RABBI'S MESSAGE

Rabbi Janise Poticha



During the Shoah of World War II six million Jewish adults and children were murdered, and millions of others were killed or suffered persecution at the hands of the Nazi campaign of dehumanization and extermination. Their lives and memory teach us the importance not only

of remembering the past but acting in the present to fight antisemitism and hate. The lessons of the Shoah/Holocaust illustrate the dangers of prejudice, discrimination and antisemitism.

The liberation of the Nazi concentration and extermination camps began in Eastern Europe when Soviet troops reached Majdanek, in July 1944. Soon they found many other sites, including Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest and deadliest Nazi extermination camp, which they liberated on January 27, 1945.

British and American troops who were approaching from the west did not reach the concentration camps in Germany until the spring of 1945. They were shocked at the unprecedented nature of the crimes they witnessed, including Jewish concentration camp prisoners on the verge of death, piles of corpses and overwhelming displays of Nazi crimes against humankind.

The Jewish people know the importance of memory. In November 2025, the United Nations General Assembly realized the value of remembering what happened to the Jewish people just because they are Jewish. They adopted a resolution designating 27 January as International Holocaust Remembrance Day. The resolution also supports the development of educational programs which memorialize and teach about the Shoah/Holocaust with an eye of preventing genocide in the present and future.

Commemorating International Holocaust Remembrance Day, Temple B'nai Torah has invited a scholar-in-residence, Ms. Susan Stein to not only study with all of our religious school classes, she will also perform her 1-person play about the life of a young Jewish Dutch woman: Etty Hillesum as gleaned from Etty's diaries written during World War II. In these diaries and later, her letters from Westerbork concentration camp, Etty bears witness to what it means to be human and commits herself to a radical choice: not to hate, even as she opens her heart to the horrors unfolding around her. She wrestles to write about the life she is living — her loves, her work, her humor, her spirituality, and her transformation. She was murdered in Auschwitz in 1943 at the age of 29.

In February 1942 she writes: "I really see no other solution than to turn inward and to root out all the rottenness there. I no longer believe that we can change anything in the world until we have first changed ourselves. And that seems to me the only lesson to be learned from this war." Etty asks us not to leave her in Auschwitz but to have "a tiny little bit of a say" in what she hopes will be a new world.

Susan Stein, gifted educator and actress began the Etty Project to not only keep the lessons of Etty Hillesum "alive" but also to teach the lessons of her life through educational programming and theater. Her programming, *Recovering Lot Voices, teaches what happened to Etty (and consequently to millions of other innocents) while fostering empathy and empowering students to see themselves as agents of change.*

Ms. Stein will also perform her play about Etty. Standing on a bare stage, Etty speaks directly to the audience as she wrestles to write about the life she is living. A disarming one-woman play, Etty invites the audience to be part of the intimate struggle to find a freedom within herself as the world closes in around her. The second act invites the audience to join the conversation which Etty begins.

In a time such as this, with the acuteness of antisemitism, Etty speaks to us.

The performance will begin at 6:45pm. All are welcome and all are invited. You are encouraged to invite your friends and family who are not members of TBT.

Happy secular New Year!

In the Jewish calendar, as taught in the Mishnah, we actually celebrate four different New Years: Rosh Hashanah on the first of Tishrei, the first day of the month of Nissan, the first day of Elul, and the 15th of Shvat, Tu BiShvat, the “New

Year of the Trees.”

Tu BiShvat, often called the Jewish Arbor Day, originally marked the early stirrings of spring and served as an agricultural festival. In the 17th century, the mystics of Safed created a special ritual meal inspired by the Passover seder, celebrating God’s presence through the fruits of the natural world. Today, communities across the globe continue this tradition with modern Tu BiShvat seders, and the holiday has taken on new life as a time for planting trees in Israel and around the world, often in honor or memory of loved ones.

A Tu BiShvat seder, rich in imagery and symbolism, is commonly divided into four sections representing the four seasons. As with the Passover seder, participants drink four cups of wine or grape juice, this time shifting gradually from white to deep red. These colors evoke the cycle of the seasons: the stillness of winter, the first blush of spring, the blossoms of late spring, and the fullness and warmth of summer.

The traditional seder plate includes fruits and nuts from four symbolic categories: those with inedible shells and edible insides, those with soft outsides and hard pits, those with edible outsides but inedible cores, and those that are fully edible. Each category reflects different layers of the natural world, and, some say, different ways of being human.

Here at TBT, we are excited to celebrate Tu BiShvat together this month! We will gather for our combined **Shabbat/Tu BiShvat Seder and Service on Friday, January 30th at 7:15 PM** in the social hall. We’ll sit together at tables filled with the fruits, nuts, and symbolic elements of the holiday, enjoying a meaningful and delicious evening that blends Shabbat’s peace with Tu BiShvat’s renewal. The following week our Religious School will hold their Tu BiShvat seders on **Wednesday, February 4th**.

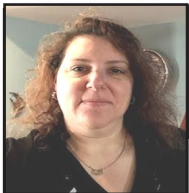

Our **Climate Action Plan** for 2026 is being finalized and will be submitted to ADAMAH this month.

We have already completed preparations for our Native Plants Demonstration Garden at the corner of Oakfield and Jerusalem Avenues. Thank you to those who donated mulch, their time and their energy to prepare the space. Your efforts will allow the soil to develop over the winter in preparation for new plantings in the Spring. Stay tuned for information about Native Plants programming at TBT.

The Garden at TBT is closed for the winter but we are busy planning for our 7th growing season! Although farms often let fields lay fallow in the 7th year, our emphasis on crop rotation and ongoing soil development allows us to continue using the garden to its fullest. Through the generosity of Island Harvest's Farm program and Cornell Cooperative Extension, we have been approved to participate in an extensive soil testing program, free of charge. The results will help us fine tune our soil management and crop selections for the next growing season. We are extremely grateful and excited for this opportunity. If you think you might be interested in helping when we re-open, join us in-person, at TBT, on Sunday, February 8, 12:00-2:00 pm.

This year's **SA/SJ Shabbat** is scheduled for Friday, Jan. 16. Please join us and learn about what we do. We will be joined by Stephanie Draine, founder of Life after Loss, A.N.D.R.E. who will speak about her organization and how it supports family members who have experienced loss due to gun violence. Then, join us at the Oneg where we will assemble Comfort Packages for the recipients of Life after Loss, A.N.D.R.E.s' services.

Happy New Year from Youth Group!

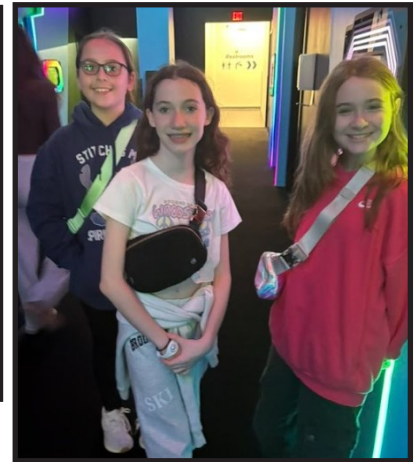
The year 2025 is racing to a close! There have been so many amazing meetings and events for Youth Group and we have had unbelievable participation! I can only hope that it continues into the new year!

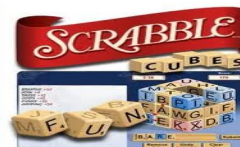
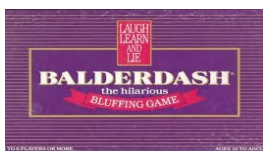

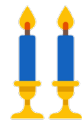
