmised, was enough experience to be able to make responsible decisions, and to know enough to understand the ramifications of your actions. In thinking about this idea, I recognize the wisdom in this. 13 years is a lot of experience, enough experience to have seen just about everything. Enough experience to have made mistakes, perhaps even many of them, and to have learned from them, and striven for better. Enough experience to have seen many beginnings and many endings.

In the 13 years I have been blessed to be a rabbi, we have been through mergers and pandemics, disasters, elections, wars, and attacks, foreign and domestic. And, we've been through weddings, bet mitzvah, baby namings, graduations, consecrations, and confirmations. We walked the path of the mourner and we've been elevated by the joys of Torah and learning. We've striven to connect with the Eternal through prayer and song. We've celebrated holidays, traveled, and acknowledged milestones together. And it has been a blessing to be here and to be your rabbi for all of this.

I have striven to be the voice of tradition as a vote and not a veto, and the voice of the Prophets as guiding our thinking and actions, always trying to recognize the privilege that I have in my pulpit, and seeking as often as possible to bring us together through my words. I have striven to make our world better, and I have been overjoyed at the way you have all joined me in doing so. Like God, we've planted a garden, and also planted seeds in the next generation, seeds of our faith and the beauty that is Judaism. I have sought to bring the relevance and power of the texts of our tradition to you in ways that are accessible and meaningful, and I have been so impressed with all that I have learned from you as together we engage in our sacred struggle. I have attempted to foster a love of Israel, in all its complexity and beauty, and I am looking forward to getting us back there as a congregation as soon as it is feasible.

I have tried every day to be better than the day before. I know that I have not always achieved that. I also know that more of the days have been better than the days before them. I am,

thankfully for all of us, not the same rabbi I was 13 years ago. In many ways, it feels like I'm doing an entirely different job.

I have worked hard to get to where we are today, not by myself certainly, and so tonight as much as you are here to celebrate me, I celebrate all of us, and all that we have done together to reach this moment...

In the 23rd Psalm, which I recite often, we read the phrase *kosi revaya*, my cup overflows. In this moment, King David, after acknowledging God's presence and comfort in moments of both difficulty and ease, recognizes that God provides all that he will need and then some.

An overflowing cup is not what is expected. Too often the cup is empty, or we are all fighting for the last drops. Or when we hope for wine, we get water. King David teaches us that with God's help, our needs can be met and exceeded. With God's help and grace, I have been blessed to be a rabbi now for 13 years, and my needs have been met and exceeded by this wonderful community and by the partners I have in this work, both professional and lay.

Tonight, I feel like King David must have felt in the moment that inspired these words. My cup overflows. It overflows with gratitude, with appreciation, with gratefulness, and with every other synonym you can think of for thankfulness. My cup overflows with the blessings of family, of friends, of community, of colleagues, and of partners in this sacred work...

Later in the Psalms, King David asks: How can I repay God for all the bounties given to me? In response, he answers: "I raise the cup of deliverance and invoke God's name."

And so now, I raise this cup of life and invoke God's name: *Eloheinu v'Elohei Avoteinu v'Imoteinu*, Eternal our God and God of our Ancestors, You have filled my cup to overflowing and brought me and this holy community to this moment of celebration and joy. You have provided teachers, mentors, and guides for me. You have offered me deep friendships spanning decades, colleagues graced with compassion and patience, and congregants eager for learning and to feel Your presence. You have offered me the opportunity to work with teams of colleagues and partners whose collaboration pushes me to be better and to grow each and every day. You have blessed me with beloved family and a sacred community. You have allowed me to share Your light, Your love, and Your Torah in the best way that I can, and you have brought me to a community where all that I bring is valued and respected.

Kosi revaya, my cup overflows with goodness and blessing. Blessed are you, Eternal our God, who brings us together for moments of celebration, who fills our cups to overflowing, who guides us on our ways, who strengthens our steps, and who hears our prayers. *Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech Ha'olam, shome'a tefillah*.

And together let us say, Amen!

NOTES FROM OUR CANTOR

Cantor Rica Timman



This month I celebrate a very special milestone in my career. It was exactly twenty-five years ago in May that I was ordained as a Cantor from the Academy for Jewish Religion.

My road to the cantorate was a bit circuitous. I studied vocal performance, genetics, and law during my undergraduate days at Sarah Lawrence College. My home congregation hired me to teach music and be the substitute soloist when our Cantor, Jerold Siena had a Metropolitan Opera role to perform on occasional Fridays. I was always connected to my Judaism, but it wasn't until my graduate vocal music studies at the University of Illinois in Champaign/Urbana that the 'penny dropped'.

I began work at a local Reform temple as their music specialist and soprano in their quartet. They did not have a Cantor, but after a few weeks working there they told me that they wanted to hire someone else to be their soprano and make me their Cantorial Soloist. Wait, weren't men only allowed to be Cantors??? What I didn't know was that a few years earlier, Barbara Ostfeld had broken that glass ceiling to become the first invested woman Cantor, graduating from HUC. They shared that news with me, and my world changed overnight. (By the way, this June the American Conference of Cantors is celebrating fifty years of women in the cantorate and Cantor Ostfeld's investiture.) I took on the Cantorial position created for me at Sinai Temple, learning my craft as I went. By the time I was working on my doctorate in Jewish

Ethnomusicology at University of Illinois, I realized that I really wanted to switch to studying full-time to be a Cantor.

I returned to New York and took part-time positions with three local synagogues. I met Charles, we married and although I was accepted at HUC, I had ailing parents and could not move to study in Israel for my first year. Instead, I took a full-time position at Temple Emanu-El of Lynbrook (now Am Echad) while studying privately with a local Cantor. A few years later I was accepted to the Academy for Jewish Religion, a pluralistic seminary where I could study locally and continue to work at Emanu-El. While Charles did double duty, working and caring for our two young children, I studied at AJR while serving full-time at Temple Emanu-El. Four years later, I was ordained. After twelve years with Temple Emanu-El, I took on the position of Cantor of Temple Beth El of Closter, New Jersey. I enjoyed sixteen years of service to TBE until they moved and merged with another local congregation. Now I have been the Cantor here at TBT these past eight years and counting!

It is a distinct honor for me to be your Cantor and be able to celebrate my twenty-five-year ordination milestone this month. May we all go from strength to strength in health and in harmony!



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Passover represents a moment for storytelling, something I, as an educator, always appreciate. It's a time to talk of the Israelites' escape from bondage to freedom, serving as a reminder of the challenges and victories that have defined Jewish identity throughout the years. The customs of the Seder evening—from reciting the Haggadah to posing the Four Questions—function as a vehicle for historical awareness as well as an opportunity to talk about the implications for the future.

As educators, we have an opportunity to teach about the Exodus in ways that resonate with our learners. We will hold our annual Schoolwide Seder on Wednesday, April 9. The seder is a special chance for us to connect the story of the Israelites to their own lives. We offer them the ability to learn about the oppression and freedom of the Israelites while discussing the chance to create a just and compassionate modernity.

On April 4, we will have our 3rd Grade Siyyum, an end of year celebration of all they have learned. Join us as they recite the Aleph Bet for the first time, publicly, showing that they are ready to take on the mitzvah of learning the language.

It is one that will showcase that we are all capable of continuing to learn, to grow, and to share all that Judaism has to offer.



Rabbi Poticha At ADL: Never Is Now

Early in March, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) convened its annual conference: Never Is Now.

As a member of the NY/NJ Rabbinic Advisory Counsel, I attend every year. People from Brazil to Boston, Portugal to Paris, Tel Aviv to Texas attend. Attendees include high school and college students, politicians, journalists/ news anchors, film makers, lawyers, lobbyists, sports icons, global educators, influencers/ social media magnets, Ambassadors, corporate CEOs, inventors, university presidents, survivors of the Nova Music Festival, family members of those murdered on 7 October, leaders in Hillel, activists, authors, and yes: rabbis.

With anti-Semitism rising exponentially, more than 5,000 people gathered during the 2-day conference. Regardless of being Democrat or Republican, environmentalist or industrialist, we all share the same deep concern about anti-Semitism.

Each day began and ended with a mainstage session hosted by Hen Mazzig and Montana Tucker. The presenters during the mainstage sessions were notable personalities such as Bianna Golodryga, Ambassador Marina Rosenberg, Elise Stefanik, Sheikh Mowfaq Tarif (spiritual leader of the Druze in Israel), Orna & Ronen Neutra, Daniel Lubetzky (owner of Kind Bars and much more), General Yoav Gallant, Van Jones, Jonathan Greenblatt (ADL CEO), Billie Jean King, Jessica Tisch, Gal Gadot and many more.

Every several hours too many choices of workshops were offered. Subjects included anti-Semitism on college campuses, combating anti-Semitism on social media, how to push governments to fight anti-Semitism, how to encourage more teaching of Holocaust studies, raising awareness about anti-Semitism, the broken media – how media bias influences anti-Semitism, how to choose safe technologies for children and young adults, accidental activists and others.

Let me highlight two issues in which ADL has taken the lead.

In the 1950s and 1960s ADL championed anti-mask legislation that helped unmask the Ku Klux Klan. Using similar legislation, ADL is promoting “UnMaskHate” legislation. ADL knows, as more states are willing to pass such legislation, those who hide behind a mask in order to intimidate and incite hateful action will be held accountable and brought to justice. UnMaskHate legislation will be voted on in more than 12 states in the coming year. New York State is a leader in promoting this bill.

ADL has also taken the lead and are co-counsel on behalf of 180 plaintiffs, filing a US federal lawsuit against Iran, Syria and North Korea to hold them responsible for their role in the largest attack against Jewish people since the Shoah: the attack on 7 October. Lawyers and survivors discussed why this legislation is so important not only to the victims of 7 October and their loved ones but also for other victims of international terrorism. This should pave the path for justice and accountability.

Today, ADL continues to fight all forms of anti-Semitism and bias, using innovation and partnerships to drive impact. A global leader in combating anti-Semitism, countering extremism and battling bigotry wherever and whenever it happens, ADL works to protect democracy and ensure a just and inclusive society for all. The conference was a success, our work continues.
